December is a month of traditions. Some of us will remember caroling and cookies. Other will recall decorating and Christmas movies. Many will think of gathering with family and friends. Traditions we love and traditions that we long for.

One of my favorite Christmas traditions is Christmas music. Listening to music, contemplating the meaning, and singing along. With so many Advent and Christmas carols and songs, we might be hard pressed to choose our favorite. While I absolutely love the song "I want a Hippotatomus for Christmas", my favorite carol is probably "O Little, Town of Bethlehem." I wonder if you are familiar with the origin of the carol. Rev. Phillip Brooks, pastor of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church is Philadelphia, took a pilgrimage to the Holy Lands in 1865. Upon returning, he was moved to write this hymn for the Sunday School children in his church. The hymn was well loved and Increased the attendance of the Sunday School program significantly, by one account from 36 to 1000! (1)

The hymn has had a life beyond the Holy Trinity Church in Philadelphia. It imparted great hope in December 1941 with President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Prime Minister of Great Britain, Winston Churchill. It was only 15 days earlier Pearl Harbor had been attacked and any illusions of peace, isolationism and security with it. Churchill heard the hymn for the first time in the local Methodist church for Christmas morning service with Roosevelt on and found solace and resolve for the work ahead of them. Imagine which "hopes and fears" that they had on their minds that Christmas morning.

This hymn captured multiple truths that I find myself reflecting on each and every Advent and Christmas season. For each of us, the hopes and fears of all the years are brought with us in this holiday season. As we await the birth of Christ, we remember the joy of birth of our children, nieces, and nephews as well as recall the fear of losses and death. As we seek to bring presents to the Christ child, we bring exuberance of our gift giving and the fear of our money that does not stretch as far as we need it to go. As we sing joy to the Lord, we bring our hopes and fears.

My prayer for you this Advent and Christmas season is that you will find the same peace that the people of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill, and many others have found through God's word spoken in song. May the Word of God touch your heart, inspire your life, and become a part of your traditions of Christmas.

Perhaps, the news that fills our media weighs heavily on your shoulders.


Anyone who feels that the holly and jolly of the season is not where they find their hearts is welcome join us for our Blue Christmas service.


Advent Bags for Our Homebound Thank You!

Stewardship Update

We give thanks to God for the faithfulness of God's people.

Last week, many of you offered your commitment cards for 2017. Some of you will offer them this week and still more in the weeks to come. We invite you to offer those commitment cards in the offering plate as a method for you to make a step of faith in giving as well as for us to plan as good stewards around anticipated giving.

We also encourage you to participate in our anni-

versary giving. This opportunity to give above and beyond your regular tithe and offering is a challenge to the congregation for 130 giving units to give an additional \$25/ month for 12 months. Even our children and youth have gotten into the giving, with youth giving 2.50/ month and children giving .25 cents a month. This giving helps to grow our roots and stabilize our mission and ministry budget.

Many of you have requested an update on our mission and ministry budget. This mission and ministry budget includes all our giving here at the church from our Sunday School program through our roof repairs, our choir music and kitchen supplies, our youth programming and copy machine. For the last three years, at the end of the year, we ran deficits, dipping into our financial reserves. We have sought to turn the tide and strength our financial giving position. With your faithful and generous giving and the commitment stewardship of leadership involved in expenditures, **we are on track this year to end the fiscal year in a cash positive position**.

Our mission and ministries are at the heart of what we do and who we are. Your giving impacts our local community and around the world. When you give you, you create a safe place for AA groups and scouting. When you give, you support missionaries around the world including the Les Family in Ukraine and our United Methodist missionaries through our apportionments. When you give, you teach children and youth through preschool programs, Sunday School, Children's worship, Youth programing, and Confirmation. When you give, you maintain our building as a home for all these ministries and much more. When you give, you equip music ministries to lead us in worship, here and beyond these walls in service.

When you give, you strength our roots in gratitude, so that we may all grow in Christ.

to a recording from the First Plymouth Church of Lincoln Nebraska.





