" For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God not by works, so that no one can boast." Ephesians 2: 8-9

If my initial plan had come to be, I would have been writing you this letter from London. Perhaps, even from Epworth or Oxford. I was scheduled to be on a study leave the last portion of June 2018 as all ordained clergy shall take after six years of full time ministry (paragraph 351 of Book of Discipline 2016). The leave was scheduled to tour Wesley sites, write about them, teach and preach about them in July. However, there were many changes in my own life, the life of the church, the life of the conference, and the life of the

denomination that have changed the timing of said leave. We are discerning the best time for the leave to now come.

This month, we find ourselves pausing in the Methodist distinctives. What is it that led John Wesley and his brother, Charles, both Anglican priests all of their lives, to lead a reforming movement derisively called methodical? Both Wesleys wanted to see the people of their time experience the grace of God, the assurance of salvation, and then partner with God to change the world though social holiness both here and now and then and there.

Two years ago, when our youth mission trip went to West Virginia, I visited family. During that visit, my aunt gifted me a rare Methodist Conference journal dating 18th century. Living history! In addition to the incredible work that John Wesley and his brother did in reforming the Church of England, the work spread across the ocean into the burgeoning colonies. This American experiment, which the Wesleys only visited once, was the place where the Methodist movement took hold like wildfire. Circuit riders and class leaders working hand in hand spread the gospel and modeled a life that others wanted to live. This well preserved book my aunt gifted me was passed from generation to generation of good church folk who loved just that. Those who knew the grace of neighbors whose land disputes

could have ended in a gun battle or the pastor's office, the social holiness of immigrants who didn't have the right accent but plenty of hard work.

The people called Methodists have always been about living out the two greatest commandment:

""Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.""

John Wesley wrote on Thursday May 7th of 1741: "I reminded the United Society that many of our brethren and sister had not needful food; many were destitute of convenient clothing, many of out business and that without their own fault, and many were sick and ready to perish, that I has in me lay to feed the hungry, clothe the

naked, to employ the poor, and to visit the sick, but was not alone sufficient for these things, and therefore desired all whose heart were as my heart:

1. To bring what clothes each could spare to be distributed among those that wanted most.

2. To give weekly a penny or what they could afford for the relief of the poor or sick .

My design I told them for the present all the women who are out of business and desire it in knitting."

The heart of Methodism continues today as we clothe and care for those in need through Family Promise and Emergency Aid programs. Our Food Pantry has already fed many with 195 bags of groceries this year in comparison to 211 for all of 2017. June has seen a significant increase with 48 bags alone! Our Emergency Food Pantry is not intended to take the place of SNAP, WIC, or other programs that support sustainably folks who are food insecure. We fill the gap in between programs. In the our Wesleyan heritage, I encourage you to watch the specific needs that our Emergency Food Pantry Coordinator, Karen Hruz lets us knows of, so that we might share with our neighbors.



WHY DO UNITED METHODIST PASTORS CHANGE CHURCHES?

(Excerpt from UMNS Daily Digest)

Our unique system of deploying clergy has its roots in the earliest days of Methodism. John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, was an "itinerant" preacher, traveling from town to town in England.

"John Wesley believed that itinerant preachers who moved from place to place were more effective than those who settled in, grew comfortable, and wore out what they had to say," says the Rev. Belton Joyner.

In a letter to the Rev. Samuel Walker in 1756, Wesley wrote, "We have found by long and consistent experience that a frequent exchange of preachers is best. This preacher has one talent, that another; no one whom I ever yet knew has all the talents which are needful for beginning, continuing, and perfecting the work of grace in a whole congregation."

In the early days of Methodism in America, a pastor — most often a circuit rider — might be appointed to half of a state or more. His appointment might be for only three months, after which he moved to another circuit. Thousands of the oldest United Methodist congregations today trace their history to a circuit rider.

United Methodist pastors are sent, not called or hired. "Itinerancy" refers specifically to the commitment by pastors to go and serve wherever their bishops send them. "Appointment" is the action taken by bishops. These are different, yet related. Clergy in The United Methodist Church commit to serve where their bishop appoints them. Appointments are typically for one year at a time, though the bishop may move any itinerant pastor at any time. The goal of the appointment process is to match as much as possible the gifts and graces of the particular pastor or deacon with the ministry needs of a particular congregation or ministry setting. In this "serial leadership" of consecutive pastors and deacons — no two are alike — over time, the combination of skills blends to form a broad base of developed ministries.

