"In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters."

Genesis 1:1-2

In January, I challenged the congregation to read through the Bible in a year. How is your reading going? I know for some of you, this has been a first time to read through the Bible in a systematic way. Others, have read through the Bible at some point and shared with me this is a welcome invitation to do so again. We even have a group of readers meeting to learn more and discuss what they found in the Bible! And even others, started to read and for some reason, were not able to continue. It is never to late to pick up reading. There are outlines of how to read through the Bible in the Lobby as well as on the website. God's word is illuminating and encouraging!

As I was discerning our three resolutions for this year, I found myself often in prayer about challenging us to read through the Bible. I wanted to encourage us to grow in faith with that big goal, but knew it would raise quandaries and curiosities. Most of us are not positive what is and isn't in the Bible or what to do with what we find! In my prayers, it become clear that we needed to dive deeper into one part. Through my prayers, God made it clear to me that Genesis was the place to start. In the beginning.... So, starting June 11th, we will together work through the whole book of Genesis in worship. For 6 months, we will dive deeper into how God creates and how they guides us today. I want to invite you to read along the book of Genesis as we read it in worship.

Now, I admit, I was a little nervous about the prospect of preaching through the whole book of Genesis. Never having preaching on every chapter of Genesis before. Preachers usually pick and choose a little bit! In my prayers, I found myself asking God to show me each step of the way as I have planned this series. I want to preach where we are as a congregation and in ways that each one of us might experience new beginnings of faith. I wanted worship that meets us where we are and leaves us off with fresh understandings and experiences of God. So, as I prayed, it became clear that for such a visual culture, images were an insight into where we have been (physically and spiritually) as well as what wonderings we carry. I requested images thinking I would receive many a dozen from maybe a half-dozen people.

Within two days of the request for images of creation, I had received hundreds of various birds and flowers, landscapes, and other sacred moments in God's creation from many. Before I even got home from church, there were images waiting for me, and they continue to come. At once, I was reminded of how integral creation is to each and everyone of us. Each one of those pictures captures a moment in time and only one small glimpse of the full of God's creation. Thank you to each one who sent me images, and I am still accepting more images until June 5th. I am enjoying seeing the world, God's incredible creation, through your eyes. What reassurance as well that God is guiding where we are walking as congregation.

In worship, you can look forward to animals images from around the world, unique flowers and vistas, as well as ordinary sunsets that are anything but mundane. Genesis contains the creation of the world, humanity, relationships, government, city states and much more. There are epic stories of giants and near-life ending floods as well as battles and super heroes. All of the topics of news from violence and crime to sports and weather are found within the book of Genesis. And we will walk together in God's way. I am looking forward to walking in the footsteps of our biblical ancestors together as well as finding the path to which God has called each of us, today.




Some people reading through the Bible would like to get together and discuss.



Prayer will fill the hall and the agenda of the 2017 Eastern PA Annual Conference, June 15-17, in its return to the familiar Expo Center (100 Station Avenue, Oaks, PA). During worship, witnessing and even its work on resolutions and other conference business matters, the plenary body will emphasize timely prayer throughout its session, guided by its elevating theme "Rise up and Pray!" Eastern Pennsylvania Conference Preachers, teachers, musicians, liturgists, prayer guides and prayer stations around the meeting hall will all center the

gathering in the practice and power of prayer. That centering will receive particular attention when special guest the Rev. Tom Albin, Dean of the Upper Room Chapel in Nashville since 1999, offers a Friday teaching session on prayer. Albin, a SLI (Spiritual Leadership, Inc.) coach and former pastor and seminary professor, has a passion for "helping individuals, teams, small groups and organizations become mature, vital, world-changing disciples of Jesus Christ." He oversees the Upper Room's Spiritual Formation Academy and denominational prayer efforts. "When we pray," he says, "we can be convinced that God will hear and respond."

Three bishops will preach during the 231st session of the Eastern PA Conference, including two familiar voices and a new voice on the Northeastern Jurisdictional College of Bishops. Resident Bishop Peggy Johnson will preach for the Opening Worship and Eucharist Service on Thursday afternoon.