Eastern PA to help launch UMC prayer vigil in 2017

The Eastern PA Conference will help lead off a more than yearlong United Methodist prayer vigil in 2017 by being the second conference to gather daily, even hourly in many places for a full week of prayer together. Our urgent cause for prayer could be the very future of the denomination. January 8-14, 2017, is Eastern PA's week to participate in the Council of Bishops' Praying Our Way Forward Initiative. We are asked to pray for "the church's effectiveness in fulfilling our mission of making disciples and for the outcome of the work of the Com-

mission on a Way Forward."

The council organized that global commission of lay and clergy church members to examine fully the church's laws and teachings on homosexuality and determine whether to recommend requested changes to General Conference. The denomination's unity hangs in the balance, as some groups anticipate division along ideological lines, depending on what the Council of Bishops recommends and General Conference decides. The council has unofficially asked the General Conference business manager to explore venues for a special called session in early 2019, a year ahead of the next scheduled General Conference in May 2020. A formal request for a called session is expected in 2017, after the special commission begins its work.

The 32-member Commission on a Way Forward will likely commence its difficult deliberations in January, hoping to resolve a decades-long impasse that prompted protest demonstrations and tense moments at the 2016 General Conference in May.

The bishops launched the multi-phase Praving Our Way Forward Initiative in October. For the first phrase, the council's 84 bishops have each been praying 15 minutes a day for the commission. "That's 21 hours of prayer a day for the work of the Commission on a Way Forward," said Birmingham Area Bishop Debra Wallace-Padgett, who co-chairs the prayer effort along with retired Bishop Al Gwinn. The second phase begins with rotating conference-wide prayer vigils in January, as each conference commits to come together in prayer, and fasting for some, during a designated week. The effort will continue into 2018.

Prior to our Jan. 8-14 week, members of Eastern PA churches can register their prayer days and times online or manually using a downloadable prayer vigil form at SignUpGenius. And in conjunction with the prayer vigil, Bishop Peggy Johnson will sponsor a conference-wide prayer service on Wednesday, Jan. 10, at 7 PM, hosted by Lima UMC. All are invited and encouraged to attend.

Bishop Bruce Ough, Council of Bishops President, stressed "We need to begin to prepare the church for whatever might come out of the commission." The council has also encouraged its member bishops to initiate conversations among clergy and laity within their annual and central conferences that would parallel the work of the Commission on a Way Forward. Each bishop may freely structure the process and timeline for dialogue according to the needs of their area, while using suggested questions as a starting point.



Safe Sanctuaries



Seminar plants vision of 'Church as a Movement'

"Kingdom Building," and definitely not "Church Building," was the theme of Hopewell UMC's 13th annual Planting Seeds for Ministry Growth seminar, Oct. 22. Church visionary Reggie McNeal taught a packed sanctuary that the Kingdom is "life as God intended it," and that the Church should offer not a building but "a relationship with Christ" to help people achieve that life. Like an airport, it should be not a destination but a hub, from where disciples are sent out to save the city and change the world. "God is calling us to a new chapter" in our story, said McNeal in a presentation full

of humor and honesty. About 225 attendees registered for the Downingtown church's annual leadership training event. Assuring them of his Georgia Baptist upbringing and generations of pastors in his family, McNeal explained, "I come to you from deep in the belly of the beast. I'm not saying Church as an institution has no relevance or value, but I want to emphasize Church as a movement."

The popular author and keynote speaker cited the growing numbers of people, now 1 in 5, who profess no interest in any religion, while many others aren't willing to be merely "congregationalized" as members. Young millennials especially are looking for places that are authentically nurturing and outreaching. "To have any hope of connecting with them," McNeal warned, "we're going to need a completely different posture than 'come and get it.""