While bishops make appointments, they incorporate a consultative process outlined in The Book of Discipline that includes district superintendents, clergy and pastor/staff parish relations committees. The needs and desires of clergy are considered, but the mission of the church comes first.

Yvette joined Pastor Monica this week as a delegate to the 2018 Eastern PA Annual Conference and already busy getting to know our church family.

What is a Deaconess?



So, I heard you say that Deaconess Yvette is our Associate Pastor for Caring Ministries, are you confused? What is a Deaconess and how can she be our Associate pastor for caring ministries?

First, what is a deaconess? Deaconesses and Home Missioners are laywomen and laymen who are called by God to be in a lifetime relationship in The United Methodist Church for engagement with a full-time vocation in ministries of love, justice, and service. Together we form a covenant community that is rooted in Scripture, informed by

history, driven by mission, ecumenical in scope, and global in outreach.

The Deaconess and Home Missioner call to ministries of love, justice, and service is defined in Paragraph 1913.1 of the United Methodist Book of Discipline, which states: *Deaconesses and home missioners function through diverse forms of service directed toward the world to make Jesus Christ known in the fullness of his ministry and mission, which mandate that his followers:* Alleviate suffering;

Eradicate causes of injustice and all that robs life of dignity and worth;

Facilitate the development of full human potential; and

Share in building global community through the church universal.

Core studies may be taken at United Methodist institutions of higher learning or at colleges, universities, and/or seminaries that are approved by the University Senate of The United Methodist Church. Intensive courses (one-to two-week) and other alternative program options are available. Prior coursework may be reviewed for approval of the core studies. Limited financial assistance based on need is available for core study coursework.


At the time of consecration and commissioning, position (compensated or noncompensated) in an approved appointment of love, justice and service. Appointments may be in a church-related vocation or helping profession. A deaconess or home missioner must hold local church membership in the annual conference in which she or he will be serving.

Continuation of the practice of discernment

Ability to serve no less than 10 years of creditable service at the time of consecration

Upon successful completion of all requirements and approval of appointment, candidate is consecrated to the Office of Deaconess and Home Missioner and commissioned by a bishop at settings approved by the board of directors of United Methodist Women. Deaconesses and home missioners have a continuing relationship to The United Methodist Church through United Methodist Women.

The approved appointment is fixed by the appointing bishop.



TICKING TIME BOMB



The tick problem has gradually grown over the past decade, and this summer may be the worst yet

If you live in an area with a considerable deer population—chances are you're familiar with the concept of tick season.

They're not quite insects, not quite spiders—but they certainly are a nuisance. They feed only on blood, and if infected with bacteria or viruses, they can pose a risk to human health.

Unfortunately, the months of May, June, and July are the most fruitful to the tick population, which thrives in humid, forested areas. Here's some background information and suggestions for avoiding problems this summer.

Where are Ticks found?

Ticks can be found anywhere, but as mentioned they thrive in humid areas with lots of trees, fallen leaves or other natural debris. You're unlikely to find a tick in an open field with lots of sun.

There are many species of ticks, three of which are most plentiful in the United States:

- Black-legged, or deer ticks, found in the Midwest and the Northeast
- Dog ticks, common in the Midwest and Eastern U.S.
- Lone star ticks, most commonly found in Southeastern states

If you are not sure how to classify or identify a tick and want more information, you may want to visit the resources center at tickencounter.org.

Disease Dangers

Ticks can be responsible for serious, but increasingly rare diseases, the most well-known of which may be Powassan virus. Only discovered about 60 years ago, about 75 cases of the disease have been reported across the Northeastern U.S., the Great Lakes region and Canada in the past decade.

Many infected people never show symptoms, but there is the potential for long-term neurological issues and even death with Powassan virus.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, mosquito, tick, and flea-borne illnesses doubled across the United States between 2004–2016 and Lyme disease is primarily to blame. Experts confirm that Lyme disease is by far the most common tick-borne disease, with the CDC receiving about 30,000 reports of new cases annually. Fever, headache, fatigue, and a bullseye rash called erythema migrans are among the most common symptoms. Infection can eventually affect joints, the heart, and the nervous system. Again, the vast majority of cases are concentrated in the Northeastern and upper Midwestern states.

What to Do if You Find a Tick?

A bite itself from a tick is usually painless, but much like mosquito bites, can quickly become itchy. Lately, the emphasis has turned to finding ticks on someone and discarding them before they have the chance to bite.

