"I love you, O Lord, my strength. The Lord is my rock and my fortress and my deliverer, my God, my rock, in whom I take refuge, my shield, and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold. I call upon the Lord, who is worthy to be praised, and I am saved from my enemies." Psalm 18: 1-3

Music can change the atmosphere of any room. Walk from the grocery store with music you know and can sing along to, to a store with music you have never heard, and your apprehension grows. Your shoulders begin to creep up and you are less likely to purchase anything.



Steve Bell, a noted Christian singer-songwriter, leaves it to others to parse the theological implications of his art. But of this he is certain: "I just know that when I sing and I play, things happen for folks that I can't really control. They seem to be good for the most part, but I do see that there's a tilling of soil." 1

Music touches our brains and souls in ways that sermons and speeches do not.

WHAT MUSIC IS THE BEST?

Musical notes Turns out, whether it's rock 'n' roll, jazz, hip-hop or classical, your gray matter prefers the same music you do. "It depends on your personal background," Yonetani says. For a while, researchers believed that classical music increased brain activity and made its listeners smarter, a phenomenon called the Mozart effect. Not necessarily true, say Sugaya and Yonetani. In recent studies, they've found that people with dementia respond better to the music they grew up listening to. "If you play someone's favorite music, different parts of the brain light up," Sugaya explains. "That means memories associated with music are emotional memories, which never fade out — even in Alzheimer's patients."

We can praise God, hear God, listen for God - all through music. We can fall in love, discern new steps in relationships, break out of unhealthy relationships - all through music. Elton John famously,

"music has a healing power. It has the ability to take people out of themselves for a few hours." Music can call us back to reflect on God and God's praise when we have been reflecting on ourselves. It is so easy to focused on one idea or problem to the exclusion of seeing where God is moving. Music opens our ability to use different centers of the brain, when we may otherwise feel constrained. Listening to, playing, reading, and creating music involves practically every part of the brain. In the book "This Is Your Brain on Music," Daniel J. Levitin explains that listening to music first involves subcortical structures like cochlear nuclei, the brain stem, and the cerebellum. It then moves up to auditory cortices on both sides of the brain. And when you hear music, listening also involves the memory centers in the brain, such as the hippocampus and lowest parts of the frontal lobe. Tapping along with the music gets your cerebellum involved. Reading music involves the visual cortex, and listening to or recalling lyrics will involve language centers in the temporal and frontal lobes.(3)

Whether you prefer organ or guitars, drums or flutes, meditative volumes or amplified sounds, music provides an opportunity for theological reflection and connection with community and God. A whole body connection that takes you beyond yourself, uniting you with a larger community, and like the psalmist singing the transcendent *praise of God*.

May you find the language of praise, question, witness, testimony, and joy that speaks to your soul and let music bring joy and praise!

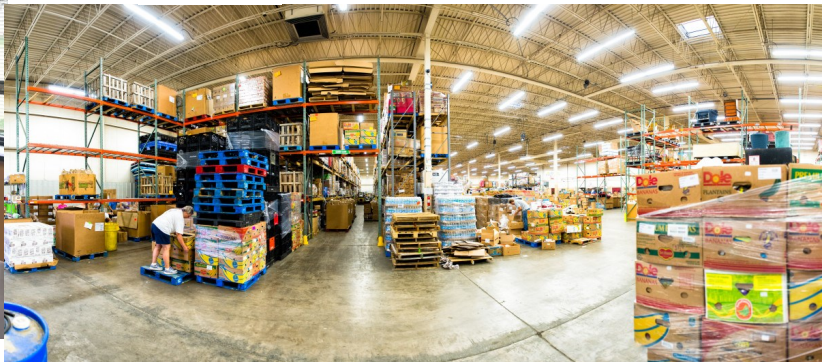
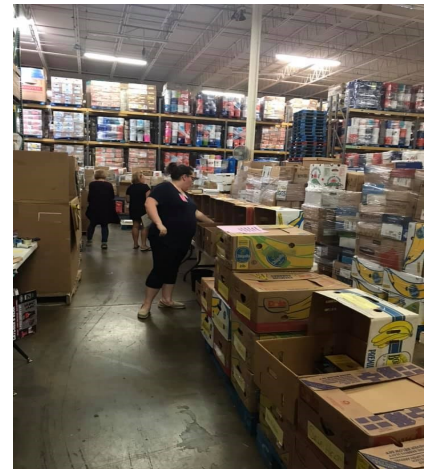
August COFFEE FELLOWSHIP—Hosted by: Youth Ministry

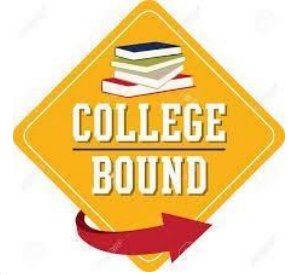

But how much do you know about sunscreen and sun protection? While the use of sunscreen on exposed skin as protection is common knowledge, the details sometimes get fuzzy. Sunscreen Know-how for Your Church

The sun's rays include ultraviolet A (UVA) and ultraviolet B (UVB) rays. Sunscreen Sun Protection Factor (SPF) measures the lotion's ability to block UVB rays only. To make sure your sunscreen blocks UVA rays, as well, look

for the words "broad spectrum" on your lotion bottle.

Sunscreens with zinc oxide are recommended because they block both UVA and UVB rays.



Seek shade where available. Keep in mind the sun's rays are usually strongest between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

Water and sand both reflect the sun's damaging rays, so use extra caution when out at the beach.

An SPF number does not constitute how many minutes you can be out in the sun. The number designates the length of time you can be out in the sun before you get sunburned. For example, an SPF of 30 means you can be out in the sun 30 times longer than if you had no sunscreen on without getting burned.



