1 Corinthians 1: 4-9

On Martin Luther King, Jr. day, I gathered with community leaders at the MLK CommUNITY breakfast in Kennett Square. With the recitations and readings of his works, I was reminded of a section from Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s speech on the steps of the State Capitol in Montgomery, Alabama, after the successful completion of the Selma to Montgomery March on March 25, 1965:

"I know you are asking today, "How long will it take?" (Speak, sir) Somebody's asking, "How long will prejudice blind the visions of [men], darken their understanding, and drive bright-eyed wisdom from her sacred throne?..."

How long? Not long, because no lie can live forever...

How long? Not long, because the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice."

In the face of oppositional adversity, "How long?" was the question for the speaker of the morning, Rev. Dr. Harold Dean Trulear who spoke on "Building a Beloved Community in the Face of Adversity"

Dr. Trulear told this poignant story of Rev. Dr. Howard Thurman, mentor to MLK, Jr, who grew up with his loving faith-filled grandmother in Daytona Beach. His family moved into the neighborhood, and the white family next door was filled with hate and opposition to their new neighbors. The mother had her son scrap the chicken manure out of the chicken coop and on to the backyard of the Thurmans.

Sometime later, that same woman became quite ill. Mrs. Thurman, being a loving woman of faith, made chicken soup and brought cut red roses to her neighbor.

Her neighbor was so touched. And as she thanked Mrs. Thurman, she couldn't help but ask about the roses. "Did you grow them?" As Mrs. Thurman responded in the affirmative she continued, "These roses are beautiful. How did you get the stems to grow so long as green? And how did you get the flowers to grow so red and full?"

Mrs Thurman said, "You remember that chicken manure you dumped in my backyard? You intended it for bad, but the God I serve saw that as fertilizer. And that God told me to take that which you had thrust in my direction, and to overcome it with something good to bring in your direction."


Are you saddened by the hate, violence, and disregard for life in our world?


WoRM Unit: Fruits of the Spirit January 5- February 23

Boy Scout Corner - Troop 12 holds Court of Honor for its Third Eagle

Boy Scout Troop 12 was founded in 2013 when several cub scouts from the same pack crossed over and decided to form their own troop here at West Grove United Methodist Church. These boys have the distinction of being "founders" as designated by a patch sewn on the left sleeve of their uniforms just underneath the troop numerals. Many of these same boys have stayed with the troop and have advanced up through the ranks

from Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life and for some now Eagle. In August of 2018, Troop 12 held its first Eagle Court of Honor for one of these founding scouts, Nathaniel Krinnock. In September of last year Troop 12 awarded its 2nd Eagle to another of its founding scouts, John Yaletchko and on Sunday

January 12 of this year Troop 12 held its third Eagle Court of Honor for Jackson May, also a founder. (See the attached photos) Eagle Scout is the highest rank attainable in the Boy Scouts of America. Since scouting in America began back in 1911, only about 4% of boys who enter the program have earned this rank. A scout has to progress up through the ranks, lead by example and demonstrate proficiency in a number of skills. In addition to 21 merit badges, of which 13 are specifically required, he must put in many hours of service including an "Eagle Project", two of which are in evidence here at our church. These young men are to be congratulated for this great achievement.

There is a partnership between the Boy Scouts of America and the Methodist Church that dates back 100 hundred years when on February 12, 1920 an agreement was signed formalizing this relationship. Boy Scout Sunday will be celebrated this year on Sunday, February 9th, when not only will the scouts be celebrating their founding here in America which dates back to 1911, but we as a church can celebrate 100 years of what has been a great and lasting partnership. Troop 12 meets most every Thursday night in room 5. Troop 12 invites you to stop by and check out the wall that has its rank board with the names of all scouts and their current rank as well as the very busy bulletin board of its many activities and events.

WEST GROVE UMC FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Good News! We are happy to report that our church finances for the month of December and for the year 2019 ended with a surplus.

In December, we received income of \$60,986 and incurred \$54,340 of expenses resulting in an excess of cash received over expenses in the amount of \$6,646. December's positive cash flow came primarily from strong offerings.

For the year ended December 31, 2019, we received total income of \$416,956 and incurred total expenses of \$404,141 resulting in an excess of cash received over expenses in the amount of \$12,815. This surplus came about from a combination of careful expense management and the receipt of significant gifts throughout the year.

