"When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary, the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?'" Mark 16:1-3

I was a senior in high school when the first school shooting transpired at Columbine. That April 20th, 1999, I went to the place where I was taught to go when things get hard, I went to my church, Hopewell UMC. Some of my youth group gathered in the chapel of our church. No one organized an event. No one sent out an email. No one tweeted an invite. There was no invite to which respond. No phone call chain. Not even a smoke signal that went up. Somehow, we, who had been raised in the church, knew that when there was an event this terrifying, this horrifying, a stone in our way this big - we gathered together in the church.

There was a whole group of us. Let me paint

the scene for you. Imagine about fifteen high schoolers and junior high students and five youth leaders who loved them. Imagine the fear. School shootings were not nearly as common place as they are now. Sad, as that is to say. We were not used to intruder drills, only fire drills.

Columbine was the first. So, some of us were laying on the dark wooden pews; Others of us lay under the pew, as if that might protect us. Students were curled up in balls crying silently. Others were hugging and wondering if they could ever go back to school. But no one doubted they could be safe in the church.

And then, all of the sudden, our pastor appeared among us. He prayed with us. I don't remember the words, except they were simple and soft. We came to church to pray together, be together, and lean on one another's hope.

"Who will roll away our stones of fear and worry, pain and anxiety, despair and distress" we wonder. On this resurrection day, we find ourselves at various points in our own lives, like the disciples on that Easter morning. God had not left them alone, even then.

We, too come together finding signs of resurrection. Those first disciples found the stone was rolled away! And the Risen Lord was out in world. Signs of the resurrection were everywhere!

They couldn't help but tell everyone, even the ones who didn't believe them. With whom will you share hope and signs of the resurrection?

Update From Pastor Monica

Dear Friends,

Each call I receive from a scheduler I can hear the grace of God. Each time the plan moves or shifts, I find the grace to pause and see that God's steadfast love is never absent but like a stained glass window always shining through a different window pane (or pain—pun intended).

As I write to give you an update, I want to share that I am filled with gratitude. I have transferred my care to the University of Pennsylvania, Abramson Cancer Center neuroendocrine center. I continue to have more tests of various kinds to verify whether tumors removed were the originating location or the metastasis.

I continue to love your prayers. I have also been blessed your kindness. I am open to your questions of clarifications. Our Staff Parish Relations Committee also wants to help in this way as well. Please feel to reach out to our chair, Kristin Reisinger.

Thank you for the privilege of us walking together on this journey. We walk together, with God's grace.

GIVE | SERVE | RESTORE

In the famous passage from Luke 10:27, Jesus encounters a man who may not be so unfamiliar to us. Wanting to cover all his bases, he asks Jesus to tell him what exactly is required of him in order to please God. When Jesus replies to him with the well-known words above, the man isn't satisfied. Yes, but "who is my neighbor?", he asks.

As Christians in our world today, I think we often struggle with a different version of this question: "Yes, but how do I love my neighbor?" We're inundated with messages of need from places as far away as a continent across the world and as close as a house across the street -- needs physical and spiritual, social and emotional. And the correct response isn't always as obvious as it was to The Good Samaritan, who Jesus goes on to depict in the passage above.

The answers are not simple, but let us not be like the man in Luke 10:27, who only wanted a simple answer. This year, with our GSR 2018 financial beneficiary Getting Ahead, we have chosen a program that we believe takes on this question of need and our response differently. How so?

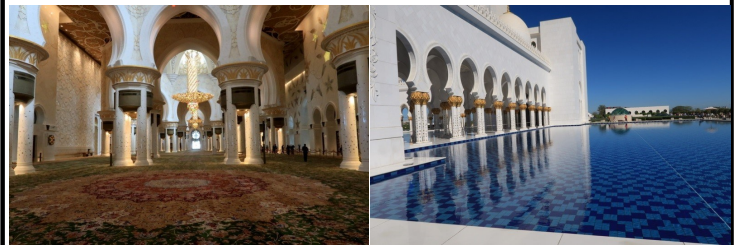
Neighbor, in this case, is quite literal. Getting Ahead engages those living in close proximity to us in a relational, respectful, and restorative journey to a better story. It invites those isolated by poverty into a community of support, addressing them as whole people who need not only bread, but also hope.

