"Don't fool yourself into thinking that you are a listener when you are anything but, letting the Word go in one ear and out the other. Act on what you hear! Those who hear and don't act are like those who glance in the mirror, walk away, and two minutes later have no idea who they are, what they look like. "James 1: 22-24 (Message paraphrase)

One of our favorite children's books is entitled Pancake Pie by Sven Nordqvist. Festus, the farmer, bakes a pancake pie three times a year for his cat, Mercury's birthdays. However, each time he goes to bake the pie, the step leads him to something else. Festus needs an egg for the pancakes, which leads him to do everything from distract a bull to fish out a key to stitch up ripped pants. There are many steps to get accomplished before one can make pancake pie, to celebrate Mercury's birthdays, which he has three times a year, because it is more fun that way. While Festus and Mercury do ultimately have pancake pie, it is barely in time before beginning the cycle again for the next birthday.

Sometimes our spiritual lives are a bit like that. We really meant to spend time in prayer, if we could finish our reading or give time with Family Promise or go to Bible Study or clean out the refrigerator at the church. And before we know it, we have lost any semblance of focus or the holy in our spiritual practices. We are doing to check things off our lists, rather than to be a part of the body of Christ or know God more closely. Moving from TO DO to TO DO without any sense of why it is that we are doing what we are doing.

This year, I am going to challenge us from the strength of the scripture passage in James to live an active faith. At the head of the page is the Message paraphrase. Re-read it and let it sink in. How often has this been us? We had nodded along to the words of Jesus and the stories of God and then gone right back to our lives. We have been careful to make sure that there is not much overlap between the two! The Message paraphrase might not be familiar to you; here is the version that you might be more familiar with: "Be doers of the word and not hearers only." This will be our congregation's verse for the year!

Some of us need to hear the call to action. Jesus has no hands but yours. Jesus needs you to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit the lonely, and care for those most in need. We have driven by "those people" in hopes that someone else would stop. We have not signed up to host for Family Promise, because someone else could do it. We have not served in the church, because we are just too busy. Where is God calling you to be doers of the Word?

Some of us need to hear the call to doing what is meaningful of God's way. Do can sound like a pile-on proposal. (Do more of this and do more of that!) However, I am suggesting that less is more. It is more meaningful to focus on the spiritual practices of greeting people on a Sunday morning as greeters and guests of God as one way of serving, than to hurry around filling all the roles in Southern Chester County. Where is God calling you to be doers of the Word?

All year long in worship, in our strategic plan, in our congregational goals, in our study, in our mission, we will talk and model how to DO FAITH!

For 2018, I challenge you: DO FAITH!

PRAYER BEAD GARDEN UPDATE

In the mornings, frost has set the ground as the cold of winter is coming.


The estimated cost of one kit is \$10.00.

HOW TO ENCOURAGE SOMEONE TO SEE A THERAPIST

It's hard to watch someone you care about struggle with their mental health. It's even worse when you know they could benefit from professional help. Approaching an individual and encouraging them to seek therapy can be a tricky situation. If done the wrong way, you could aggravate the person or turn them against the idea entirely. However, there is an effective way to have this conversation.

Here are some steps you can take to tell your loved one about the **benefits of seeking therapy.**

SHOW SUPPORT

Misconception about mental health and therapy has intensified stigma in society. Your loved one may be *aware* that they need help, but may be afraid to seek it if they think you will judge or treat them differently. Therefore, it is essential to use <u>non-stigmatizing language</u> when talking with them about their mental health. Assure them that you will support them through the therapy process.

Demi Lovato is one of the most vocal celebrities about her mental health issues. She mentioned on multiple occasions how important it was for her to have people around that really care about her wellbeing. She credits her support group for being able to go through everyday life. Demi asks for advice from her loved ones and asks them to let her know when they feel something's off: "So whether it's with my management team or with my friends, every choice that I make, I run by people. And that's what's really helped me—vocalizing what you need."

BE SENSITIVE TO TIMING AND PLACE

Talking to someone about mental health requires emotional sensitivity as well as *physical* sensitivity. The "where" and "how" the topic is presented may determine how a person reacts to your suggestions. Your loved one may not be as bold as Kesha when she <u>shared her condition and struggles</u> with the world while receiving an award.

Don't start this delicate conversation in front of other people or where others can hear as this may cause discomfort. And avoid grouping up in an intervention-style conversation as people do on TV shows. Allow the person struggling to decide whether they want others to know. This way, they feel respected and in control of their own treatment.

Also: Avoid talking to someone when they are in a bad mood, tired, have tight deadlines at work or if they're doing something important. They may dismiss you or disregard the weight of the topic. Approach the person when they're in a good mood, relaxed and undistracted. Try as much as possible to keep the conversation private, friendly and relaxed.

