Mulligan. Do-Over. Try Again. Second Chance.

Have you ever wanted to just climb under the table and hide after you did something or something happened to you?

Over 55% of people who do not come to church say that is why they do not come. They find churches to be judgmental. 55% of people in our area say that churches and church people are too judgmental. They would like to have a second chance at life. They would like to experiment and try it out.

Our God has a lot to say about this. God's grace goes before God. God's grace is prevenient - before we think about God, God has already thought about us in love.

The first 17 verses of Matthew many people skip over. They read right over all of the begats and "fathers of" until they get to when they read 'this is how the birth of Jesus happened.' Boy, are they missing out!

Now, I know the names might give you pause in pronunciation. I know it might seem like genealogy, when you can barely keep straight your own family. But I want to tell you, the first seventeen verses of Matthew are a study in second (and third) chances. God is always giving people lots of opportunities to be a part of the family of God. This family tree is full of those who could have left out.

When you are studying the first chapter in the book of Matthew, you get a glimpse into characters

like Abraham and Issac, David, and Solomon. You also have the opportunity to reflect on Bathsheba, whose husband was murdered, and Ruth, a migrant who cared for her mother in law, Rahab, a cunning businesswoman who cared for her family and Tamar, clever woman who taught her fatherin-law to fulfill his obligations. These characters are integral parts of the salvific history of Jesus Christ.

Good news isn't good news, unless it is good news for everyone! And the birth of Jesus is good news for absolutely everyone! Jesus was born so that everyone could know God and God's way!

Some people have felt excluded by the church for their own actions. Others have not felt connected to church because of church actions. Be a part of welcoming your brothers and sisters back home to God in relationship as well as to church.

This Advent and Christmas, who can you share that we are a church of second and third chances? We offer to people as many chances as God gives. We invite our brothers and sisters to come home to God. We encourage them to find themselves at home in Jesus the Christ.

Join us on December 5th as we hand out our hot cocoa and lead caroling at the West Grove town center at the Christmas Tree lighting. We are delighted to have received a United Methodist Communications grant to assist us in this effort. We are utilizing the grant funds in the UnWrap Christmas effort. Help us invite our community to come home to West Grove UMC for Christmas.

Let the light of Christ's love shine through you to invite others back home.





WEST GROVE UMC FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Our church financial condition has been stable through the ten months ended October 31, 2019; although, for the month of October, we incurred a cash shortfall. In October, we received income of \$23,431 and incurred \$37,980 of expenses resulting in an excess of expenses over cash received in the amount of \$14,549. This was primarily due to a lower four week offering, along with the CMO payroll reimbursement which was deposited in November.



For the year-to-date ten month period ended October 31, 2019, we received total income of \$326,229 and incurred total expenses of \$318,484 resulting in an excess of cash received over expenses in the amount of \$7,745. Our 2019 apportionments were \$27,004 in arrears as of October 31. At our recent Finance Meeting, we reviewed our overall financial condition and agreed to pay \$13,484 (three months apportionments) toward this arrearage. As a result, we will be paid up through July. We have made significant progress in meeting our apportionments obligation and we will meet again in December to determine how much additional we can pay by year end.





Powell to retire as DCM, with Taylor-Storm as successor



Bishop Peggy Johnson announced

the retirement of the Rev. Anita Powell as Eastern PA Conference Director of Connectional Ministries (DCM) and the appointment of the Rev. Dawn Taylor-Storm as her successor, effective July 1, 2020. Taylor-Storm is currently Superintendent of the South District and was recently Dean of the Cabinet.

Bishop Johnson praised Powell's service and accomplishments as DCM the past two years. She was previously Superintendent of the former Central District in 2011-2017, after planting Church of the Open Door as a new church start in Kennett Square in 2001.

"Dr. Powell has built successful relationships across this annual conference, our jurisdiction and the general church during her tenure," she said. "She has encouraged cooperation and communication among the ministries under her charge and demonstrated humility coupled with mindful problem-solving in all her work. We wish her and her dear husband, Marvin, the very best."

"God has truly blessed me with the privilege of serving the church and conference as a pastor, district superintendent and Director of Connectional Ministries," said Powell. "Being in ministry with clergy, congregations, Conference staff, and committees has been a highlight in my life, stretching and challenging me, while also bringing me much meaning and joy. I will especially remember the relationships I have formed, and the many situations which have informed and formed me. To all of you, I am deeply grateful."

Taylor-Storm became Superintendent of the former Southeast District in 2014, after serving as pastor of St. Matthew's UMC of Valley Forge. She previously served White Haven UMC. Her introduction to ministry was as a Global Ministries Mission Intern serving at a community center in San Marcos, Texas.

"Rev. Taylor-Storm has demonstrated the power of the connection through her work in the Democratic Republic of Congo, where the South District raised funds to build and develop a pediatric clinic, an eye clinic, and a life skills program," wrote Bishop Johnson in her announcement. "She looks forward to bringing a missional focus to the work of the DCM and seeks to encourage churches to join together in rebuilding communities, making disciples and offering the hope of the Gospel."