As a group of over 25 churches, we have the unique opportunity to support this program in a significant way as it expands throughout Southern Chester County. If you haven't already, consider donating \$30 (adults)/\$3 (kids) to Getting Ahead as part of this year's GSR challenge.

Pastor Jim Update

Since last update our ports of call have been Singapore, Cochin and Mumbai, India, Dubai and Abu Dhabi, UAE, and Aqaba, Jordan.

In Abu Dhabi we visited the third largest mosque in the world, the Sheikh Zayed Grand Mosque.



On the left is the area inside of the mosque. The picture on the right shows the area around the mosque that is filled with water.

We began to transit the Red Sea on our way to Aqaba, Jordan. In Aqaba, as mentioned before, we spent time in the town while about half the ship went to Petra, the lost city in the mountains of Southern Jordan. When you stand on a hill in this city you can see Jordan, Israel, Egypt and Saudi Arabia.



Since we have started, I've taught 36 daily Bible study sessions and conducted 6 worship services.

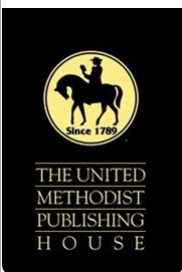

UM Hymnal Revision Committee Holds Inaugural Meeting



The Hymnal Revision Committee of The United Methodist Church held its inaugural meeting March 19-21.

The 15 member committee is comprised of a diverse group of laity and clergy, musicians, scholars, teachers, and worship leaders, representing all 5 jurisdictions in the U. S. and represent variety in age, cultural origin, ministry setting, and experience.

The meeting launched months of activity to identify songs and ritual resources that can be made available in multiple media, including digital downloads and streaming. In addition to hymn texts and tunes, the team will identify and rec-

ommend a wide selection of liturgical resources that provide an essential collection to connect and serve diverse United Methodists in worship. The assortment will be dynamic and augmented at every General Conference going forward.

The committee's many tasks will include work on theology and praxis, reviewing and selecting texts and tunes as well as liturgical resources, and listening deeply to and engaging with congregations to understand their needs and support their ministries.

"Although the work is a little overwhelming, I am hopeful as we are guided by the Holy Spirit that this collection will touch hearts and transform lives," said committee member Monya Davis Logan.

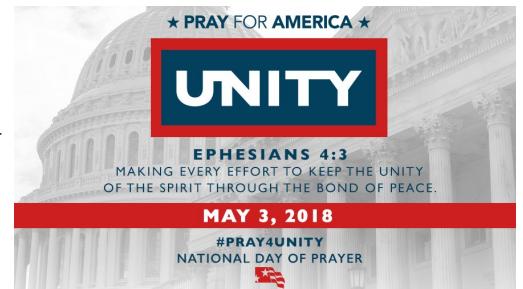
COMMUNITY DAY OF PRAYER

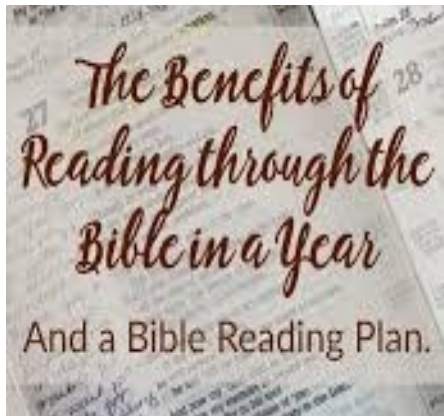

So, start cleaning and sorting and we will see you at the sale!

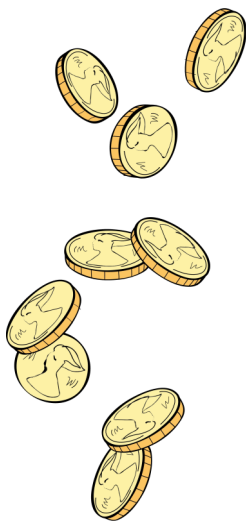

Bridges Out of Poverty

The Southern Chester County Opportunity Network (SCCON) is a community-wide initiative based on the Bridges Out of Poverty model. Bridges Out of Poverty is a framework for understanding poverty through the lens of economic class and a model for addressing poverty in a comprehensive way at the community level. It asks all sectors of the community - business, nonprofit, education, local governments, etc. - to come to the table and engages those in poverty as problem solvers.

