"Of anything beyond these, my child, beware. Of making many books there is no end, and much study is a weariness of the flesh. The end of the matter; all has been heard. Fear God, and keep God's commandments; for that is the whole duty of everyone." Ecclesiastes 12:12-14

Is there every a moment when you have learned enough? A friend's daughter wondered this recently. She had been to school. She had learned. She had figured it out. And since she had put in one year, she was pretty sure, she was done. You and I can be a bit like this, too. I've read the Bible. ONCE. I've read the book of Matthew or Luke or maybe even, the epistle of Romans, ONCE. And now, we know the Bible. We are pretty sure we are done.

How wearying it can feel to each of us in our fifth year of returning to school or reading the book of Ezra? Can there be anything new that God is saying to us? Is it possible that our life has changed in any way since we read it last?

As buses start to slow us down on the roads in the morning, I invite you, not only to pray for educators and students, but to return to discipleship yourself. I invite you to return to your books as well. Return to the book of Numbers and Acts, Mark and Isaiah, Philippians and 1st Kings.

Now, here is the place where you and I need to be very honest with each other. We all have favorites. We might not have favorite children (I certainly do not!), but many of us have favorite biblical books. Some of us prefer the narrative stories of gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke). The emotional and musical Psalms find a home in the heart of some. Other like the gospel of John for the salvation style miracles of Jesus. Others love Romans as epistle for the classic law book, they can follow. The Sunday School stories of Genesis call to many. Myself, I am partial to Philippians, as uplifting letter that always gives me hope. We could probably highlight most books for one reason or another.

However, each of the sections of the biblical witness needs the others. The Gospels need the prophets to foretell the coming of the Christ. The writings refer to the historical books. The epistles and lean on the Pentateuch to tell the beginnings of faith. With one missing, we do not have a full biblical witness. I want to challenge you as you get back into the swing of discipleship to evaluate where you have been reading in the Bible recently?

- Do you you always pick up the Gospels?
 Turn to Genesis!
- Do you always read Revelation? Read 1st Kings!
- Is your go to reading in Psalms? Pick up 1st Corinthians!

God is still moving, and I can only imagine, God might have more to say. We are not done yet. Thanks be to God.

LIFE OF DAVID Wednesdays at 7:00 P.M. (Beginning September 12) West Grove UMC Sanctuary

In this 13 week study (led by Pastor Jim) we will delve into the story of David. There are several reasons why we should take on this study:



- **David's story is exciting.** A shepherd boy who has an encounter with a giant named Goliath trusts in God and he defeats this experienced warrior with his faith, a sling and a stone. There are "chance" encounters in caves and deserts, beautiful women and palace intrigue. He escapes with his life by pursuits from two kings, King Saul and then his own son, Absalom. David prevails and becomes King of Israel. It's going to be exciting to study his life.
- **David's story is inspiring.** This mighty warrior is a committed believer and a prolific singer-songwriter, whose lyrics still inspire us today, some 3000 years later. He has learned to trust God in the depths of depression and the extremes of danger and he knows how to offer high praises to God. David's story points us to our God.
- **David's story is human.** This lover of God has flaws that threaten to destroy his spirit, his family and his position as king. We see a man who falls very low, but repents to takes God's grace and mercy and is restored and redeemed.
- **David's story is manly.** His life helps us see how a great warrior and leader David is as he integrates his faith in his daily life with that of being a king. He shows that men can have a very strong faith in God.
- **David's story is ongoing.** God chose him to be the ancestor of our Lord, the Son of David and the Son of God Jesus of Nazareth. This is supported by the Davidic Covenant, one of the most important themes in the Bible.

Spiritual Practices for Going Back to School by Sandy Miller

School is back in session! Although you may be ready for the academic routine, young people will be diving back into schoolwork, homework, sports, rehearsals, exams, papers, and more. Finding time to be with God and to love their neighbors will be harder than ever.

You can shape the way your students will experience this school year. Whether you invite students to partner with you or to do it on their own, encourage the youth in your life to cultivate these back-to-school practices as they return to the hallowed halls of elementary, middle, or high school.