An Inconvenient Christmas

Soon we will be singing Advent hymns in our churches and wondering where this passing year has gone. December 25th falls on a Sunday this year, and I am already hearing questions about having worship services on Christmas Day. I've

fielded such comments as: *"It is so inconvenient when Christmas is on a Sunday." "No one comes, and people are tired from the Christmas Eve services the night before."* I have been asked if it would be alright to cancel church services on Christmas Day and perhaps even on New Year's Day a week later, since the same kind of holiday issues exist. It is true that attendance is typically low on a Christmas Sunday. Some churches have opted to have one short services in their pajamas. All of this says that Christmas, when it falls on a Sunday, is inconvenient to many, and we are trying to find ways to make it work for us. Family gatherings and a million other holiday festivities compete with worship on that day. But I call on all of our churches to persevere and continue to hold services in some fashion on Sunday, December 25. It is, after all, the celebration of Christ's birth. The truth is, Christmas, the real Christmas, has never been convenient. The birth of Christ came amid a time of political unrest.

The circumstances of Jesus' birth were certainly less than convenient. This Galilean couple made a hundred-mile trek across rough, unpaved roads, as the new mother-to-be rode perched on a donkey in her third trimester of pregnancy. The birth event itself ends up happening in a rustic stable for animals, not exactly the cleanest or most comfortable environment. A murderous, unbalanced king

seeks the child's life and kills a swath of innocent babies in his foiled attempt at eliminating the competition. There was nothing about the realities of this Jesus' birth that was glamourous or even convenient. A fancy Hallmark card depicting the nativity with golden insert envelopes simply doesn't tell the real story. Christmas is still inconvenient, and it always will be. The coming of Christ ushered in a whole new paradigm whose purpose was to turn the world upside down, and not just a little. Mother Mary, in the "Magnificat" describes the plan: "He (God) has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts; he has brought down the mighty from their thrones and exalted those of humble estate; he has filled the hungry with good things and the rich he has sent away empty." (Luke 1:51-53) Simeon, the aged prophet in the temple, said similar things about Jesus at the time of his dedication: "Behold, this child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed (and a sword will pierce through your own soul also) so that thoughts from many hearts may be revealed." (Luke 2:34-35).

The best way to celebrate this newborn king is not just to show up for church services on Christmas Sunday. We should feel compelled—indeed, honored—to do the inconvenient and difficult work of justice ministries: sharing our wealth with those who are hungry for bread and for equality; speaking out when we see inequities and sharing power with people who usually don't have a place around the

table. This is year-round ministry-in-action that celebrates the birth and life of Christ every day! I challenge you to call your churches to a time of prayer and study during Advent. At my Days on the Districts meetings with clergy this fall I gave to everyone copies of a 40-Day Prayer Challenge book, titled *Draw the Circle*, by the Rev. Mark Batterson. You and your congregation could read this book, or one like it, as you prepare together for the celebration of Christ's birth. Through prayer and searching the scriptures the Lord will surely lay on your hearts what you need to be doing to "let justice roll down like water and righteousness as a mighty stream." (Amos 5:24) And what the Lord asks you to do won't likely be convenient or easy; but the real work of Christmas means walking the difficult, dusty

roads that Jesus walked, while bearing a cross on your shoulder.

New Redistricting of Churches Completed

The Eastern PA Conference Cabinet has completed arrangements of its 415 member churches into four new districts—East, North, South and West—to take effect July 1, 2017. The reduction from six to four districts was a necessary cost-savings decision made by the Annual Conference at its adjourned session Oct. 1. While the East District, which retains its current name, will now have 92 churches, the other three, newly named districts will each have more than a hundred.

The number of churches in each district are:

East District: 92 churches North District: 113 South District: 104 West District: 105 To ensure full inclusiveness, the Cabinet intends for each district to see itself as wholly new and not merely expanded and renamed with the addition of new churches. District meetings, decisions, leadership roles and program initiatives will be aimed to reflect that "all things new" understanding. "We are launching into a new way of living that will challenge us to resource churches more locally through the ministries of our mission connexions," said Bishop Peggy Johnson. She credited the helpful feedback she received to her presentations of the redistricting plan during district town hall meetings last April. "It is my hope that the leadership of the mission connexions can fill in the gaps so that District Superintendents are freed up to perform their role as Missional Strategists.

"Finances are clearly driving most of this decision," said the bishop. "But with every challenge there is an opportunity to learn new ways of doing ministry and keeping the goal of making disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world always before us." The Cabinet studied carefully the geographical, cultural and theological realities of churches across the conference, said Johnson. "Great care was given to be sure not to put all African American churches in one district and to have a mix of multicultural churches in each district," she explained.