PREPARE FOR RESISTANCE

Not all people who hear about therapy will be willing to try it out. You need to be prepared to make your case if your loved one resists your suggestion. Here are some ideas that you can use to highlight the importance of therapy:

- Try to use your relationship as leverage, in a loving way. Whether you're their sibling, friend, spouse or relative, tell them how important your relationship with them is to you. And how it could benefit from their seeking therapy. However, avoid giving an ultimatum as it can cause emotional distress.
- **Name their admirable qualities**. It's easier to appeal to someone by pointing out what you like about them. When you point out someone's positive qualities, they will be motivated to take the necessary steps to better themselves even further.

steps to better themselves even further. **Explain specific areas of problematic behavior**. Most people who refuse therapy may claim that they don't have a problem. By pointing out specific problems without coming off as judgmental, you can help them see the need for seeking professional help.

OFFER TO HELP

You can try to embolden someone to go to therapy, but unless you are willing to offer meaningful support, it's not going to encourage them. Some people do not know where to start when seeking help. Guide them in finding a suitable therapist in the area, depending on their preferences. You can contact offices on their behalf or research various professionals, their credibility and reviews.

Some people are scared of seeing a therapist alone or signing up for group therapy. Offer to go with them until they're comfortable. You can sit in the waiting room during their first few sessions. Make sure to assure them that you won't ask prying questions about the counseling unless they want to share.

Seeking therapy is one of the best steps that a person with a mental health condition can take. However, it's an effort that requires great strength and courage. Share your suggestions as openly as possible and leave them to make the decision that best suits their needs. Above all things, assure them of your continued love and support throughout the process.

Healing the reproach of women BY BISHOP PEGGY JOHNSON

During the Advent season we often study the life of John and Baptist and his godly parents, Zechariah and Elizabeth. During her pregnancy with this holy child, Elizabeth exclaimed, "Thus, the Lord has done for me in the days when he looked on me, to take away my reproach among people." (Luke 1:25).

What was her reproach? Elizabeth was unable to conceive, and no doubt, she was disdained for this by her society. The worth of a woman in her world and in many cultures depends on their ability to bear children. In some societies male children are the ones that count the most; so not even a female baby is good enough.

A woman who has no children is at fault for some reason, even though modern medicine has proven that the husband can also be the cause of the family's infertility. In the Bible we read of a few other women who faced reproach and were desperate for a child: Sarah, Rebekah and Hannah, to name a few.

In our society women are not under the same depth of condemnation if they do not conceive. Women have careers and many kinds of other interests than motherhood. However there is still unhappiness and social pain when a couple who want children cannot conceive for some reason.

Reproach of women is not lost on our society. The practice of sexism is a form of reproach. Still today, women get paid less than men for the same work. Most corporations have men as their CEO's; and sexual abuse and domestic violence mostly happens to women.

I have seen this in our church. At least once every year someone who knows that their pastor is leaving will call my office and say, "Don't send us a woman pastor." I have handled numerous complaints of sexual misconduct and harassment by clergy and lay people during my tenure in this area.

Many fine women pastors have had difficulties in ministry, not because of their lack of skills or calling, but because some in the church (men and women) cannot accept their authority or the unique gifts that they bring. Some even misuse the Bible to justify their discrimination against a woman pastor.

What do we do about our modern-day reproach and sexism? We talk about it!

Time Magazine announced last week that their "Person of the Year" was not a person but a group of women known as the "Silence Breakers." This is a group of women who came forward and shared painful accounts of sexual abuse at the hands of men in positions of power. First one, then another, then others, emboldened by women who led the way and opened the prison gates of oppressive secrecy for them. As more and more brave women come forward to share their stories and speak their truth, things can get better.

I remember as a young adult I experienced sexual abuse two times. Once a co-worker at the school where I taught pushed me against a wall and kissed me. On another occasion the father of the groom at a family wedding found me in a quiet corner and accosted me with some inappropriate touching.

I never told anyone about these attacks, but that is how the practice of abuse continues. When molested

and abused women (and sometimes men) keep silent, the offense is somehow condoned and considered safe and bearable. Sometimes when they do speak out, victims are demonized, not believed, and then ostracized, making them victims a second time.

Recent revelations of women cadets allegedly victimized and forced out in retribution for



reporting sexual assaults at our nation's Air Force Academy follow in a long line of disturbing reports at colleges and military installations in recent years. In so many places, we are losing talented, dedicated women who want to serve their nation, their professions, perhaps even their churches, because so many are traumatized by extreme gender bias, violence and sexual assault, and then punished for naming their perpetrators.

The church needs to have honest conversations about these issues and strive to live in more healthy ways, as we continue the work of ministry. First steps include talking, teaching and creating safe spaces for people to share their stories. As we come to know and confront the truth of how our sisters, daughters, wives, mothers, friends and colleagues are being assaulted, then revealing and reconciling that truth may one day set them free.

Then, the Lord may look upon them, as He looked upon Elizabeth, and take away the inhumane reproach of women—and others who are abused and rejected for who they are—among our people.