New Bishop LaTrelle Miller Easterling, who leads the neighboring Baltimore-Washington Conference, will preach for the Ordination Service on Friday night. Formerly a pastor and district superintendent in the New England Conference, she was elected a bishop at the 2016 Jurisdictional Conference.

Bishop Peter Weaver, retired, who led our Philadelphia Episcopal Area from 1996 to 2004, will preach during the Memorial Service on Saturday morning.



Special offerings will support scholarships and Methodist Services (formerly the Methodist Home for Children). The other agenda highlights—clergy and laity sessions, conference ministry reports, the 2018 conference budget, resolutions and holy conferencing—will all occur during the two-day session under the covering of prayer.

Indeed, worship and celebrations during this year's Annual Conference will be structured around several key prayers of the Bible, according to the Rev. Candy LaBar. She co-chairs the worship team along with the Rev. Monica Guepet again this year, and both credit the many volunteers for the creative, inspirational celebrations in store for conference-goers.



Mental illness in children: Know the signs

Children can develop the same mental health conditions as adults, but their symptoms may be different. Know what to watch for and how you can help.

Mental illness in children can be hard for parents to identify. As a result, many children who could benefit from treatment don't get the help they need. Understand the warning signs of mental illness in children and how you can help your child cope.

Why is it hard for parents to identify mental illness in children?

It's typically up to the adults in a child's life to identify whether the child has a mental health concern.

Unfortunately, many adults don't know the signs and symptoms of mental illness in children. Even if you know the red flags, it can be difficult to distinguish signs of a problem from normal childhood behavior. You might reason that every child displays some of these signs at some point. And children often lack the vocabulary or developmental ability to explain their concerns. Concerns about the stigma associated with mental illness, the use of certain medications, and the cost or logistical challenges of treatment might also prevent parents from seeking care for a child who has a suspected mental illness.

What mental health conditions affect children?

Children can develop all of the same mental health conditions as adults, but sometimes express them differently. For example, depressed children will often show more irritability than depressed adults, who more typically show sadness. Children can experience a range of mental health conditions, including:

Anxiety disorders. Children who have anxiety disorders — such as obsessive compulsive disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder, social phobia and generalized anxiety disorder — experience anxiety as a persistent problem that interferes with their daily activities. Some worry is a normal part of every child's experience, often changing from one developmental stage to the next. However, when worry or stress make it hard for a child to function normally, an anxiety disorder should be considered.



Attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). This condition typically includes symptoms in three categories: difficulty paying attention,

hyperactivity and impulsive behavior. Some children with ADHD have symptoms in all of these categories, while others may have symptoms in only one.

Autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Autism spectrum disorder is a serious developmental disorder that appears in early childhood — usually before age 3. Though symptoms and severity vary, ASD always affects a child's ability to communicate and interact with others.

Eating disorders. Eating disorders — such as anorexia nervosa, bulimia nervosa and binge-eating disorder — are serious, even life-threatening, conditions. Children can become so preoccupied with food and weight that they focus on little else.

Mood disorders. Mood disorders — such as depression and bipolar disorder — can cause a child to feel persistent feelings of sadness or extreme mood swings much more severe than the normal mood swings common in many people.

Schizophrenia. This chronic mental illness causes a child to lose touch with reality (psychosis). Schizophrenia most often appears in the late teens through the 20s.



What are the warning signs of mental illness in children?

Warning signs that your child might have a mental health condition include:

Mood changes. Look for feelings of sadness or withdrawal that last at least two weeks or severe mood swings that cause problems in relationships at home or school.

Intense feelings. Be aware of feelings of overwhelming fear for no reason — sometimes with a racing heart or fast breathing — or worries or fears intense enough to interfere with daily activities.

Behavior changes. These includes drastic changes in behavior or personality, as well as dangerous or out-of-control behavior. Fighting frequently, using weapons and expressing a desire to badly hurt others also are warning signs.

Difficulty concentrating. Look for signs of trouble focusing or sitting still, both of which might lead to poor performance in school.

Unexplained weight

loss. A sudden loss of appetite, frequent vomiting or use of laxatives might indicate an eating disorder.

Physical symptoms.

Compared with adults, children with a mental

health condition may develop headaches and stomachaches rather than sadness or anxiety.

