Our vacation this year found us with beautiful weather and abundant time on the beach.
With much gratitude to many of us, we give

thanks to God for reflection. For me, I am often delighted by the simplicity of vacation. The routine of going to the beach with its lathering sunscreen, preparing snacks, gathering chairs and towels and walking towards the ocean which feels like an adventure on the first day, is no excitement by the end of the week. The simpleness of routine has built in waiting for one member of the family or another, at different time. I wonder if you can relate!

Beachtime was filled with jumping the waves, sandcastles, naps on the sand, reading, and snacks. You can guess who enjoyed which! But I love a solitary walk seeking the shells up and down beach. You never know what you will find. You have to be open to the gifts from the sea. I was blessed each time, me and and my sea pail.

From Kathleen Norris's reflection, The Quotidian Mysteries: Laundry, Liturgy, and "Women's Work," I have come to believe that the trus mysteries of the quotidian are not hose who contemplate the holiness in isolation, reaching godlike illumination

in serene silence, but those who manage to find God in life filled with noise, the demands of other people and the relentless daily duties that consume the self. They may young parents juggling child rearing and making living; they may be monks or nuns in a small community who have to wear three or four "hats" because there are more jobs to fill than people to fill them. If they are wise, they treasure the rare moments of solitude and silence that come their way, and use them not to escape, to distract themselves with television and the like. Instead they listen for a sign of God's presence and they open their hearts towards prayer." (page 70).

You may or may not find moments of rest and vacation this month, but I can imagine that you find quotidian and ordinary moments of routine. You may find moments of folding the laundry or washing the dishes, mowing the lawn or making the bed. In the midst of the moments, I pray the you might look for solitude and silence. One of the gifts for me in vacation is always that my mind can stop focusing on the urgent and make space to be present with God, who has been waiting for me. I am always rewarded. Every time I let go of the daily grind and lean into the routine, my mind can wait on God. I pray August can have moments, hours, maybe even days, of waiting on God.

August moves us from the freedom of time with vacation and possibility as children go back to school, work schedules change, board meetings pick back up, and fall obligations resume. The weather might change and temperatures might drop a bit in the evening, and then again, they might not. As we face down September, we think about intentional discipleship and how we are growing in our faith, but for today - may you rest and wait on the Lord.



LUTHER HOUSE NEW BIBLE STUDY


We continue to meet on Wednesdays from 2:00-3:00 PM in Building #1. Everyone is invited to join us as we delve deeper into God's Word and share love and support

FAMILY PROMISE

In the summer of 2014, we began conversations in a structured way about supporting our neighbors who were temporarily homeless. Shortly after that we watched the pieces fall into place as West Grove became one of 13 host churches. Below you see an image of the original signers supporting Family Promise of Southern Chester County as an organization incorporating. Look close and you will find



Joan Leaman, Janice Bowers, and Pastor Monica (one of her first acts that first July 2014). Since then we have hosted countless families approximately 13 times thus far. We have been each and every time families have been with us. I know that volunteers have often been on their toes with the details and situations of the moment. It is the long term success of sustainable housing and employment for families that we celebrate.

From Family Promise we know:

- 394 students were impacted by homelessness during 2016-17 in Southern Chester County's four school districts.
- Zero shelter beds exist in our area to keep families together during an already stressful time.

People served since opening:

- 37 families (49 adults, 85 children)
- 24 families housed

We give thanks to God for West Grove's vision to Open, Grow, Serve. Our work with Family Promise across years has allowed us an opportunity to connect with others making a difference. May God move as we pray that families sustainably find employment and housing they to might be open, grow, and serve.

BLESSING OF THE BACKPACKS

CMO PRESCHOOL


I hope you are enjoying the beautiful summer weather. I was thrilled to be a volunteer at VBS. It





TECH BREAK

"We are more connected than ever, and all of this connectivity involves the use our hands," said Joseph Valenza, MD, director of pain management, Kessler Institute for Rehabilitation (www.kessler-rehab.com). "Overuse, however, can quickly lead to numbness, pain and loss of function. We've seen an alarming increase in tech-related injuries in recent years. That's why it's important for everyone to be aware of the symptoms of these 'digital injuries' and seek treatment before more serious complications arise."

On average, adults respond to 40 emails each day, spend 23 hours a week texting, and play games for more than 6.5 hours a week.1 Children are equally impacted with hours of computer-based schoolwork, texting and playing games. Considering the time people spend on these devices – and the force exerted on the fingers and hands – it's not surprising that problems can develop.