The above results take into account the payment of ALL our apportionments for 2019. We are currently paid up in FULL.

We note that our budget for 2020 projects a potential deficit (as did 2019) of \$51,848. This includes the full apportionment expense of \$62,938 for 2020. Income only includes regular projected offerings without accounting for possible special gifts during the year.

The Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace through Separation Agreement:

"It's Not a Done Deal" by Bishop Peggy A. Johnson

Eastern Pennsylvania and Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conferences

January 4, 2020

The people called United Methodists have been on a long journey of conversation and debate regarding human sexuality: specifically the marriage and ordination of homosexual people and what "the practice of homosexuality being contrary to Christian teaching" means. The Protocol Statement that was released on January 3, 2020 seems to be a significant break-through in this 47 year impasse. It was crafted by a diverse group of 16 key United Methodist leaders along with a professional mediator. My deepest appreciation goes to them for this faithful and courageous work.

This was initiated by Bishop John Yambasu, from the Sierra Leone Annual Conference in July 2019. He yearned for the United Methodist Church to remain a denomination in the midst of much talk of schism and the many unhappy conversations after the 2019 General Conference that included blame and shame. This group of 16 continued to meet throughout the fall and the Protocol statement that was just issued will go to General Conference. It must also be considered by Judicial Council (constitutional legality), the General Commission on Finance and Administration (financial impacts) and the Commission on General Conference (logistics and scheduling). It is important to note that this must be approved by the delegates of General Conference (May 5-15, 2020 in Minneapolis, MN) for this to become a reality. This Protocol still needs to be written into legislation form and presented to the delegates. So it is not a done deal! My email inbox was flooded yesterday by numerous concerned pastors and laity and I was interviewed by three newspapers. The major concern was the same: The UMC has split!! Not so! Please tell people this is not a done deal!

This Protocol is significant, ground breaking, and has the potential to accomplish much good. Among the components of this protocol are:

- The moratorium on all complaints and trials with regard to homosexuality between now and the General Conference.
- It keeps the Global UMC intact. The plan is to have the UMC be organized in regions that will determine their way of living with regard to paragraphs regarding homosexuality.
- It allows the Traditional churches to leave with their assets and be able to create their own denomination. A sum of \$25 million dollars will be paid over the next 4 years toward this end. As a result, there will be no court battles over property matters.
- It sets aside \$39 million dollars from both the UMC and the Traditionalist denomination for reparations in acknowledgement of the harm done to people of color during past changes in structure and system. These funds are to support programs, training and agency work to ensure the health and vitality of our ethnic constituencies going forward.
- It also sets aside \$2 million dollars for any future denomination that might want to also be developed.
- It ensures that clergy will still keep their pensions as everyone will continue to have Wespath Pension services.
- It allows for Disaffiliation for churches that wish to go on their own. However they must follow the Disciplinary paragraphs regarding this process.

All of this takes a very long time and with the Protocols are time-lines and benchmarks that will spin out for at least the next four years. So it is not a done deal even at the close of General Conference. (There will likely be amendments and changes to the plan if it does pass so it will not look exactly like the statement we have before us.)

What do we do in the meantime?

- Dispel any rumors that we have already "split" as a denomination.
- Continue to follow the news articles about the developments with the Protocols (umc.org).
- Attend the General Conference delegate listening sessions that will be happening this spring.
- Continue with the ministry and mission of the church. Make disciples! Be the presence of Christ's love in this world.
- Most importantly PRAY. Pray for the United Methodist Church and its witness to the world. It is my hope that moving forward what we decide at General Conference will ultimately multiply our witness and we will be poised to reach more and more people for Jesus Christ.

I do offer a personal lament at this time. Being who I am, with the image of the "Body of Christ" as a central part of my theology and heart, it is important for me to offer my thought that with a divided body we will be less whole. A denomination or any church that separates over their understanding of God's truth has left itself without the possibility of more understanding and growth. We can only mature spiritually and personally by the refining fire of discourse and collective prayer with those with whom we disagree. When we go to our respective "corners" I believe we will soon discover that we are "less than" we could be without the other.