When checking yourself, or others, for ticks, be aware that they tend to gravitate toward the warmer parts of the body—the groin, scalp and armpit cited as the three most common locations. The ears, behind the knees, and waist area are also mentioned as possible landing places.

If you find a tick, the CDC's recommendation is to remove it with a pair of tweezers, then thoroughly clean the bite area with alcohol, soap, and water. They also recommend saving the tick, rather than panicking and squishing it like you would an ant. Doctors are increasingly interested in identification of ticks to further their knowledge of the subject.

Above all—don't panic. There's no need to go to an emergency room or to the doctor unless symptoms appear. If fever or a rash develop, that's the sign that a healthcare professional should be involved.

How can people Avoid Ticks?

The truth is that environmental factors play the biggest role. People are unlikely to encounter many ticks if they live in an open, urban area; while living near the woods makes it almost impossible to suggest any foolproof avoidance strategies.

The Environmental Protection Agency recommends looking for an ingredient called Deet in any insect repellents you might use.

Pets—dogs in particular—can carry some of the same ticks that affect human. A tick collar can be effective, but won't destroy all potential parasites. While dogs can carry the Lyme disease tick, they don't transmit the disease to humans.

SCRIP Scripts

With over 750 retailers to choose from, Shop With Scrip is an easy way to patronize your favorite merchants and raise money for WGUMC. For every dollar you spend, merchants will rebate WGUMC from 1% to 20% (and sometimes even more during special promotions). Here's how it works:

There are several ways to participate in the program. First, go to shopwithscrip.com and click on the "Shop" tab for a listing of the participating merchants. Next, select a merchant by clicking on their logo and the rebate to WGUMC will be displayed. Delivery options are also displayed, with many of them offering three different methods. A "Physical" is an actual plastic card that is shipped once a month to WGUMC. "Scrip Now" is an email with a barcode that is sent directly to you. You can print it out and present it to the cashier at checkout or save the image on your smart phone. A "Reload" card is a traditional plastic card, but instead of having to reorder a new card when it is exhausted, you can create your

own account online, register your card and reload it anytime you like.

Payments for the purchases are linked to your bank account in a secure environment making this one of the fastest and most convenient methods.

Another method is to pick up one of the order forms in the Narthex. Simply place your order form and a check made payable to WGUMC in Gene Aucott's mailbox in the mailroom.

EASTERN PENNSYLVANIA CONFERENCE NEWS

UNITED NATIONS' WORLD REFUGEE DAY

June 20th was THE United Nations' World Refugee Day, It is a day set aside to encourage people to think about the lives of refugees and the human right to a secure lace to that one can see as "home".

There are more than 65 million displaced people living in our world today; and we, the people of God, have a mandate to show them love and hospitality:

"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares." (Hebrews 13:2)

"For I was hungry, and you gave me food; I was thirsty, and you gave me drink; I was a stranger, and you welcomed me." Matthew 25:35

"When a stranger sojourns with you in your land, you shall not do him wrong. You shall treat the stranger who sojourns with you as the native among you, and you shall love him as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God." Leviticus 19:33-34

The mandate is clear. To live out these commands in this day and time, with immigration being a highly controversial issue, is far more difficult but also far more crucial.

The resettlement program for legal immigrants in the U.S. is an important part of our national value system. For the Christian, it is part of our commitment to Jesus.

Help people find ways to get involved and offer help, even just a little bit. We have a United Methodist Advanced Special fund for donations: National Justice for Our Neighbors Advance #901285 (Creating a welcoming community by providing immigration legal services, education and advocacy.) And we can communicate in many ways to our lawmakers that we support humane immigration policies.

Years ago, when I was serving in a local congregation in Baltimore, a man from Ethiopia came to my church. He was seeking asylum in the U.S. due to political unrest in his home country, where he was a respected

educator. He narrowly escaped with his life after being kidnapped and tortured.

The church afforded him many helpful support systems during his long journey through the immigration process. This was because he had a face and a story; and it was because the common humanity they shared was compelling. This talented and personable man eventually received asylum status and a green card, and it was partly due to the advocacy and support of this little church.

Today he is a productive member of society. I saw a picture of him on Facebook recently standing next to his son who just graduated from high school. His story taught me that every church can do one thing, help one person, raise one voice for advocacy.

Compassion for the stranger does not have to spin into partisan political controversy. Respond only as the Lord lays it on your heart, as the "Lord loves a cheerful giver." Remember always that we are all sojourners on this earth, living a common life under the watchful eyes of a loving, merciful, welcoming

God, who bids us to be loving welcoming as well. *Written*