In 2014, a group of local nonprofit leaders and volunteers began to gather and ask each other the question: what can we do to move beyond charity - "quick fix" solutions for those in need - to a community that provides supports and a way up and out for those experiencing poverty. We believe that creating a community where everyone can thrive is a task that belongs to all of us. Bridges Out of Poverty provides a model to bring people together across economic class and sector to do the work that none of us can do alone.

DEA National Drug Take Back Day April 28, 2018 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM

The National Drug Take Back Day addresses a crucial public safety and public health issue. The majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, often from the home medicine cabinet.

The DEA's Take Back Day event provides an opportunity for Americans to prevent addiction and overdose deaths. Unused or expired prescription medications are a public safety issue, leading to potential accidental poisoning, misuse, and overdose. Proper disposal of unused drugs saves lives and protects the environment.

As part of the ongoing effort to curb the opioid epidemic in Pennsylvania, there are now 65 prescription drug take-back boxes at Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) stations across the commonwealth. Boxes located in PSP stations are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. PSP Troop J Avondale is located at 2 Moxley Lane, Avondale.

How to Boost Your Willpower to Help Make Healthy Choices Easy

Cheating on your diet or exercise plan? Struggling with self-control or impulse choices? Science shows that willpower can get depleted! Learn how you can strengthen it and increase your ability to resist temptation.

Willpower May Be a Finite Resource

Willpower is the epic battle in your prefrontal cortex between the WILL of your logic and the POWER of your emotions.

You know this battle so well. Do you choose the chili cheese fries or have a side of grilled asparagus? After a hard day, do you hit the gym or have margaritas with your crew? Our lives are a constant game of “this or that” that often ends up feeling like “would you rather.”

Exerting your willpower can be exhausting. Sometimes you feel like you can’t make the best choice and you just can’t resist any longer. And there’s a reason for that.

Your willpower may be an exhaustible, finite resource. It may be used up over the course of a day in lots of tiny ways. This is called ego depletion.

Research by social psychologist Roy Baumeister and others suggests that if someone initially resists a temptation like warm chocolate chip cookies, the person is then less capable of resisting another willpower challenge or making a difficult decision.

Translation: Doing something tough may use up some willpower, which makes resisting temptation super hard.

Ok, so what can you do about this depletion? Don’t fret, here are some simple strategies to level up your willpower.

Arrange things and make decisions when your willpower is sky high.

Clean. Get rid of all the temptations. If all the junk food is gone you won’t have to resist later.

Commit. If you have a plan with a friend for spin class, you won’t have to wonder what you’re doing later.

Optimize. Change your timing for tasks, like grocery shopping right after a meal when your willpower is strong. If you don’t use your willpower to battle the cookie aisle in the store, you’ll have reserves for resisting dessert later tonight.

Boost your willpower in the moment it is being challenged.

Postpone. “Not now, maybe later.” Saying a simple phrase like this can reduce your impulse to listen to that devil on your shoulder.

Distract. Try distracting yourself to see if your impulse chills out. Giving yourself something else to focus on can calm the brewing willpower battle.

Hide. Remove the temptation from your view or remove yourself from the situation. In the classic “marshmallow experiment,” even little kids trying to use willpower to wait for a delicious, squishy marshmallow had more luck if they simply hid it from their view. One kid sat on it to get it out of view! If a kid can do it, so can you.

Learn how to strengthen your willpower.

Meditate. Yep, this one again. Even brief, 10-minute mindfulness meditations, done over time, can improve your self-control. The deal with mindfulness is you learn to bring your thoughts back to the present moment as they start to wander. And every time you do this, you’re flexing your willpower muscle.

Sleep. It always come back to getting enough sleep, we know! Studies indicate that getting enough sleep matters for your willpower, too. Healthy sleep can lower psychological strain, give you better self-control, and replenish self-regulatory energy. That’s all a fancy way of saying, “Get to bed!”

Stop swearing. It’s not a joke. Baumeister suggests that challenging yourself to change a speech pattern, like using “hello” instead of “hey” or dropping that expletive and replacing it with something else, can help you learn to extend your willpower.

Excuse your setback and get on with it!