However, having struggled together for 47 years, it is likely a season for this Protocol to be enacted for many practical and important reasons. Our witness has taken a serious hit as people from the outside see us as a warring body and much ministry time has been spent engaging in disagreeable conversations. May there come a day when we get back together, we people called Methodists. Just as the Apostle Paul apparently reconciled with John Mark (II Timothy 4:11) after separating from Barnabas over a dispute that had something to do with Mark's desertion (Acts 15:37), I am hopeful that we too can find our way back together in the future.

EASTERN PA CONFERENCE NEWS



Bishop Peggy Johnson is asking members and friends of the Eastern PA Conference to offer heartfelt prayers as they learn and share the latest news about Puerto Rico's continuing onslaught of earthquakes. A 5.9 magnitude quake struck the island on Saturday morning, Jan. 11, following the stronger 6.4 magnitude one last Tuesday. Aftershocks have been continuous.

Bishop Johnson also appeals to us all to please support the relief efforts of UMCOR (UM Committee on Relief) and its Methodist Church of Puerto Rico partner agency, REHACE, by donating funds now to **Advance #901670**. Saturday morning's earthquake struck

southwestern Puerto Rico again but shook nearly the entire island. While there were no reported casualties, there were more landslides and damage to homes and businesses. More than 2,000 tremors have occurred since December 28.

Four thousand residents are still in shelters, and thousands more are living outside, afraid to enter or remain in their homes, for fear of more destructive quakes. Puerto Ricans reportedly are waiting to see if President Donald Trump will sign a major disaster declaration to authorize much-needed aid to this beleaguered U.S. territory.

Also, while FEMA has been working there, the island hasn't received more than \$18 billion in federal funding that was designated after hurricanes there more than two years ago, according to the Washington Post. We will collecting this special offering to go directly to our neighbors in Puerto Rico over the next four weeks. Thank you for giving generously.

The World is Growing!

The U.S.'s majority status in The United Methodist Church is coming to an end — and may be there already. That's according to projections from the denomination's General Council on Finance and Administration — based on the continuing decline in U.S. membership as much as growth in Africa.

According to the agency's forecast, total membership in the central conferences — church regions in Africa, the Philippines and Europe — will exceed that of the U.S. jurisdictions in 2020. "Based on trends that have occurred over the last several years, we are annually averaging a decline of 2.0% overall for the jurisdictional membership," Kevin Dunn, the agency's director of data services, told the GCFA board at its November meeting.

"We may fall below 6 million (U.S.) members by 2025." It's a significant development for a church whose governance and history have both helped shape and been shaped by the United States, where the denomination got its start in 1784. Dunn said the U.S. decline has largely resulted from members' deaths — people leaving The United Methodist Church for the church triumphant. Dunn noted that United Methodist numbers are in keeping with overall U.S. religious trends. In October, Pew Research Center reported losses across Christian groups while showing the religiously unaffiliated rising to more than a quarter of U.S. adults. Even with shrinking U.S. rolls, The United Methodist Church is still the country's third largest denomination — behind the Catholic Church and Southern Baptist Convention. The most recent data



GCFA actually has on hand is the U.S. membership and attendance figures for 2018. Unequal infrastructure and technology typically mean that membership reports are usually out of sync between the U.S. and the rest of the globe. On its website, umdata.org, the agency reports the U.S. church had just under 6.7 million members at

the end of 2018 — down from about 6.8 million in 2017. In the U.S., average weekly attendance was under 2.5 million in 2018, a decline of about 3.6% from the previous year.

The agency's most recent data for the central conferences is from 2017, when the denomination counted more than 6.4 million members in Africa, Europe and the Philippines. That's up from about 5.7 million members in 2015. However, the central conference total comes with an asterisk. On its data services website, GCFA notes that the 2017 numbers reflect the most recent submitted. Where conferences have not reported any new data, the agency carries over numbers from previous reporting. The story of the church in the U.S. is not strictly one of decline. "We have some good news," Dunn said. "Our Hispanic and multiracial growth has consistently been trending upwards 2% to 3% (a year) in each category." Between 2009 and 2018, the number of U.S. members identifying as multiracial increased from 45,955 to 68,029. In the same period, the number of Hispanic United Methodists has grown from 68,088 to 80,968.