"I have seen firsthand the reason why the connectional church matters and what the body of Christ is capable of when we serve in mission together," Taylor-Storm wrote in an acknowledgment letter to her district, as she recalled the ministry strides made during her five-year tenure. "Together, we have worked to seek God's vision for abundant life for all people, from here on the South District, to the Democratic Republic of Congo."

"Tear Down This Wall"

A Pastoral Letter By Bishop Peggy Johnson

This week is the 30th anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall in Germany. This wall was erected after the second World War and it divided East and West Berlin.

During The United Methodist Church's Council of Bishops fall meeting our bishops from Germany testified about the jubilation and amazement felt when the wall came down. People were able to move about freely from one side to the other. Not a single shot was fired.

Humanity is well-acquainted with walls, not only physical walls but the walls of difference that are found in hearts and minds. We are quick to erect attitudinal walls around our differences and our beliefs.

Walls create alienation, separation, fear, distrust and violence. Such a wall stops ministry dead in its tracks, and it is never the will of God. God sent Jesus to deal with walls. Ephesians 2:14 says "For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility."

A wall of separation in the UMC

United Methodists are well-acquainted with a wall of separation about the marriage and ordination of members of the LGBTQIA+ community. Our Book of Discipline states that all people are of sacred worth, but it includes a wall concerning the practice of homosexuality being "contrary to Christian teaching."

At the 2019 General Conference the traditional prohibition against the practice of homosexuality was maintained, same gender marriages continued to be banned, and it was expanded to include more enforcement and a broader scope of what defines homosexuality. There were also more additions to the process of filing complaints against people who engage in practices found in the list of "chargeable offenses." Being a self-avowed and practicing homosexual and performing a same-gender wedding are on that list. The added measures will be effective on January 1, 2020.

I write this pastoral letter to the flock of God in the Eastern Pennsylvania and the Peninsula-Delaware conferences, my beloved Philadelphia Area. It is a passionate plea that you do not engage in filing complaints around the issue of homosexuality. It simply exacerbates the painful, formidable wall that stands between people of good will who have different hearts.

Homosexuality complaints and trials do harm

Complaints and trials do an enormous amount of harm to everyone. Our baptism vows call us to "resist evil, injustice and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves." Nothing good can come from this battering. We can never legislate a heart.

As your bishop I am bound to receive and process complaints, but I do not believe it is helpful to engage in church trials. So, I will not refer any such complaints for a church trial. I say this not out of a sense of rebellion against the rules in our Book of Discipline but out of my pastor's heart that wishes to defend the people of our conferences against this destructive, divisive and expensive process.

The complaint paragraphs in the UM Book of Discipline call for a resolution that focuses on repairing any harm to people and communities and that can bring healing to all parties. Instead of filing a complaint, I suggest that those who have experienced harm begin with a conversation.

Engage people with whom you disagree. Hear their

hearts and engage in humble inquiry about a person's life story and perspective. Explain where the harm is and craft a peace plan. And most importantly, pray with each other!

Power of prayer to tear down walls, build a just peace

When I visited Germany last year and toured the former site of the Berlin Wall, our guide said that the Communist government was "no match for prayer and our candlelight vigils." The power of the risen Lord is available for us to tear down our walls, but we need to have the humble will to work at it and pray for it.

Is this not what Paul meant in Romans 12:18 when he said, "As far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all"? I humbly suggest that you engage in these steps before sending a complaint to my office.

We are living in a "liminal" (transitional) time as we prepare for the May 5-15, 2020, General Conference. At that conference delegates will consider how we as a denomination can maximize our witness and craft a form of unity that brings a new wind of hope for all people.

Catch sight of God's vision of a church that is busy making disciples of Jesus Christ, a church that is engaging in ministry and mission, a church striving for equality and equity for all people.

We can only get there as we employ with grace all of the giftedness of the Body of Christ, not just one "side" or the other. Dividing our church would cut off some of our needed giftedness. We can only accomplish this vibrant ministry as we take down the walls in our hearts and "do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with our God." (Micah 6:8)

I close this letter with two verses of a hymn that was sung in Germany during the dismantling of the Berlin Wall. It spread like wildfire around the churches, both East and West, as people yearned for freedom and unity. May it be a song in all of our hearts as well:

Have faith is God's new pathways, walk on in this new day.

God hopes you'll be a blessing for all upon the way.

The one who in the days gone by breathed life in us and hope,

Will lead us to the place where God wants and needs us most.

Have faith in God who shows us new paths that lead to life.

It's God who comes to meet us, the future is in God's hand.

Who follows God is full of hope, now and forevermore.

The door for us is open, the land is bright and free.

*"Tear down this wall" was the appeal U.S. President Ronald Reagan made in his Berlin Wall speech in West Berlin, Germany, on June 12, 1987.