Various aspects of the new district transitions are being planned and worked out now. That includes: the work of District Resource Assistants; reconfiguration of district committees on Ordained Ministry; nominations for district leadership positions; UMW and UMM leadership positions, etc. The current six districts will likely celebrate their life and ministry together at Tools for Ministry gatherings and district conferences next spring. But the new quartet of districts will then celebrate their new configurations during lay and clergy gatherings with the bishop next fall.

LCH to Open Dental Center in Southern Chester County in December

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) granted Kennett Square's La Comunidad Hispana (LCH) a \$350,000 award to open a new dental center to serve southern Chester County. This fall, low-income residents of south-

ern Chester County will now have access to dental care—a service that is a crucial need in this part of the county. Many uninsured clients, who must travel to Coatesville or West Chester to access the nearest available services, simply go without.

"Nearly half of our clients have not seen a dentist in a year or more," said LCH Medical Director Cindy Schmeltz, DNP, FNP-C, CRNP. "We know that oral care is an essential component of overall health. We see so many dental problems during patient visits, and now we will be able to get them away for inability to pay. Four full-time employthe care they need right in their own backvard."Based on the 2015 Southeastern Pennsylvania Household Health Survey, there are 17,000 adults in southern Chester County who need a dental visit. Additionally, 15 percent of children, or 3,300, were not examined by a dentist within the past year.

LCH completed a needs assessment last fall and



began the application for federal funding. Thanks to the funding award, the 43-year-old Federally Qualified Health Center will expand into dental care for the community no later than December 2016. The

LCH Dental Center will be located on McFarlan Road in Kennett Square in space that will be leased from Dr. Robert Krauss, an endodontist with over 30 years of experience in southern Chester County.

Services will be offered to community members using the same model as LCH's existing services -Person-Centered Services. LCH will accept Medicaid, Medicare, CHIP, and private insurance. Uninsured patients will pay for services received on a sliding scale, and no patient will be turned ees will staff the site: one dentist, one dental hygienist, and two dental assistants. LCH is now interviewing for these positions.

LCH has served southern Chester County for more than 40 years as a multi-service, bilingual nonprofit that changes lives through Person-Centered Care: health care, social assistance, and education and workforce development.



Mission Work in Africa Grows

Churches in the Eastern PA Conference are supporting missionaries and vital mission efforts in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) and Tanzania, spanning a vast distance that makes occasional visits and newsletters all the more essential. Those visits and communications help strengthen relationships and inspire support.

The Rev. Jonathan and Donna Baker, our Congo Partnership missionaries working in the Central Congo Area, visited the Southeast District here twice in the past four months. In October they presented a celebrative report to clergy during the Bishop's Day on the District. And in June they addressed the full District Conference. The district raised funds in 2014-2015 to build a pediatric clinic in the region of Mpasa, near Kinshasha. In 2015-2016 it raised more, along with partners, to help furnish it with equipment. Now in Phase III, known as Light4Life, district members are raising funds to help provide solar power and a solarpowered blood bank for the medical center.

The new Pediatric Medical Building's ground-breaking occurred Sept. 19. "This was a celebration of a dream for Mpasa for many years and is a culmination of so much prayer, preparation, and sacrificial giving by many people both in Congo and among our U.S. Partner Conferences," wrote the Bakers on the Partnership's Facebook page. The United Methodist Church built a medical clinic and nutrition center in Mpasa in the late 1990s to serve a large migration of refugees escaping civil war, drought, and other conflicts. When the new pediatric clinic is finished, medical staff will be able to improve maternal care and treat children separately from adults, said Donna Baker, a retired nurse.

Meanwhile, generous donations have provided much-needed equipment, including a generator, an infant incubator for newborns, a surgical bed and operating lights. An ultra-sound machine is next among the many critical needs that still exist. "You are making a livesaving difference for Christ in Central Congo," Jonathan Baker told the district in October. "You are there with us through your prayers and support." You can also support the Bakers individually as missionaries through the Advance: Donna L. Baker, Advance #3022054; Jonathan E.
