

"When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting." Acts 2:1-3



So the disciples were settled into a routine with Jesus again. They been in routine with Jesus for three years of teaching, preaching, healing, and journeying. They thought they had understood life together. They understood that within this life, there was give and there was take. There was change, and there was difference. But they knew to go with the flow.

Then the changes were larger than they could have imagined. The waves bigger than they could ride. Jesus' talk of death, the trial, his crucifixion, and burial. Devastation, deeper and darker, than they had ever experienced.

The women went to care for his body, like others before. It was like the pattern of normalcy was resuming, however deeply sad. When they came back with their blabber of rising from the dead, it was like cruel joke. No one could fall for that joke.

Then, Jesus came among the disciples. ALIVE! He was really alive. The disciples touched him. They watched him eat and knew him to be alive! It was like death had been a bad dream. But death and resurrection were the fulfillment and realization of the words of Jesus.

So, for fifty days, the disciples learned more and went deeper with Jesus. It felt like the routine had come back. When Jesus ascended to God the Father, he promised that the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, would gift the followers of Jesus with gifts and fruits of the Spirit. Looking up at the sky, Jesus left the disciples with their mouths hanging open at the sky.

Then, the wind blew and the tongues of fire came upon the heads of all of the disciples. This is the festival of

Pentecost. Here, the disciples came to realize: No longer is there routine and predictability. But rather, dependence on the way of God.

This is one of the hardest lessons for all of the followers of Jesus: Depending on God's timing and not our own sense of how we desire for life's seasons to unfold, deepens a disciple's prayer life and experience of the Holy Spirit.

Here at West Grove, this is an exciting season. Each of our ministries has been modeling and learning to life lives of prayer and dependence on God.

The Holy Spirit is often described as the wind. The wind is seen by the effects, but not in essence. Rachel Held Evans, the writer, describes the Holy Spirit this way: "The Spirit is like wind, earth's oldest sojourner, which in one place readies a sail, in another whittles a rock, in another commands the trees to bow, in another gently lifts a bridal veil. Wind knows no perimeter. The wildest of all wild things, it travels to every corner of a cornerless world and amplifies the atmosphere. It smells like honeysuckle, curry, smoke, sea. It feels like a kiss, a breath, a burn, a sting. It can whisper or whistle or roar, bend and break and inflate. It can be harnessed, but never stopped or contained; its effects observed while its essence remains unseen. To chase the wind is folly, they say, to try and tame it the very definition of futility. "The wind blows wherever it pleases," Jesus said. "You hear its sound, but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So it is with everyone born of the Spirit" (John 3:8). We are born into a windy world, where the Spirit is steady as a breeze and as strong as a hurricane. There is no city, no village, no wilderness where you cannot find it, so pay attention." (Searching for Sunday: loving, leaving, and finding the church, 196)

May this Pentecost find you paying attention to the movement of God's spirit when your routine moves around you.

Pentecost

Pentecost Sunday represents an ending as well as a beginning: the end of the "Great Fifty Days" of the Easter Season (Pentecost means "the 50th day" in Greek) and the beginning of the commemorations of the early church. Pentecost also gives us an opportunity to ask ourselves the question, "What is our community 'on fire' about?" We are passionate about Opening our hearts to Jesus, Growing in our Faith, and Serving our World!

For the early church, Pentecost was the second most important part of the Christian year after Pascha or Easter. Originally, it commemorated both the Ascension of Jesus and the descending of the Holy Spirit, but became two distinct celebrations by the end of the fourth century. (As Christianity became legal, there was no reason not to have as many celebrations as possible.)

Pentecost also became a favorite time for baptisms with its focus on the work of the Holy Spirit within the church and within our lives. The holy day continues to be a wonderful celebrative time for rites of passage including baptism, confirmation and the reception of new members. Every other year, we celebrate Confirmation. This year, we will receive new members and baptize new ones in the faith! The Holy Spirit is moving among us!

Roberts Park UMC Member Celebrates 100th Birthday with Reaffirmation of Baptism

Betty Johnson, a lifelong member of Roberts Park UMC in Indianapolis, Indiana, chose to celebrate her 100th birthday on Sunday, March 18, with a service of reaffirmation of her baptism. In 1918, Betty was baptized in the same sanctuary in which her reaffirmation service, led by Rev. Dr. Andrew Scanlan-Holmes, was held during morning worship.

In a clear and confident voice, Betty shared her profession of faith and continued to say that she has traveled a path with God for 100 years and is ready to travel forward into new life with Him whenever He calls. She believes her faith has taught her to be loving and gracious to everyone, and she has been inspired throughout her life by her family and her church.