"Whether typing or texting, playing games or surfing the Internet, the use of these devices and our increasing dependency on them puts us all at risk," noted Norma Glennon, OT, CHT, Kessler Institute. "The continuous pressure of hitting the keys, tapping a screen, or even holding a device can affect the nerves, muscles and tendons in the hand, wrist, elbow and shoulder – and cause any of a number of what are called repetitive stress injuries."

The more common Repetitive Stress Injuries (RSIs) include:

- "Texting thumb" or De Quervain's tenosynovitis, an inflammation in the tendons that leads to pain and cramping
- "Trigger finger" (stenosing tenosynovitis) causes the thumb or other fingers to lock or snap.
- "Text claw"—from holding devices for long periods of time—causes pain, cramping and loss of hand and wrist function
- Carpal tunnel syndrome is marked by pain, swelling, tingling and numbness in the hand and wrist
- "Tennis" or "selfie elbow" (epicondylitis) and "cell phone elbow" (cubital tunnel syndrome) produce aching, burning and numbness in the hand, forearm and elbow

Overuse can also lead to ruptured tendons and permanent loss of function, as well as "Tech Neck" (http://kessler-rehab.com/company/newsroom) and

pain in the shoulders and back from hunching over and looking down at these devices.

Many of these tech-related injuries can be avoided by using common sense – putting down your device and taking regular breaks throughout the day. As a national leader in physical medicine and rehabilitation, Kessler Institute offers the following 10 tips to help prevent injury in techusers of all ages:

- Watch for early warning signs, such as a tingling sensation, pain or numbness in the hands, wrists or elbows, as well as the neck, shoulders and back.
- If you experience pain, stop what you're doing.
- Rest the affected finger(s), hand, wrist, etc.
- Change your habits and disconnect regularly.
- Give your thumbs a break. Switch hands, use a stylus or the talk-to-text feature on your phone if available, and learn to use a softer touch.
- Stretch and roll. Simple exercises, such as shoulder and wrist rolls or stretching your hands and fingers can help alleviate muscle fatigue.
- Use a neutral grip with you wrist straight when holding your digital device.
- Act ergonomically. Be mindful of your posture, hand and body positioning, and placement of devices.
- Pay attention to play. Studies show that gaming affects people's perception of pain; that is, they're so intent on the game, they fail to notice any discomfort and continue playing.
- Seek medical attention. Speak with your physician about which treatments may be most helpful in managing your symptoms/ condition: ice or heat packs; splints or braces; anti-inflammatory medication; or physical, occupational and/or specialized hand therapies.

"The best 'cure' for tech-related injuries is prevention – using devices wisely, taking breaks, and listening to your body for signs of discomfort. Unfortunately, given the extent to which we rely on our mobile devices, we're really just one click away from a 'digital disability,'" said Dr. Valenza.

SCRIP Scripts

With over 750 retailers to choose from, Shop With Scrip is an easy way to patronize your favorite merchants and raise money for WGUMC. For every dollar you spend, merchants will rebate WGUMC from 1% to 20% (and sometimes even more during special promotions). Here's how it works:

There are several ways to participate in the program. First, go to shopwithscrip.com and click on the "Shop" tab for a listing of the participating merchants. Next, select a merchant by clicking on their logo and the rebate to WGUMC will be displayed. Delivery options are also displayed, with many of them offering three different methods. A "Physical" is an actual plastic card that is shipped once a month to WGUMC. "Scrip Now" is an email with a barcode that is sent directly to you. You can print it out and present it to the cashier at checkout or save the image on your smart phone. A "Reload" card is a traditional plastic card, but instead of having to reorder a new card when it is exhausted, you can create your

own account online, register your card and reload it anytime you like.

Payments for the purchases are linked to your bank account in a secure environment making this one of the fastest and most convenient methods.

Another method is to pick up one of the order forms in the Narthex. Simply place your order form and a check made payable to WGUMC in Gene Aucott's mailbox in the mailroom.

STATISTICAL REPORT

As we wrap up our final look on statistical report in 2017, leadership are beginning to work on our charge conference reports for this year. In the Methodist movement, we have a deep sense that knowing where we have been shows us where God is leading us. God through God's people has been actively moving in this place. We give thanks to God.

We have been sharing our blessings in giving time, volunteers, and staff. In 2017, we shared \$12, 271 to United Methodist causes (outside of our apportionments). This is a 56% increase from the previous year and includes Mpasa and UMCOR. Additionally, we gave \$14, 370 to non-United Methodist causes, which represents a 321% increase. This includes Rise against Hunger, Guatemala Mission trip, Les Family, GSR, and others. The generosity of this congregation in giving to mission is astounding!

We have increased our expenditures in programming and operating to \$79,778 with 17% increase. This shows our commitment to quality educational, discipleship, and administration operations and programming. We paid \$51,972 on principal and debt an increase 10% over the previous with our commitment to our facility.

