"When Jesus arrived, he saw this huge crowd. At the sight of them, his heart broke—like sheep with no shepherd they were. He went right to work teaching them." Mark 6: 34 (Message paraphrase)

In this season of Lent, we have been walking with Jesus in taking on love. We have been hearing him teach on the Sermon on the Mount along with disciples, followers, and the curious. Those who were hungry and

grumbling listened right alongside those who were cajoled into coming by their friends and family members. Jesus did not distinguish his teaching or compassion. He invited all of them into a transformed way of living of heart and community.

On Saturday March 23rd, I joined a group of about 100 people who participated in the Poverty Simulation hosted by the Constellation at Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. I was so glad that 8 folks from our church joined me there as well. These persons were from many of our partner churches and social service agencies across Southern Chester County and Delaware. We were grouped into family groups or individuals and given a individual and profile to live into for 4-15 minute weeks. Our goal was to have food, shelter, and utilities. This Poverty Simulation was designed by the Minnesota Community Action Partnership and facilitated by the Chester County Office of Community Development. Its purpose is designed to help audiences begin to understand what it might be like to live in a typical low-income family trying to survive from month to month. It is a simulation, not a game.

During the 2 1/2-hour simulation, the object is to sensitize audiences to the realities faced by low-income people. In the simulation, 44 to 82 participants assume the roles of up to 26 different families facing poverty. Some families are newly unemployed, some are recently deserted by the "breadwinner," some are homeless, and others are recipients of TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, formerly AFDC), either with or without additional earned income. Still others are senior citizens receiving Disability or Retirement or grandparents raising their grandchildren. The task of the "families" is to provide for basic necessities and shelter during the course of four 15-minute "weeks."

I was a part of 5 person family with a mother, father and 3 children, aged 16, 10, and 8. As the 39 year mom with a steady job as receptionist, I went each day for 8 minutes to work. The father just lost his job when the company folded, continued to "search" for work. In the third of 4 week, he was able to find work. The oldest daughter, 16 was pregnant and without health insurance, even though, I, the mother carried, insurance for myself. There were community resources available for the children's insurance, but we had to determine how to use them. Despite the best efforts of myself, the father, and the oldest daughter who sought to get resources, our family was ultimately evicted. We could not

keep our house. We relied on our kids to get food. The utilities being paid were unhelpful in a house that we no longer had.

The "family group" initially drafted a budget and wrote out a plan. We were level head and believed we had all the skills necessary to address the crisis ahead of us. We came to understand that there were some larger systematic changes needed. As our hearts beat in our chests, frustration of agencies closing due to being understaffed, and exploitation from payday loans came into effect, additional insights came into focus. The call to take on love is action for our feet. In order to love all of God's people, there is work for us to do with our neighbors. When I went to "work" in the simulation, some of these facts were part of our discovery:

- Did you know that Chester County is the 35th wealthiest county in the country?
- Did you know that the median household income of over \$90,000?
- Did you know poverty level for a family of four is \$24,300 for a family of four?
- Did you know in Chester County, about 20% of school-age children qualify for the Free or Reduced School Meal Program?
- Did you know for Kennett school district 40% of our school age children qualify for the Free or Reduced School Meal Program? ,
- Did you know for Oxford school district over 50% of our school age qualify for the Free or Reduced School Meal Program?
- Did you know for Avon Grove school district just under 30%our school age qualify for the Free or Reduced School Meal Program?

Did you the Chester County Food Bank estimates that of all the families in Chester County who are considered "food insecure," only 44% of them qualify for the SNAP program, otherwise known as Food Stamps. That means that over half of the families in our county struggling with access to adequate nutrition have to find other ways to meet their family's nutritional needs.

As we study the scriptures, we learn more about the context of Jesus' day and our own. We learn that when we are called to take on love, in the prayers of our hands and the actions of our feet. Like Jesus, we feed others (Keep on bringing in for the food pantry and working for changing in SNAP and WIC). Like Jesus, we work together to restore God's way of justice (Learn more to be an advocate for justice).

Let us walk this Holy Week together with Jesus, who invites to pray, to act, and to give our lives to follow him.

Pastor's Desk

DISCIPLE BIBLE STUDY

In March 1986, a small group of people gathered in Flower Mound, Texas, to talk about the need for a new comprehensive Bible study that would do more than teach the facts about our Scriptures. They wanted a study that would help people place themselves within the narrative of the Scriptures, develop a conversation with the Scriptures, and find their personal meaning for life in the Scriptures. Beyond that, they wanted a Bible study that would help persons grow in faith as they lived out a life of discipleship among the people of God.

DISCIPLE Bible Study was the result of those conversations. The plan called for a small group of people (modeled after Jesus Christ's twelve

disciples) to spend 34 weeks intensively studying the entire 66 books of the Bible, with daily readings from the Bible, prayer, lessons in a Study Manual, and a weekly gathering for two and a half hours. Church governing boards would need to approve the program, teachers would have to be specially trained, and students would pledge their commitment. Over 20 years later, we continue to teach this model because of the elasticity this book, the Bible. Join us as we dive into the Bible!

