What reading the Bible in a Year teaches us

In January, we set 3 resolutions to do as a church for 2017: Read the Bible in a year, attend one spiritual growth opportunity, invite someone to church. In the next two months, I will reflect on attending spiritual growth opportunities and inviting someone to church. But for this month, I want to share some of the reflections that I have heard from those who are reading the Bible in a year.

With 66 books in the whole Bible which range from history to wisdom, gospel to letter, prophecy to story, there is a lot to read. Many of us have read the Bible on a need to know basis. When we are curious about what God has to say, we pick up the Bible like a magic eight ball and look for a relevant passage. When we hear someone refer to a particular story, we might read a bit of the story from the Bible. When we think we need to know, we read it. Otherwise, we base our bible knowledge on the passage(s) we hear on a Sunday morning. This resolution challenged each of us to take seriously the commitment that the Bible is God's word for us.

So, what have some of our readers learned:

- **The whole Bible is God's word.** The Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John) might be what is most familiar to many people, but God's character is best understood in the whole story of God and God's people. In order to see that more fully, you need to read all of the Bible. Many reflected on how in their youth, preachers would focus on telling the stories of Jesus. While this is an incredible joy, this method misses out on telling the stories of Deborah and Abigail, Barnabas, and Silas, and many more. Reading the whole Bible knits together Old Testament and New Testament in ways that God can reveal new truths to us.

- **Engage the questions.** The Bible can stand up to all of your questions and curiosities. As you read and you wonder about the extended age of people in the Old Testament or the missionary journeys of Paul or temple prostitutes or prophecies, ask your questions! God created your mind and offers wisdom to all who seek it!

- **It is more important to take the Bible seriously, than literally.** The people of God thousands of years before Christ and the people of God thousands of years after Christ, do not live in the same world. The gospel message remains truth tirelessly across time. However, prohibitions on wearing mixed material clothes and other time-sensitive rules make more sense when seriously investigating and learning about the context.

- **Context matters.** The most consistent comment from those who are reading through the Bible is that they want to know what was happening when the book was being written. They want to understand a little bit more about the culture of the time. How does the language effect our understanding? Context matters. In context, we can understand what concerns was Paul responding to in one of his letters, why were mustard seeds used for illustration in the Sermon on the Mount, why does God seem so violent in the Old Testament?

- **The Bible is a lifelong book that I can read all my life.** For many of those reading the Bible, it is not the first time they picked up a Bible, but it may be the most meaningful. We read Proverbs differently as we seek to provide wisdom to our grandchildren. We read Song of Songs differently when we are in relationship. We read Genesis prehistory stories differently when we bring our knowledge of other cultures. All of our lives, there is wisdom, we hear afresh in the Bible for this season of life.

Some people have asked, I did not start reading along at the beginning of the year, what should I do? There are two options:

Start Now! Pick up a blue reading guide in the lobby and start in August and read along. Then continue through next August.

Join us in January with a reading plan! There will be more opportunities to reflect on what you are reading.

Keep reading! I am eager to reflect with anyone as they read. May your faith be enriched by learning and living God's Word and Way.

Have You Remembered To Include West Grove UMC In Your Will?

One inescapable reality in Life is that we all must pass someday...sometimes with anticipation, sometimes unexpectedly.

An important consideration for those of us who have been generous to our church throughout all our lives is, "How can I continue to support its ministry even after my death?" Making a provision to West Grove UMC in your estate planning is as simple as a couple of lines included into your will - but don't wait to make those plans.



For assistance with this important feature of your own discipline of stewardship, talk with your financial planner or just call the church office. More elaborate gift bequests can be brokered through the church professionals at the Mid-Atlantic Foundation. Consider leaving a tithe (10%) of your estate to West Grove UMC at your death...or even a flat gift amount which you specify...and then enjoy the length of your days knowing that you have made this faithful choice!



How low is too low for blood pressure?

Within certain limits, the lower your blood pressure reading is, the better. There is also no specific number at which day-to-day blood pressure is considered too low, as long as none of the symptoms of trouble are present.

Symptoms of low blood pressure

Most doctors will only consider chronically low blood pressure as dangerous if it causes noticeable signs and symptoms, such as:

Dizziness or lightheadedness

Nausea

Fainting (syncope)

Dehydration and unusual thirst

Dehydration can sometimes cause blood pressure to drop. However, dehydration does not automatically signal low blood pressure. Fever, vomiting, severe diarrhea, overuse of diuretics and strenuous exercise can all lead to dehydration, a potentially serious condition in which your body loses more water than you take in. Even mild dehydration (a loss of as little as 1 percent to 2 percent of body weight) can cause **weakness, dizziness and fatigue.**

Lack of concentration

Blurred vision

Cold, clammy, pale skin

Rapid, shallow breathing

Fatigue

Depression

Underlying causes of low blood pressure

Low blood pressure can occur with:

*Prolonged bed rest

***Pregnancy**-During the first 24 weeks of pregnancy, it's common for blood pressure to drop.

***Decreases in blood volume**-A decrease in blood volume can also cause blood pressure to drop. A significant loss of blood from major trauma, dehydration or severe internal bleeding reduces blood volume, leading to a severe drop in blood pressure.

***Certain medications**-A number of drugs can cause low blood pressure, including diuretics and other drugs that treat hypertension; heart medications such as beta blockers;

drugs for Parkinson's disease; tricyclic antidepressants; erectile dysfunction drugs, particularly in combination with nitroglycerine; narcotics and alcohol. Other prescription and over-the-counter drugs may cause low blood pressure when taken in combination with high blood pressure medications.

***Heart problems**-Among the heart conditions that can lead to low blood pressure are an abnormally low heart rate (bradycardia), problems with heart valves, heart attack and heart failure. Your heart may not be able to circulate enough blood to meet your body's needs.

***Endocrine problems**-Such problems include complications with hormone-producing glands in the body's endocrine systems; specifically, an underactive thyroid (hypothyroidism), parathyroid disease, adrenal insufficiency Addison's disease), low blood sugar and, in some cases, diabetes.


***Severe infection** (septic shock)-Septic shock can occur when bacteria leave the original site of an infection (most often in the lungs, abdomen or urinary tract) and enter the bloodstream. The bacteria then produce toxins that affect blood vessels, leading to a profound and life-threatening decline in blood pressure.

***Allergic reaction** (anaphylaxis)-Anaphylactic shock is a sometimes-fatal allergic reaction that can occur in people who are highly sensitive to drugs such as penicillin, to certain foods such as peanuts or to bee or wasp stings. This type of shock is characterized by breathing problems, hives, itching, a swollen throat and a sudden, dramatic fall in blood pressure.

***Neurally mediated hypotension**-Unlike orthostatic hypotension, this disorder causes blood pressure to drop after standing for long periods, leading to symptoms such as dizziness, nausea and fainting. This condition primarily affects young people and occurs because of a miscommunication between the heart and the brain. Nutritional deficiencies A lack of the essential vitamins B-12 and folic acid can cause anemia, which in turn can lead to low blood pressure.

If you notice a sudden decline in blood pressure A single lower-than-normal reading is not cause for alarm, unless you are experiencing any other symptoms or problems. If you experience any dizziness, lightheadedness, nausea or other symptoms, it's a good idea to consult with your healthcare provider. To help with your diagnosis, keep a record of your symptoms and activities at the time they occurred.



Willing to improve his or her skills by training for service