Forgiving yourself for an oops moment frees up your willpower, so you can resist next time. It’s ok, you’re human, and you’re going to make mistakes.

In other words, using the first letter of each of these strategies, A-B-L-E, be able! Using your willpower doesn’t have to use up all your willpower.

Which willpower boost are you going to try next time you’re in a logic vs. emotion throwdown?

APRIL STATISTICAL REPORT

WORSHIP ATTENDANCE AND ONLINE WORSHIP

As promised, we reflect this month on Worship Attendance and Online Worship.

In 2016, we worshiped an average of 188 persons on a Sunday morning. This means on an average Sunday morning between both services there would 188 persons at worship. In 2017, there has been a growth in the number of persons in worship of 8 people. This is 4%. We give thanks to God for you inviting your friends and neighbors to join us in worship. This is the OPEN part of our mission. For our mathematicians and statisticians: These numbers do include both average Sunday mornings and holy days and holidays as both are part of our understandings of what it is to be the body of Christ.

Previous to 2017, West Grove UMC had not formally hosted any online worship opportunities and the denomination had not asked us previously to measure how people were connecting with us in online venue. We did however have a social media presence through our website, Facebook, and YouTube. In 2017, we begun dabbling with online worship. On Christmas Eve at our 11pm service, we live-streamed through Facebook Live. Our analytics tabulate 39 unique views for just that 11:00 p.m. Christmas Eve worship service. Throughout the year, we estimate approximately 290 unique views on our website for sermons and have since turned on the goggle analytics for exact numbers. We also use YouTube to host our worship videos, including anniversary videos, Psalm 23 video, and Moments of Impacts. Those analytics tally 141 unique views.

This tabulated to 410 persons worshipping online for 2017. We give thanks to God for sharing the good news in multiple medium. We look forward to additional ways we can use those mediums in 2018. We need your volunteer help to staff these great technologies. Can you help us with the sound board or camera or PowerPoint? Please let Keith Schneider know.

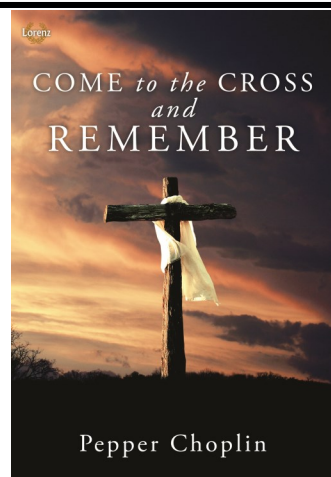

EASTERN PENNSYLVANIA CONFERENCE NEWS

Annual Conference

“We Will All Be Changed” will be the theme of the next Eastern PA Annual Conference June 14-16, 2018. The prophetic theme—perhaps a timely, symbolic one for our denomination—comes from 1 Corinthians 15:51. (“Listen, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed...”)

The conference will feature a morning teaching session led by the Rev. Eric H. F. Law, an Episcopalian priest, who founded and directs the Kaleidoscope Institute. The institute, which provided anti-racism training for the Conference Cabinet in 2016, promotes “inclusive, sustainable churches and communities.”

For over two decades, Law has authored books, led trainings and produced resources to help denominations in the U.S. and Canada, including several UMC annual conferences, create transformative experiences to foster and embrace greater cultural diversity and inclusiveness. That goal remains an ongoing one for our conference and others.

The Rev. Justin Hancock, a clergy member of the North Texas Conference, will preach the opening

worship service (“We Will All Be Present”) on Thursday, June 14, before the session is called to order and Holy Conferencing begins. Working with college students on campus and in the local church has given him “a passion for helping people discover who God designed them to be.”

Bishop Cynthia Moore-KoiKoi, who leads the Pittsburgh Episcopal Area (Western PA Conference), will preach the Service of Ordination (“We Will All Be Sent”) on Friday evening. A former superintendent in the Baltimore-Washington Conference, she was one of two African American clergywomen elected to the episcopacy at the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference in 2016, a historic achievement.

And Presiding Bishop Peggy Johnson will preach the Memorial Service (“We Will All Be Changed”) on Saturday morning before the session resumes.

The remainder of the agenda will include necessary conference business as usual, with resolutions and reports, award presentations, visitors’ greetings, celebration of ministries and monitoring for