Small groups forming now to begin the first week of May. A cohort is forming around Sunday afternoon and a weekday evening. Please see Pastor Monica with your interest and availability. I can't wait to dive into God's word with you!

UPDATE FROM PASTOR JIM



LOVE GARDENING? BE A COMMUNITY GARDEN MANAGER

The Trustees are looking for an interested individual(s) to manage or supervise the Community Garden Plots. Responsibilities would be keeping the Trustees informed of progress & needs, assignment of plots to individual or groups, checking to make make sure "gardeners" plant in timely fashion, water, weed, & harvest their plots. You do not need to "garden a plot yourself but can if you so choose. You may use the guidelines & instructions of a former manager or create your own plan of action.

The idea behind the Community Gardens was to raise fresh produce for the community food cupboards. Persons or groups may still do that or raise fresh produce for themselves.

The raised beds are falling in disrepair from lack of use. Unless we find interested gardeners or manager, the Trustees will not replace them & they will be removed entirely. This would allow us to maintain the area more efficiently. The Trustees hearts is to see the ministry continue but without someone to take on this responsibility, we do not see any other option.



THE ARCH OF JUSTICE

According to the Visitor's Center at the "St. Louis Arch" National Park, this city has always been "the gateway to the west." The earliest major trails that settlers used to travel to points west went through St. Louis, Missouri.

This "Show-Me State" metropolis is also known for some strategic and historic court cases during the 19th century. One was the case of Dred Scott (1799-1858), a slave who petitioned the court for his freedom in 1847. Scott won his freedom, only to face numerous appeals trials that eventually landed in the U.S. Supreme Court. The justices ruled that slaves were "property" and had no right to file lawsuits in courts. Scott and his wife Harriet were sent back into bondage. But in the years that followed, they returned to that same courthouse and were finally emancipated in 1857.

Another historic case in St. Louis dealt with the issue of women's suffrage. Virginia Minor (1824-1894) sued the state in 1874 for the right to vote according to the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. She was denied, and her petition also ended up at the Supreme Court, where the decision of the lower courts was upheld. Sadly, Minor never lived to see the passage of the 19th Amendment that finally gave women the right to vote in 1920. However, her valiant efforts were part of the movement that eventually gave equal rights to women at the voting polls.

The General Conference of The United Methodist Church met in St. Louis February 23-26 for an historic special, called session. The order of business was to decide whether to retain or remove two of the denomination's bans: one on hosting or officiating at same-gender weddings; and the other on ordaining self-avowed, practicing homosexual clergy.

For two and a half years a carefully chosen, inclusive group of 32 United Methodists from all over the globe gathered nine times to find A Way Forward for the church. They finally presented three possible plans for consideration: the One Church Plan, the Connectional Church Plan and the Traditional Plan.

The Council of Bishops overwhelmingly supported the One Church Plan. However, the decision was in the hands of the 833 voting delegates to this worldwide assembly.

Their gathering began with a spirited day of prayer, then a day of legislative committee work and finally a day of plenary voting. The voting process was confusing, to say the least, with many amendments and points of order and rulings from the denomination's top court, the Judicial Council.

In the end, the international body of conservative, moderate and progressive members voted by a narrow margin to support the Traditional Plan. This plan maintains our current policy that does not allow people who are self-avowed, practicing homosexuals to be ordained ministers and does not permit our pastors to perform, nor our churches to host, same-gender weddings or holy unions.

Some enforcements to the church's current Book of Discipline were also added in this plan. The full Traditional Plan is now in the hands of the Judicial Council to be vetted for constitutionality.

Some petitions have already been ruled as unconstitutional, but time and the tedium of

Parliamentary Procedure did not allow for much correction. The Judicial Council will rule on which parts remain valid at their April 23-25 meeting.

There is deep disappointment and hurt in the LGBTQIA+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex, Asexual+) community and among their family, friends and supporters at this time.

Hundreds of people came to St. Louis to advocate for the One Church Plan. It would have removed the restrictive language in the Book of Discipline and allowed pastors, churches, Boards of Ordained Ministry and Annual Conferences to act out of their conscience on these matters. In addition, over 15,000 young adult United Methodists signed a petition imploring the church to begin to open the doors to the LGBTQIA+ community. I encourage you to remember them in your prayers and reach out to offer them comfort, conversation and encouragement.

After General Conference ended, I looked up and saw the Arch, this huge stainless-steel tourist attraction, built in 1965, that reminds us about our history of western expansion. St. Louis' slogan is "Still Moving On."

