

Resurrection happens in the dark. When it is still pitch black, when only stars light the way, when it seems like morning light will never come, resurrection happens. In the dark, you hear every noise. In the dark, you replay each word that was said. In the dark, you reprimand yourself for not being asleep. In the dark, small challenges seem to be fertilized and grow exponentially bigger than where you left them just

the day before.

Art depicts resurrection in the bright daylight; however, we can not forget that was when the disciples came to the tomb. The women who came to prepare Jesus' body for burial after their time of Sabbath, came in the light of day, and discovered Jesus' resurrection from the dead. The disciples who sought to verify the story of the women came in the light of morning.



Sometimes resurrection is clear, and signs of new life are undeniable. We are amazed by miracles in our own lives and can not help but tell everyone. It is like a great restaurant, a new game, a fascinating book, a catchy tune that we can not help but share. Signs of resurrection are in the undeniable new life

of those who have known miracles of healing of body, mind, and spirit!



Other times, it is like you and I are watching resurrection happen freeze frame by freeze frame. We may find ourselves wondering if we can believe our eyes. We feel this deeply when we are days have been filled with more Maundy Thursday and Good Friday moments than resurrection. We begin to feel as though we may never see resurrection.

But hear the good news... Easter is coming! No matter how dark Good Friday has been. No matter how heavy the news feels, how many deaths we are caring, how challenging it is say to day, EASTER is coming! Christ has overcome the world! Jesus is risen from the dead, and he is Lord! Jesus will not leave you forsaken or lost.



West Grove UMC is again participating in GSR this year as follows:


1 Service / Good Works




Some people reading through the Bible would like to get together and discuss.

How can you help?

This is a biannual event pioneered by the United Methodist Women. It offers gently used clothing and household items to the community at record low prices. Many families in our community attend this event and the bargains are very helpful to them in these hard economic times. In order for the event to be held, many hands are needed for the physical labor of setting up the sanctuary and putting the items out on tables on the Thursday before the Friday sale. Then the reverse must happen on Saturday to get the sanctuary set up for Sunday worship. It is also helpful to have a half dozen people available during the busiest sale hours to help with check out on Friday and Saturday morning. Please consider lending an hour or two. The United Methodist Women use the proceeds of this event for various missions or additions to our church.

THE ORIGINS OF THE EASTER EGG



the biblical story of Easter.

One theory is that eggs relate to Easter symbolically: Just as a hard shell contained new life, so the tomb of Jesus contained his resurrection

According to another legend, an egg merchant named Simon of Cyrene was forced to put down his egg basket in order to help Jesus carry his cross to where he would be crucified. When Simon returned to his basket, he found that his eggs had been miraculously decorated.

What is clear is that by the 13th century, it was customary for Christians to abstain from eating eggs during Lent — the 40-day pre-Easter season.


Hens, of course, did not abstain from laying eggs during Lent, so by Easter Sunday a typical village would have a massive egg surplus — making egg-related festivities convenient and practical even if they lacked a clear logical connection to the biblical text.

The Easter tradition of egg dyeing, though, probably originated in ancient Christian communities in Mesopotamia that colored chicken eggs red to symbolize the blood of Jesus. (To this day, Orthodox congregations continue this practice.)

Christians also may have picked up the egg symbol from Passover — the hardboiled egg is one of the seven symbols set out on the Seder plate.

Easter and Passover are strongly connected to each other — the Last Supper Jesus shared with his disciples just before the crucifixion was a Passover Seder.

After the disciples began proclaiming Jesus's resurrection, they continued to celebrate a yearly Passover in the way Jesus had instructed them to, remembering his death and, more importantly, what his death and resurrection meant for the world.



As Pastor Jim and Betty are traveling, short update:





Through the efforts of the National Day of Prayer Task Force, more than 35,000 prayer gatherings will be conducted by about 40,000 volunteers across the United States. Several million people are expected to participate in this call to prayer.

Did you know?

In 1775 the Continental Congress allocated a time for prayer in forming a new nation. Over the years, there have been calls for a day of prayer, including from President Abraham Lincoln in 1863. On April 17, 1952, President Harry Truman signed a bill proclaiming the National Day of Prayer into law in the United States. President Reagan amended the law in 1988, designating the first Thursday of May each year as the National Day of Prayer.

The National Prayer Committee was formed in the United States in 1972. It went on to create the National Day of Prayer Task Force, with the intended purpose of coordinating events for the National Day Prayer. According to the Legal Information Institute, the shall issue each year a proclamation designating the first Thursday in May as a National Day of Prayer on which the people of the United States may turn to God in prayer and meditation at churches, in groups, and as individuals.





Susan Paisley, RN Parish Nurse



Twenty years ago this past Thanksgiving, my 22-year-old son, Nuçi, took his own life after struggling with major depression for many years.

We have always been a close family. After Nuçi's death, my husband, my older son and I clung to each other trying to make sense out of something that was very hard to wrap our brains around. It was completely surreal and excruciatingly painful knowing that we'd never see Nuçi

again. We were wounded and we needed each other like a crippled person needs a crutch.

We've been very gentle with ourselves knowing that our grief would most likely last forever and yes it continues twenty years later. One thing we know for sure is that the only way to get out of the severe pain is to go through it. Grief is a necessary and healthy process. Also, we've learned that each of us grieves differently. There is no one way to do it. Let no one tell you that you're not doing it "correctly." Stay away from those who judge you and accept the support of those who care.

Those in the "suicide community" will tell you that there is a gift in all of this. It may not appear right away but never the less it will appear. Most of us don't want to hear such a thing. When I mentioned this to my husband, he said, "I don't want a gift. I just want Nuçi back!" Understood! But if we allow, good things can manifest after devastating losses. As for me, I've found my gift! I will forever try to help and support the many Nuçis who are still with us.

In my Survivors of Suicide Support Group, I run across many who experience guilt if they laugh or even begin to enjoy life after losing a loved one. I remember one time running in to a young woman who had lost her husband to a stroke, leaving her with two small boys to raise alone. She expressed how sorry she was about my loss and then she said something very wise. "You don't believe it now but one day your joy will return. It may take a long time but it will happen." I thanked her but deep down I was skeptical.



About a year or so after Nuçi's death, on a beautiful crisp Fall day, I stepped out my front door. I was almost blinded by the brilliant reds and yellows radiating from the giant maple trees in my neighbor's yard. At that moment, I was flooded with a sense of gratitude for being alive. My joy had returned.

Now that didn't mean that at any moment I couldn't dissolve in a sea of tears. It didn't mean that my grief had ended. It didn't

mean that I no longer yearned to see and hug Nuçi again. It meant that I was moving through the healthy process of grieving and I was still standing.

A friend of my husband who had lost his brother to suicide, told him that the further you get away from the suicide, the more the bad memories recede and the good ones come to the fore. This is true in my family's experience. We don't want to define Nuçi's life by the way it ended. There was so much more. He was a beautiful young man. Smart. Funny. Talented. And most of all he was kind and caring. We continue to tell "Nuçi stories." We laugh at the funny things he'd do and every Thanksgiving we toast him. He is so much more than his illness.

I want to say to those who have lost love ones to suicide, we must speak out and educate those who continue to stigmatize those with mental health conditions. We as parents owe this to our children and we owe it to those who are still with us and still suffer and who in many cases do not seek treatment because of stigma.

We must be gentle with ourselves while also being strong. Celebrate when your joy returns. I know that Nuci wants that for his mom.