- Listening. Pay attention to teachers and coaches. Be there for friends. Be open to God's nudges. Start each day by praying, "Speak, Lord. I'm listening."
- Perseverance. When life is tough, don't give up. Press on in faith to achieve your goals. Find accountability partners to walk with you and to help you stay focused.
- Questioning. Wrestle with God's Word. Don't be afraid to ask God questions. Join a small group that can help you grapple with faith questions for which you have no answers.
- Sabbath. Make rest a priority. Seek balance. Find ways to refresh—body, mind, and spirit. Schedule "gimme a break" times in your planner—and keep them!
- Noticing. Observe the ways God shows up in unexpected people or places. Marvel at the fingerprints of God clearly evident in nature, in other people, and in the shaping of your life.
- Hospitality. Befriend the new kid. Welcome the stranger. Include those who are left out. Ask God to help you accept and appreciate what is strange or unique about you.
- Loving Yourself. Be OK with not being perfect. Show yourself a little compassion and grace. Discover things you like—or love—about yourself, and create an "I Like Me" list.
- Showing Respect. Love and respect go hand in hand. Learn to respect others by getting to know them. Share your story, and listen lovingly to the stories of others.
- Prayer. Pray throughout the day. Talk with God as you do with friends. Don't just go through the motions; be honest with God. Pray that you might become an answer to your prayers.



UNITED METHODIST MEN

Helping Men Grow In Christ, So Others May Know Christ.

All men from our congregation are invited to join the Lanchester United Methodist Men (UMM). It is a cluster of five local churches that meet monthly (September-June) on a rotating basis for dinner, singing, sharing, and a presentation each evening. Except for November and June, and our end of the season Family Night dinner, all meetings are held on the fourth Monday of the month. Dinner starts at 6:45 and we finish around 8:30.

Our present cluster of churches includes Cochranville UMC, Pomeroy UMC, Faith Community UMC, Kemblesville UMC, Fremont UMC and Parkesburg UMC.

Monthly meetings include a dinner served by the hosting church, followed by singing of a few hymns. ending with a speaker or other entertainment chosen by the hosting church. Over the years we have had a wide range of people in this spot. Some giving their testimony, chaplains from local VA hospitals and prisons, fish and game wardens, war veterans, comedians, musical groups, and storytellers just to name a few.

Our November meeting at Parkesburg UMC is "Children's Night". This program is geared for entertainment for both children and adults. Our June meeting is "Family Night" and welcomes our church families to the Christiana Fire Hall for an evening of fellowship and entertainment.

Our fundraiser each year is our collection of toys and gifts for the Methodist Home for Children in Philadelphia. During the month of November each church collects toys for the children and gifts for the single women living at this location or one of their satellite facilities. All unwrapped toys and gifts are then brought to Parkesburg UMC. Then in the beginning of December all are encouraged to meet at Parkesburg UMC to load up the toys and gifts in enclosed pickup trucks where we then carpool into Philadelphia for delivery. After unloading we get an escorted tour of the facility. We usually stop at Olive Garden for lunch before heading home.

We will plan our fall projects including quilts and pillow cases for Family Promise. Our expected schedule is to meet the first and third Fridays. Places





5 WAYS TO MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR DOCTOR VISIT

Primary care visits can be challenging. You've spent time waiting for the appointment—perhaps weeks—and then the minutes seem to fly by. How can you respect the physician's time but also feel that you are fully and confidently participating in the care you receive?

- **Prepare.** Ahead of time, think through what you would like to discuss. If you have an ongoing complaint, try to discover if anyone else in your family suffers from the same condition. A thorough family history helps your provider better understand you as an individual. It's all right to take notes into the appointment with your questions.
- **Speak up.** Medical providers are trained to evaluate symptoms and decide what is causing them. If you have personal or family history that worries you, say something. Even if what's on your mind is not a worry, amid the many questions and boxes that get checked during an appointment, at any point you can say, "There's something I want to be sure I have a chance to say."
- **Be honest.** Don't hide embarrassing symptoms. Even when discussing medications, don't diminish side effects that might be making your life uncomfortable—a doctor cannot treat what he or she is not aware of.
- **Listen reflectively.** Ask for clarification when you need to. For example, "So my choices are X or Y and you think X is best because ... " or "If I decide I'd rather wait to do the test, my risk is ... " Understanding your treatment plan, even just a medication choice, helps you fully participate in your own healing.
- **Double-check.** Most doctors will ask, "Do you have any questions?" at the close of the visit. Check any notes you made ahead of the appointment to double-check you asked all your questions. Make sure you leave with instructions for what follow-up forms or tests you will be responsible for and when to schedule your next appointment to be sure you're following through on your end of the doctor-patient partnership.



EASTERN PENNSYLVANIA CONFERENCE NEWS

CONFERENCE, CHURCHES RALLY TO RECOVER FROM RECENT FLOODS

Donations, volunteers needed for disaster response

"The Eastern PA Conference is operating in full disaster response phase," said Disaster Response Coordinator Robert Simcox this week. "We are supporting the Schuylkill County area in flood relief."