Physical harm. Sometimes a mental health condition leads to self-injury, also called self-harm. This is the act of deliberately harming your own body, such as cutting or burning yourself. Children with a mental health condition also may develop suicidal thoughts or actually attempt suicide.

Substance abuse. Some kids use drugs or alcohol to try to cope with their feelings.

What should I do if I suspect my child has a mental health condition?

If you're concerned about your child's mental health, consult your child's doctor. Describe the behavior that concerns you. Consider talking to your child's teacher, close friends or loved ones, or other caregivers to see if they've noticed any changes in your child's behavior. Share this information with your child's doctor, too.

How do health care providers diagnose mental illness in children?

Mental health conditions in children are diagnosed and treated based on signs and symptoms and how the condition affects a child's daily life. There are no simple tests to determine if something is wrong. To make a diagnosis, your child's doctor might recommend that your child be evaluated by a specialist, such as a psychiatrist, psychologist, social worker, psychiatric nurse, mental health counselor or behavioral therapist.

Your child's doctor or mental health provider will work with your child to determine if he or she has a mental health condition based on criteria in The Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM) — a guide published by the American Psychiatric Association that explains the signs and symptoms that mark mental health conditions.

Your child's doctor or mental health provider will also look for other possible causes for your child's behavior, such as a history of medical conditions or trauma. He or she might ask you questions about your child's development, how long your child has been behaving this way, teachers' or caregivers' perceptions of the problem, and any family history of mental health conditions.

Diagnosing mental illness in children can be difficult because young children often have trouble expressing their feelings, and normal development varies from child to child. Despite these challenges, a proper diag-



nosis is an essential part of guiding treatment. How is mental illness in children treated?

Common treatment options for children who have mental health conditions include:

Psychotherapy. Psychotherapy, also known as talk therapy or behavior therapy, is a way to address mental health concerns by talking with a psychologist or other mental health provider. During psychotherapy, a child might learn about his or her condition, moods, feelings, thoughts and behaviors. Psychotherapy can help a child learn how to respond to challenging situations with healthy coping skills.

Medication. Your child's doctor or mental health provider might recommend that your child take certain medications — such as stimulants, antidepressants, anti-anxiety medications, antipsychotics or mood stabilizers — to treat his or her mental health condition.

Some children benefit from a combination of approaches. Consult your child's doctor or mental health provider to determine what might work best for your child, including the risks or benefits of specific medications.

How can I help my child cope with mental illness?

Your child needs your support now more than ever. Before a child is diagnosed with a mental health condition, parents and children commonly experience feelings of helplessness, anger and frustration. Ask your child's mental health provider for advice on how to change the way you interact with your child, as well as how to handle difficult behavior.

Seek ways to relax and have fun with your child. Praise his or her strengths and abilities. Explore new stress management techniques, which might help you understand how to calmly respond to stressful situations.

Consider seeking family counseling or the help of support groups, too. It's important for you and your loved ones to understand your child's illness and his or her feelings, as well as what all of you can do to help your child.

To help your child succeed in school, inform your child's teachers and the school counselor that your child has a mental health condition. If necessary, work with the school staff to develop an academic plan that meets your child's needs.

If you're concerned about your child's mental health, seek advice. Don't avoid getting help for your child out of shame or fear. With appropriate support, you can find out whether your child has a mental health condition and explore treatment options to help him or her thrive.


Pediatric Building Update

Solar Power Can Save Lives!

Imagine an injury or the delivery of a baby when hemorrhaging threatens the life of the patient and there is no access to a Blood Bank! It happens so often at Mpasa but soon solar panels to power a solar refrigerator to store blood products will save lives! As soon as a refrigerator is available, the government will launch a Blood Bank at Mpasa!!!

Solar power will also help other important types of medical equipment recently purchased for the Mpasa Medical Center. These also require electricity to function or to be

charged. For example, the new surgical lamps include batteries but they must be charged prior to their use. The incubator for newborns in need of special care require electricity for any functionality. However, much of the other equipment, such as the operating room bed, are totally manual.

The solar panels will totally power the Mpasa Medical campus badly in need of electricity as the local grid is unstable. This power will enhance all medical services and be a great help to the nutrition program serving 300 children daily.
