I don’t expect many of us will be visited one night by an angel. Yet there will be many, many other ways that God is reaching out to empower us. Each of us have been entrusted with the life of faith in our day, the life of Christ on earth, and we all have unique and important ways to share him. 
Special Congratulations

Boy Scout Troop 12 hold its 5th Eagle Court of Honor



On Saturday, December 5th, Boy Scout Troop 12 held its 5th Eagle Court of Honor at the church for Dylan Huss. Although attendance had to be limited, masks worn and social distancing observed, these measures did not dampen or otherwise detract from the spirit and full meaning of the occasion. Since its founding nearly 8 years ago, Troop 12 has seen 5 of its scouts achieve the rank of Eagle, an admirable achievement in its own right. Of those 5 scouts, 4 were founding members:

Nathaniel Krinnock, John Yaletchko, Jackson May and Alex Wilson. Dylan is the first boy to earn Eagle who joined after the troop was founded back in 2013. One of the requirements for Eagle that weighs heavily at his Board of Review, is a service project in which the scout demonstrates initiative, planning, organization, and leadership. He is also responsible for raising the funds necessary to cover the cost of his project. In addition, the eagle candidate is encouraged to seek advice and guidance from adults, especially in areas of expertise that might prove critical to the success of his project. Three of these projects have directly benefitted the church. Dylan's "eagle" project was the newly paved walkway from the parking lot to the back entrance to the church office, a much needed improvement in terms of safety and accessibility. During the award ceremony the scout usually recognizes the one adult who was most prominent in helping him along his journey to Eagle by awarding a gold Mentor pin. Dylan chose to recognize and thank two adults for this honor, scoutmaster Steve May and Gene Aucott. There is a picture somewhere that shows Gene on his hands and knees with Dylan and two other scouts watching intently as he shows the boys how to properly trowel the freshly poured concrete. As we congratulate Dylan for this fine achievement, let us not forget those who have unselfishly given of their time and talent and helped out along the way.



Boy Scout Troop Celebrates 8 Years and Pays Tribute to Scoutmaster Steve May



As mentioned in October's Newsletter, Troop 12 will not re-charter for 2021 and will cease to be an active boy scout troop as of December 31st. Troop 12 was founded back in April of 2013 when a core group of cub scouts crossed over and under the leadership of several adults decided to form their own troop. Steve May has faithfully served as its one and only scoutmaster since its founding. During its nearly 8 years of existence, more than 46 boys have passed through its ranks. The number of boys who have achieved the rank of Eagle is but one measure of success. In Steve's case it doesn't come close to telling the full story of the countless ways in which Steve touched the lives of not only those 46 boys but those adults who had the privilege of working with Steve over these past 8 years.

Thursday evening December 10th, Troop 12 held a dinner party at Loch Nairn CC to not only celebrate the life and times of the troop but to pay tribute to Steve for his 8 years of faithful and dedicated service as scoutmaster. For the occasion Steve was presented with a framed picture of perhaps one of Norman Rockwell's more iconic paintings entitled "The Scoutmaster". Affixed to the exquisitely handcrafted frame was a brass plaque which read:

Steve May - Scoutmaster Troop 12 WGUMC 2013 - 2020

The picture shows a scoutmaster standing over the dying embers of a campfire. His scouts are bedded down for the night. The day is done. Although he can finally savor a moment to himself, the tired look of care and concern on the scoutmaster's face as he looks down into the remains of that campfire, says it all. A scoutmaster's job is never really done. The picture is a perfect portrayal of Steve's legacy and tenure as scoutmaster of Troop 12. His devotion to the fundamental ideals of scouting never wavered. He was always there for the boys, sometimes at great personal sacrifice. He was always prepared and his care and concern for the boys always came first.

At the bottom of the print were the words to the first stanza of a poem also entitled "The Scoutmaster" written by Edward Guest.

There isn't any pay for you, you serve without reward.
The boys who tramp the field with you but little can afford.
And yet your pay is richer far than those who seek for gold,
For in a dozen ways your service shall be told.

In Steve's case, the last line should be changed to say that not in a dozen but in "a thousand ways your service shall be told". The impact he has had on the 46 boys who passed through the ranks of Troop 12 will continue to be told for many years to come as those boys grow up and take their place in the world. Although their stories may never be fully known, Steve can rest assured that he did not labor in vain. This is the essence of scouting as it was meant to be. Thank you, Steve for a job well done!

CMO Chapel Time



Epiphany is the day Christians remember the coming of the Magi to visit Jesus, bringing their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. It occurs on Jan. 6 every year, the 13th day of the Christmas season. The word "epiphany," from the Greek word epiphania, means appearance or manifestation.

The arrival of these visitors was a sign that the incarnation of God in Christ had been made known and was recognized by the heavens to the whole world, so that even Gentile wise men from the East came to pay him homage. This is an observance of great majesty, solemnity and awe.

An even more ancient Christian celebration than Christmas, Epiphany originally focused on the nativity, God's incarnation (God made flesh) in the birth of Jesus Christ, and Christ's baptism. After the late fourth century, as Advent developed as a

season of baptismal preparation in addition to Lent, Epiphany became associated with baptism. This is why we see images of the three Magi on many older baptismal fonts.

In many Hispanic cultures, Epiphany is a day of great rejoicing and celebration, often kicked off by a parade the night before in which people dressed as the three kings or carrying statues of the three kings pass through the towns and villages throwing out candy and small gifts to all around. Families and children alike look forward to Día de Los Tres Reyes (Three Kings Day) as a time for presents, feasting and celebration. Attending church services that include the celebration of communion is also common in many of these cultures, even for those who may not attend worship regularly.

In England and some other European cultures, Jan. 5 is known as Twelfth Night, the culmination of the 12 days of Christmas feasting and partying. On Twelfth Night, many families gather in homes to celebrate with friends, food, singing and gifts. It is at these Twelfth Night celebrations that "Chalking the Door," asking God's blessing on those dwellings and upon all who live there, is most often observed.

In New Orleans, Twelfth Night begins another season of celebrations that comes to fulfillment at Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday). Epiphany itself, Jan. 6, becomes the kickoff day for that season, but is also often observed with a full celebration in church, complete with incense, elaborate processions, choral celebrations, and Eucharist.

Some United Methodists in the United States, who are not part of these rich traditions, tend to recognize Epiphany on the Sunday nearest Jan. 6. There may be a pageant of the three kings as part of worship that day and a small party afterward.

In celebrating Epiphany this year, consider partnering with a Hispanic, Latino or other congregation to find new ways to joyously celebrate Epiphany/Tres Reyes. In whatever ways you decide to celebrate it, remember at the heart of your celebration are the Magi kneeling, worshipping and offering gifts to Jesus, Messiah for all people.