To commemorate this event and honor Betty's life and witness, Rev. Dr. Scanlan-Holmes also announced the dedication of an engraved traveling baptismal font and consecrated it during the service. Following a congregational response, Betty drew water from the new font and crossed herself as a sign of her reaffirmation. A reception attended by over 200 family members and friends was held in Fellowship Hall following the service.

Ask, and the Door will be Opened *Matthew 7:7*

I grew up in a non-religious family – I had a Jewish, non-religious lawyer as a father, my Mom was Episcopalian, sang in the choir, but rarely spoke about religion. That was something not done by social-climbing types. Two of my siblings became atheist, and the other Christian.

The mystery of childbirth and having 3 sons brought us to our church at age 48, in 1997. I was not brought up in kindness and love, but nor was I abused or treated badly in any way. My mom once told me, when I told her I wasn't able to relate well as a child, "I didn't know how to relate to you". This made perfect sense. I felt pretty much empty, in a world of snotty kids in a nose-turned-up school, all competing to be wittier than the rest, in the "neat guys" group. From that start, I can say it is a long way to get back to a sense of identity. I know, it was "all somebody else's fault". But that was my life.

When I meet a person who is inspiring to me– in friendship, lifestyle, or as a role model – I must listen, learn, and follow – to seek out what is special in that person. This happened to me 20 years ago, when I met Mel Leaman. Mel became our pastor. How could he have remembered my name after meeting me once, 5 years before? Mel, like God, was, and is, kind and does not judge. He recognized my personhood. His tutorship and his class curricula and reading suggestions, led me to research the works of people who have helped me understand far more deeply the heart from which Jesus acted out his relationship with God and his social world and how he would have me act in the present world. But I must say God is far more patient with me than I am with myself.

The people I am finding in my spiritual journey are those who put their actions where their mouth is – Walter Wink, Trevor Hudson, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Richard Rohr, Carl Jung. Through Richard Rohr, I have been able to be present to my God in contemplation, while relinquishing my need to control everything (when I speak of my God, I speak of MY God – the one who made me as an unique creation in his/her image.) Carl Jung has allowed me to see the folly in turning away from the dark things in life – the things we have been unable to bear the weight of, which must remain in the unconscious parts of ourselves until we are ready. Trevor Hudson, in "A Mile in My Shoes", speaks of the value of suffering: "A change needs to be brought about within us that we ourselves cannot bring about...we discover that God meets us in our place of deepest broken-ness, accepts us as we are, and offers us with crucified hands the gifts of grace and mercy." This is the inner part. But he says we must also be with those who suffer: "When these painful realities [discovering the reasons for deep suffering] assume a human face to whom we can put a name and to whose story we can listen, a meeting of human hearts takes place... we discover that those present call forth the gifts that only our hearts can give.

Back to this sense of identity – We happen to live in a country and culture which has not addressed the deep dehumanization of an entire race over four centuries, and consequentially many races and cultures have felt, and continue to feel, dehumanized by the "majority". This makes it very difficult to allow a person to feel "at home". The awareness of this is central to the target of my life – which is to be a part of something which does feel like home.

Through the seeking, and the love and forgiveness I experience through my wife, who sees my many disconnects I am continually brought back to some normalcy and peace. She is peace and beauty to me, often when I need it the most. We in this country and time, have experienced so much more peace and safety than most of the world's inhabitants. Yet when I say "we", I must admit that it does not include all of our country's citizens. Is this the road to the greatest character? Not being in dire need is, I think, to my detriment, and I regard it as perhaps my greatest enemy to doing the things that make for true peace – peace with justice. I pray that I may no longer resist the need to enter these spaces, these places which call to me without my hearing. O God, allow me to hear the voices of the voiceless, to mingle with them, and to act.



over a lifetime.*


*That's just to get started.

Don't Fry Day

Millions of Americans will enjoy the great outdoors this weekend. Skin cancer, caused by too much sun, is the most common of all cancers in the United States. More people will be diagnosed with skin cancer this year than breast, prostate, lung, and colon cancer combined.

The National Council on Skin Cancer Prevention reminds you to enjoy the outdoors safely. We have named the Friday before Memorial Day Don't Fry Day. In the same way we teach kids to wear bike helmets, we can also teach them to wear wide-brimmed hats.