Likewise, the church is still moving on in mission and ministry for Jesus Christ. Nothing can stop the church from evangelizing and doing the work of Christ. People of goodwill who believe differently about the important issues voted on at General Conference are and should be "still moving on" together to reach and help heal a hurting, broken world. We still have a "charge to keep and a God to glorify!"

St. Louis' Old Courthouse, the scene of historic legal battles against oppression and for civil rights, is now a museum located fittingly next to the Gateway Arch. The two should inspire in us another message for those whose hearts are grieving at this time. The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. once famously said, "The Arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice."

The gleaming St. Louis Arch also bends toward justice. Dred and Harriet Scott were eventually freed from slavery. Women finally got the right to vote. Some important, lasting moments in history happened right there in this gateway city.

Here and now, during our winter of discontent, something important and lasting happened in The United Methodist Church as well. We will never be the same.

I believe with all my heart that eventually The United Methodist Church will become a welcoming and affirming denomination in ministry with the LGBTQIA+ community. Like the arc of justice, the wait is long, and the struggle can last a long, long time.

Habakkuk 2:3 says "For still the vision awaits its appointed time; it hastens to the end, it will not lie. If it seems slow, wait for it, it will surely come, it will not delay."

The temptation for many is to give up. But I implore the church to continue the work of relationship-building and holy conversation and fervent prayer, until there is a new day. Then the consciences of all will be respected and the lives of all will be welcomed as no longer strangers in God's household.

UMCOR GRANTS AID INITIAL CYCLONE RESPONSE

United Methodists are starting to respond to those affected by Cyclone Idai, which left devastation in parts of three African countries and killed 500 people, with hundreds more still missing.

The United Methodist Committee on Relief has allocated three \$10,000 grants for immediate, emergency short-term funding to meet basic human needs in Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Malawi. Those needs include water transportation and storage for drinking, cooking and personal and domestic hygiene, along with temporary shelter.

Cyclone Idai made landfall near Beira, the fourth-largest city in Mozambique, on March 14. Over the next week, Idai left a path of destruction in Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Malawi.

High levels of poverty in the region make the cyclone's impact much worse, said Isabel Apawo Phiri, one of the top executives of the World Council of Churches, who was born in Malawi.

Thousands of families in the Sofala, Zambézia, Manica and Inhambane provinces of Mozambique are among the displaced.

Respeito Chirrinze, UMCOR's disaster management coordinator in Mozambique, told United Methodist News Service that the \$10,000 grant would help meet needs in the communities in Nicoadala and Gondola. "Because there is aid being channeled to Sofala and Manica, many nonprofit organizations seem to be forgetting other areas where people are isolated but in need of assistance, too," he said.

A campaign for donations has been launched throughout The United Methodist Church in the Mozambique Episcopal Area, Chirrinze noted.

"People in the affected areas have no potable water, so we need water purifiers, we need mosquito nets, we need medicine, we need school supplies, we need everything — including funds that will enable us purchase those items that we cannot bring from our own home," he said.

But assessing both immediate and long-term needs is difficult, especially with communication systems weak or inoperable.

"It is estimated that more than 347,000 people are at risk because some are in isolated areas, others on trees, some because they have not been eating for many days," Chirrinze said. "People are surviving under inhuman conditions," he added.

At the bishop's office, all conference officers decided to donate 10 percent of their salaries in March to support the needs of the survivors. At Malanga United Methodist Church, an inner-city congregation in Maputo, the Mozambique Christian Council will hold a solidarity worship service on March 22 and those attending will bring items to support those in affected areas.

The United Methodist Church in Zimbabwe "has responded wholesomely" to the crisis, said the Rev. Alan Masimba Gurupira, assistant to Bishop Eben K. Nhiwatiwa. The UMCOR grant "will go a long way to respond towards provision of temporary shelter, food and water supplies," he added.

DEACONESS MOVEMENT AT HARRIS MEMORIAL COLLEGE

In Romans 16, the apostle Paul encouraged the early Christians to welcome "Phoebe, a deacon of the church at Cenchreae" and to "help her in whatever she may require from you."

In today's United Methodist Church, Phoebe would be considered a deaconess, a laywoman called by God to full-time vocation in ministries of love, justice and service. The deaconess movement — which Phoebe unwittingly began — is flourishing in the Philippines.

Simultaneous with the birth of the institution was the modern-day birth of the deaconess movement, which began with a small group of young women who usually taught music and hygiene, especially to children. As more women

committed their lives to this vocation, their numbers grew, and their ministries became more diverse and dynamic.

Often, candidates enter Harris right out of high school. Each must write a personal narrative of why she wants to become a deaconess. All incoming students receive need-based partial or full financial scholarships. The school's deaconess program offers bachelor's degrees in elementary and early childhood education and Christian education.

Deaconesses model Jesus' ministries: teaching, preaching and reaching out to people, especially those who are less privileged. In public and private institutions, they serve as kindergarten teachers, Christian educators, curriculum writers, guidance counselors, music ministers, youth directors and more.
