The other day, I forgot my phone.

I left early to spend the day at the hospital. Packing my backpack, I put in everything I could need: Bible, extra snacks, a book, a phone charger, my laptop, anointing oil. I checked the weather and put down my phone as I finished my coffee. It was a whole half-hour later until I realized that my appendage (my phone) was missing. For a half-hour, I had been praying in the car. On the way to the hospital, I prayed for our congregation and our community. I prayed for our nation and our world. I listened to God.

And then. I glanced at the clock. Ah, I thought. 6:09. My usual alarm will start in one minute. The birds! My alarm starts quietly with birds chirping until you are sure that they are right next to you in the room. I waited for the alarm to sing the sweet bird song. Nothing. Where were the birds?

I waited. *Is my phone under my wallet?* I pulled into a gas station thinking maybe I had just missed the songs, or the phone as buried deep in my backpack... Nope. I forgot my phone!

What would I do? How could I let anyone know where I was? How could I be tracked in case of an emergency? I began to feel a real sense of worry and lack.

For a whole day, I was going to be without my telephone, my email, my address book and contacts, my GPS, my camera, my scanner, my podcasts, my Siri and my google (i.e. instant answers to questions and quandaries) and much more! I considered turning around, but I would be too late. So, on I carried. Later in the day, I did need a phone. I borrowed one (people were delighted to oblige) for my call.

My seeming scarcity of resource ultimately alerted me to a different abundance. At one point, I sat waiting in an overfull waiting room. Usually, I would have been replying to emails on my phone. Today, that was not an option. For a moment, I felt only frustration and lack – if only I had remembered my phone. Then, I began to look around. My eyes were opened to the tenderness and care in the room. I saw sons moving chairs out of the way as fathers maneuvered walkers. I saw friends support one another after receiving challenging news. I saw daughters braiding cornrows lovingly into their mother's hair. I watched grandparents play hide-n-seek with children around chair arms. I would have missed the abundance of God's presence.

I wonder how often the Church is like this. Sometimes, we find ourselves focusing on what we are lacking and miss the abundance of what God has already given us. Stewardship calls us to know the joy of generosity and joy of being faithful disciples of Jesus. I would not have guessed forgetting my phone would have reminded me of God's wisdom about abundance and stewardship in hospital waiting room. Now, there were plenty of calls, emails, texts, and contacts to return. But the insight on God's abundance, when I initially focused on scarcity was worth the additional time.

Check on your strong pastor

I have been exposed to trauma my entire life.

It wasn't that the trauma always happened to me, but it was in and out of my



house a lot. Like a revolving door, the faces of broken people would walk through our front door and sit down on our couch and weep into the long hours of the night. Sometimes they would yell. Sometimes they would sit in silent prayer. Often times they would collapse.

Into the arms of my father. Most times with my mother right beside him.

My dad was a pastor for nearly 30 years. And it was in those 30 years, and even now in his current ministry position, that his heart is to bring hope to the hopeless and comfort for those who are unraveled. So very many of my childhood memories involved the front door creaking open late at night and broken people coming to my dad for wisdom and Biblical counsel. In addition to his full time pastoral job, for eight years he also served as the police chaplain in our city. And night after night, he would be called to scenes of crimes and accidents to, once again, be the bearer of hope and comfort to those who had been blindsided by life.

I am quite sure my dad has seen just about all of it.

My father has sat on our couch and in churches and in funeral homes and on curbsides and in jails. He held the hands of widows as their young husbands took their last breaths. He held couples as their children passed into the arms of Jesus before they ever got to take a breath. He went to accident sites where body parts were covering the streets and into homes where children had been killed. He poured into couples who sat on the brink of divorce and wrestled through their deepest pains with them. He negotiated gunman with hostages and held hostage's family members while they waited in agony for their loved ones to be released. He talked through questions of faith from "How do you know God exists?" to "Why would God let my husband kill himself?" and everything else in between.

He has selflessly walked through the valley of the shadow of death with friends and strangers alike and he has stared brokenness in the face more than one hundred people combined have in his lifetime. And after walking down into all of those valleys and through all of those shadows, he would come home to have very few who checked on him. And at the end of his ministry when he needed to be poured into the most, there were

even fewer at his side.

Many times, he was not recognized for his work or seen for the emotion he put into his job... into his Godgiven calling.

For thirty years, my father was the embodiment of love and he modeled a life of serving others. It

was the clearest calling that he had in his life – to be a fisher of men, and a giver of hope. And while no pastor goes into ministry with the intention of being praised or recognized, the church has often forgotten that they are still human.

That they still bleed. That they still have burdens. That they still have their own valleys and their own shadows.

They have forgotten that no one, not even the pastor, is immune to pain, and a need for hope to be extended to them. When tragedy strikes and no one knows who to call for help, usually the first suggestion is, "Do you have a pastor you can call?" No one ever thinks about who the pastor can call when it's them in the midst of crisis.

There was yet another young pastor who lost his life to suicide this week after struggling with depression and anxiety. I am so broken over it. Church, if this is not a wake-up call to invest in our pastors and their families, I don't know what is. Things like this don't just happen overnight. Mental illness is a real thing among Christian leaders and the weight of trauma in ministry is even more real.


Church, if not us then who?

October is Pastor Appreciation Month. Friends, we shouldn't have to need a month that tells us to check in on the shepherd of our flocks. We shouldn't be confined to just one month to pray for the leaders of our churches. Can you please not sit on this a day longer? Reach out to your pastor. Pray for your pastor. The weight that's on their heart is so much more than just Sunday mornings behind the pulpit. Come back to your pastor years after they met you in your brokenness and remind them that they aren't alone in theirs, either.

So who do you need to call today? Check on your strong pastor friend. Your phone call just might be the one they need.

My wish that every church going person would really read the words of this daughter, AND then do everything in their own personal power to let their pastor and pastors know that they are truly loved and appreciated and that they would, will, do everything in their power to love them and lighten their load. God Bless our Pastors







CLEAN WATER: Finding clean water is a daily challenge for Masai people, who start each day walking miles to fetch dirty water from the nearest stream. Your generous financial donation has enabled us to dig two wells: one at Mangaevillage. The impact the well made on the village is immediate and life-changing. When the well brought water, we saw on the faces of the Masai people something quite moving. We could sense and see their joy and happiness - all

because someone cared enough to provide funds enabling tous to dig a well so that they can receive one of the necessities of life: water. Thank you!

SCHOOL DINING HALL: The construction of the dining hall has been completed. Our students can now able to sit on chairs and eat from the table.