What You Can Do to Be Safe in the Sun:

1. **Do Not Burn**—Overexposure to the sun is the most preventable risk factor for skin cancer.
2. **Avoid Sun Tanning and Tanning Beds**—Ultraviolet (UV) light from tanning beds and the sun causes skin cancer and wrinkling. If you want to look like you've been in the sun, use a sunless self-tanning product instead.
3. **Cover Up**—Wear protective clothing, such as a long-sleeved shirt, pants, a wide-brimmed hat, and sunglasses, where possible.
4. **Seek Shade/Use Umbrellas**—Seek shade when appropriate. Remember that the sun's UV rays are strongest between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
5. **Generously Apply Sunscreen**—Generously apply sunscreen to all exposed skin using a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 30 that provides broad-spectrum protection from both UVA and UVB rays. Reapply every two hours, even on cloudy days, and after swimming or sweating.
6. **Use Extra Caution Near Water, Snow and Sand**—Water, snow and sand reflect the damaging rays of the sun, which can increase your chance of sunburn.
7. **Check the UV Index**—The UV Index provides important information to help you plan your outdoor activities in ways that prevent overexposure to the sun. Developed by the National Weather Service (NWS) and EPA, you can find the UV Index for your area online at: <http://www.epa.gov/sunwise/uvindex.html>.
8. **Get Vitamin D Safely**—Get vitamin D safely through a diet that includes vitamin supplements and foods fortified with vitamin D. Don't seek the sun or indoor tanning.

STATISTICAL REPORT

Baptisms, Baptized Members, and Constituents

In 2016, five children under the age 12 were baptized. In 2017, two children were baptized, and they were cousins! In 2016, we had no baptism of those over the age of 13. In 2017, we celebrated an adult baptism! Baptism is for all ages. Baptism is God's gift to us offered without price. We give thanks to those of all ages who celebrate Baptism. Talk to Pastor Monica if you would like to talk about Baptism.

In 2016, we tallied 202 baptized members who are not yet, full members. This describes most commonly children, who have not gone through confirmation. In 2017, that number increased to 250. We look forward to engaging our children in continuing faith formation!

What is a constituency roll?

This ranges widely! In an era in which joining the church is not as common as it has been in times gone, many people have become an active part of church community without officially joining our membership rolls. A constituent might be in worship every week or never be in the church.

Officially, a constituent is a person who is not a member of the church, but for whom the church has pastoral responsibility. If the person is hospitalized, dies, desires pastoral support, if it is someone at this church, then this church has pastoral responsibilities for this person. The person may or may not attend church on Sunday morning, may attend a weekday class or outreach program, may be related to a church Member or Constituent, may spend summers or winters in town, may be in town for school, or else wise, the person is a constituent member of the church.

This is the first year, we looked seriously at how we counted our constituency roll. Last year, we counted 384 persons. This year, we counted 1,652 persons. West Grove cares for many in our community as a community church.

Next month, we will take a look at all Christian Education programming.

EASTERN PENNSYLVANIA CONFERENCE NEWS

Annual Conference to Vote on 27 Resolutions

Members of the 2018 Eastern PA Annual Conference will consider and vote on 27 resolutions. They are being printed for distribution at the four District Conferences on Sunday, May 6, where members will get a preview of matters to come before Annual Conference, June 14-16.

The diverse resolutions range from proposed changes in conference rules and financial policies, to supporting racial-ethnic justice and missional concerns, to advocating against assault weapons and the offensive use of Native American team names and mascots in sports. Two resolutions address The United Methodist Church's "Way Forward," as it considers, during a Special General Conference in 2019, whether or not to change church laws prohibiting LGBTQ members' participation in pastoral ministry and marriage within the church.

A key pair of resolutions from the Council on Finance & Administration (CFA) proposes cancelling churches' unpaid "prior-years' balances" of apportionments and certain other billings, as of the end of 2017.

Another financial resolution proposes a new special

offering to aid the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico in its recovery from 2017's devastating Hurricane Maria.

The Committee on Native American Ministries asks the Annual Conference to "demonstrate commitment to continuing the journey begun at the 2016 Act of Repentance and to 'stand in solidarity with American Indians.'" by seeking "support for the elimination of logos, mascots and names demeaning to Native Americans by schools, colleges, and professional sports teams", and urging public advocacy to protect sacred Indian sites and reverse recent White House decisions to reduce the size of national monuments on public lands.

A resolution on gun violence asks to affirm the resolve of General Conference 2016 and its Resolution 3428 "Our Call to End Gun Violence" and to support members working to "Demand the Ban" and make deadly assault-style weapons illegal.

Other resolutions propose moving the conference's health insurance coverage to Wespath's HealthFlex program, approving changes in equitable compensation for pastors in economically disadvantaged churches, and changes in housing allowances for retired and disabled clergy.