County residents are struggling to recover physically and emotionally from a July double-drenching of relentless rain storms. But experienced, volunteer work teams and individuals are direly needed to help clear damaged, molded items out of flooded homes and perform related tasks.

"Volunteers are needed immediately now and in the coming year," said Simcox. "They will be working with the community in the recovery and rebuilding phase."

That work includes listening to and consoling residents to help them overcome the emotional toll of the storms' destruction.

With residents trying to overcome the destruction and depression caused by back-to-back bad storms, more funds are needed, along with more hands-on help from kind-hearted, Christ-minded volunteers.

Donations to the conference's Disaster Recovery Advance Special Fund (Project #0345) can be addressed and sent to the Conference Treasurer's Office, Eastern PA Conference UMC, P.O. Box 820, Valley Forge, PA 19482. Gifts may be designated for "North District Flood Relief."

RESTORATIVE JUSTICE

The biblical concept of justice focuses on the victim, the offender and the community, in the hope of restoring all to a sense of God's wholeness. It is also important to understand that our Methodist heritage is rich with examples of ministries carried out in jails and prisons. John and Charles Wesley had a passion for those in prison. As early as 1778, the Methodist Conference adopted action making it the duty of every Methodist preacher to minister to those who were incarcerated. United Methodists have reaffirmed and expanded the mandate for prison ministry and reform in many different chapters of our denominational history. This is a part of our identity and call.

- The USA has 5% of the world's population, but 25% of the world's prisoners.
- In 2009, Pennsylvania was rated #1 in the United States for prison growth.
- An average of 1200 persons are currently in the Lancaster County Prison each week, of

- which 78% are detainees awaiting court action, and 55% have committed less serious, non-violent offenses.
- At least 1300 minor children in Lancaster Country have incarcerated parents.
- All children are negatively affected by limited or no contact with their incarcerated parent(s). Many children are plagued with shame, guilt, and anger.

The special called 2019 General Conference, set for Feb. 23-26 in St. Louis, will focus on moving the denomination past its decades-long struggle with issues around homosexuality. Proposed plans offer a way to stay together and ways to split.

The One Church Plan, Traditional Plan and Connectional Conference Plan and probably several other pieces of legislation related to homosexuality will be debated and voted on by 864 delegates from around the globe.

In the meantime, United Methodists are pondering and praying about the three plans.

The proposed legislation was the work of the 32-member Commission on a Way Forward, approved at the end of General Conference 2016.

"My greatest prayer as we approach General Conference 2019 is that we will seek to love one another in the midst of significant disagreement," said the Rev. Beth Ann Cook, an Indiana pastor and a delegate.

Key issues of the Traditional Plan affirm current language in the Book of Discipline which bans "self-avowed and practicing" gay clergy and the blessing of same sex unions. It would also enforce those bans swiftly and strictly.

The plan's legislative petitions also provide a way for churches and annual conferences that disagree with strict enforcement to set up selfgoverning or "autonomous, affiliated or concordant" churches or conferences.

The Rev. Michael D. Grant, Ohio pastor, said the Traditional Plan is the only one with a "gracious exit option for those who cannot in good conscience live within our system." That is one of three reasons he supports this plan.

The Rev. David Wilson, conference superintendent of the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference and a delegate, supports the One Church Plan. "I feel like the One Church Plan gives annual conferences more flexibility on our specific ministry contexts. After reading the other plans they seem less flexible and are more punitive than seeking to find

common ground in which we can work together," he said.

Key elements of the One Church Plan include eliminating the Book of Discipline language, "The United Methodist Church does not condone the practice of homosexuality and considers this practice incompatible with Christian teaching."

Also deleted is the requirement that ordained clergy cannot be "self-avowed practicing homosexuals." Each annual conference board of ordained ministry and clergy session may determine standards for ordination or certification, including standards related to human sexuality.

The plan also allows ordained clergy to perform same-sex marriages but does not require them to do so. Churches can vote on whether to hold same-sex marriages in their buildings. Clergy are also free to transfer to other conferences or churches based on the standards for ordination regarding homosexuals.

The Connectional Conference Plan would replace the five U.S. jurisdictions with three connectional conferences that are "values-based" rather than geographic in nature.

The denomination's current central conferences, which are outside the U.S., could join one of the three U.S. conferences to form a global conference or create their own connectional conference. However, the individual annual conferences that disagree with the decision of their central conference have the option of voting to join a different connectional conference.

Each connectional conference would create its own Book of Discipline that includes items "commonly agreed upon by United Methodists," with the authority to adapt other items not included in a General Book of Discipline.