In our giving, we received \$369, 018 in pledged or identified givers in 2017. This is an increase of approximately 10%. In our special Sundays, we had 131% increase from \$2217 to 5138.

Our capital giving this year included giving to the prayer bead garden, HVAC units, donations to mortgage principal, TVs, window blinds, and memorials. The total received in capital giving was \$49, 578. We give thanks to God and look forward to all the ways in which ministries will be birth out of these capital initiatives.

Our staff has been blessed and continue to see growth. In 2017, we saw change in development of the Engagement Specialist Role, part time in the Office as well as two additional teachers in the CMO preschool. This brought us to a total in 2017, to 1 full time clergy (Pastor Monica), 4 part time clergy/worship (Pastor Shirley, Pastor Jim, Pastor Kevin, Betsy Smith), 1 full office (Donna Fackler), Other full time (Tracy McLaughlin), 2 part time Office (Kristin Boyd,) and other 13 part time staff members (Sandy Deckard, Maira Tena, Natalie Eason, April Stoltzfus, Jennifer Smith, Stacy Smith, Elsje Kumpon, Mary Alice Miller, Karen Reischke, Heather Smalley, Abbie Gruscavge) The 2018 statistics will reflect our current reality.

As we give thanks for our staff, volunteers serve at the heart of our congregation and community. Our ministries and office track, to the best of our ability, how many people serve. we estimate that across the year approximately 1,029 people serve in ministries to serve others! Thanks be to God. From Family Promise to Sunday School to Food Pantry and PB and J, we desire to open, grow and serve! Join us as we together love God by opening our hearts to Jesus, growing our faith and serving our community and world in His name.



Disaster Response Grows, but Puerto Rico's Recovery is Slow

In Puerto Rico the 2018 hurricane season began June 1, with over 11,000 residents still lacking electrical power and an estimated 5,000 or more lives lost from the September 2017 hurricanes Maria and Irma, based on a new Harvard University study. But behind those numbers are many more people still struggling to overcome the sheer devastation the eight-month-old disaster caused to their lives, homes, churches, businesses and communities.

Hundreds of buildings that lost roofs are still covered by blue tarps. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has removed most of the debris, but much still remains. And while power has been restored to most of the 3.3 million residents, after the longest lasting power outage in modern U.S. history, Puerto Rico's repaired power grid is still fragile and could easily fail again if—or when—a new hurricane hits the island.

Thousands left island

Thousands have left the island, most of them to try to build new lives in New York and here in Pennsylvania. Those who remain are still waiting for needed repairs, for payment of insurance claims, for use of their homes and churches again... waiting for evidence that someone cares about them and their tiny, beleaguered U.S. territory.

The UM Committee on Relief (UMCOR) is among the many faith-based organizations trying to provide that evidence, working alongside the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). UMCOR has hired volunteer coordinators and other staff to work with UM Volunteers in Mission (UMVIM) teams, in cooperation with the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico (MCPR), based on its needs and priorities.

The relief agency approved grants of \$16.8 million to the MCPR in April, part of \$46 million approved for U.S. disaster relief in general, and on the heels of \$3.6 million in funds and eight cargo containers of supplies delivered there last fall. UMCOR also gave the MCPR \$1 million to repair 39 destroyed or damaged churches; and it has engaged churches in managing supplies and doing relief and recovery work for their communities.

Ruben Velez, director of logistics for the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico, told a UMVIM team in March that the island is finally transitioning from response to recovery and rebuild. The queue of work teams waiting to come is growing, as he works to match them with homes and churches needing help.

\$66,000 raised so far

Eastern PA Conference churches and members have given \$66,112 as of June 1 to the conference's Helping Puerto Rico Rise Again campaign, launched in January to support Methodist churches in recovery there. Some have also sent funds directly to UMCOR and possibly to partner churches in Puerto Rico. Fundraising efforts have included culinary competitions, dinner and bake sales, and mission offerings received at district events.

Churches sent offerings to Annual Conference in June. A special offering received there, and online giving will be available, all in hopes of surpassing the conference's \$100,000 goal.

In addition, the Rev. Nicolas Camacho of West Lawn UMC, who resources the campaign with information about relief needs and efforts in Puerto Rico, has submitted Annual Conference Resolution 2018-26, calling for a special conference-wide "Love Offering for Puerto Rico" in the fall to help with long-term recovery needs. He recommends the offering be received on Sept. 16, the first Sunday of National Hispanic-Latino Heritage Month.

"The extent of destruction and other challenges are so great that people and churches there will need all the help they can get for many years to come," said Camacho, who, like many of the Latino members of our conference, is from Puerto Rico. West Grove UMC will receive a special offering on September 16th.