For the sunscreen to be effective, you need to use an ounce for exposed areas.

Use sunscreen every day you're outside, year-round. Even on cloudy days, the sun's rays can pierce through with up to 80 percent efficacy.

Typically, an adult should use a water-resistant, broad spectrum, SPF 30 or higher sunscreen and reapply every two hours or so.

We have a team in place that follows a thorough process in evaluating each situation that we are presented with. Please, if you know of anyone who is in a dire circumstance and could use temporary financial assistance, direct them to call the church office and a member of our team will contact the individual.

The Food Cupboard is going to undergo some positive changes beginning after Labor Day. The following will be put in place:

- An assembled team of volunteers to help manage and distribute the food
- Open hours of Thursdays from 3-6 pm will begin in our lobby
- Fresh foods will be provided during these hours based on the excess of our local grocers
- A standard inventory of items will be held that can provide complete meal ingredients, snacks, and essential personal and home care items that are not supported by welfare programs.
- The first of each month, a list of items in shortage will be provided for the congregation to help fill.
- Upgrades to our storage system will continue over time

ANNUAL CONFERENCE NEWS

Annual Conference 2019 ~Janice Bowers Report

I had the great privilege of being a delegate for WGUMC at Annual Conference June 13-15, 2019. Pastor Monica, Susan Paisley, and Pastor Shirley were wonderful at helping me navigate this first time experience.

We assembled each day at the Greater Philadelphia Expo Center with hundreds of other church's pastors and laity delegates. We experienced praise, worship, speakers, Holy conferencing, retirements, ordinations, and so much more. It was fascinating watching the business of the UMC in action.

The process of electing clergy and laity delegates for General Conference took place throughout the days. In order to be elected, 50% or more of the delegates must cast their votes for the individual. This protocol leads to many iterations of voting until the final cast of delegates is identified. Fortunately, voting for delegates this year was electronic so the process was able to be expedited.

Voting on resolutions brought to the Annual Conference was also a significant part of the gathering. The resolutions are published in advance and provided for in writing at the conference. Each resolution is presented by the person(s) responsible prior to being voted on. After the presentation, debate is opened to the floor with pros and cons being accepted in equal amounts. Finally, a majority vote by hand is taken. In the case that the votes are too close to call, then ushers take a physical count of hands.

Most resolutions were easily passed with visible majority votes. But, as we are in a year coming off of a heated General Conference and preparing to go into another, some of the resolutions took significant time and many voices were heard from. Two particular resolutions received considerable debate on the floor and required a physical count of hands. The first resolution was to change our motto from "Open Heart", "Open Minds", and "Open Doors" to add "Open Bibles" for completion. This resolution was not passed.

The second resolution that garnered much debate and shows of allegiance was the proposal to affirm in SPIRIT (not in discipline) that our conference wanted to support the "One Church Plan". People rose in great numbers to support both sides of this issue. By an ultimate count of hands, the resolution was passed. I look forward to seeing the direction our new delegates and all of the newly elected delegates to the General Conference ultimately lead the United Methodist Church turns in.

I thank everyone in the church for the opportunity to represent you and the voice of West Grove UMC at Annual Conference.

SUGGESTIONS FOR LOCAL CHURCHES

Be an ally—Create a Red Dress Display to raise awareness about violence against women and indigenous women in particular. An exhibit, “The REDress Project,” created by Jaime Black, a Metis Canadian artist, will give you a start. Do an online search for more information. Contact your legislatures

to ask them to pass laws that will protect women and girls against violence. A liturgy for “Remember Their Names,” created by the Rev. Suzanne Duchesne (Ph.D), is available here: [CONAM-Liturgy-MissingMurderedIndigenousWomen.pdf](#)

Research local geography for precolonial inhabitants, those who were removed, where and what happened to them, what place names remain. Search for historical markers or plaques for your county or local area. Go to the Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission website. For Historical Marker search, use “Indians” as your keyword.

Research the Doctrine of Discovery. Learn the history not taught in schools and share it with your small group or congregation. A good website: www.dofdmnno.org.

Storytelling—Find stories of Native peoples and their origins. Coyote Places the Stars by Harriet Taylor is a good example. Tell your own stories of how your ancestors came to settle on the land. Reflect on how your stories intersect with those of Native peoples. Note the impact of this intersection on both your settler ancestors and Native inhabitants. Incorporate these stories into a worship service.

Share stories about the impact you are making with your gifts to Native American Ministries Special Sunday Offering. Find them on the website at umcgiving.org. Rev. Terry Wildman’s story, “The Fall of Man,” can also be found there.

A Statement and Call to Respond to Racism in Our Current Political Discourse

Do you accept the freedom and power God gives you to resist evil, injustice and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves? I do.

“The Renunciation of Sin” is a fundamental promise in The United Methodist Church’s covenant of baptism and membership vows.

Stoking racist fears and slandering sisters and brothers of color are indeed evil sins that we are called to resist. Are we, as a nation, not better than this? Are we, who profess to be disciples of Jesus Christ and followers of his teachings, not better than this? And should we not demand more civility and fair-minded integrity of our elected leaders—especially of one whose responsibility is to represent the cherished values of our nation on behalf of all Americans?

It is dishonest, hypocritical and repugnant to claim that four racial-ethnic women who were elected to represent their diverse constituents in Congress “hate America” and are “incapable of loving America,” merely because they criticize administration policies, priorities and actions. Such a claim is itself un-American.

Watching our highest elected official revel in hate-filled chants of “Send her back!” and then condone those chants as patriotic should chill all of us to the core. These intemperate sentiments are deplorable, and they are proving to be dangerous.
