Many of the people who have been coming to the Mighty Writers food distributions on Fridays make it very clear to many of us that they are extremely grateful. On most



Fridays, over 250 families have been served with fresh produce, diapers, children lunches, milk, eggs, and dry goods including bread. One of the great joys I have had serving here this past year is

seeing and getting to know these families and especially the children. These are children who often have had to sit in the car for forty-five minutes to an hour, waiting for the boxes of donated food to be placed inside. Most of them they are either smiling to us or fast asleep. Throughout these weeks since February, we have received about thirty payer requests. Although it has been several weeks since I handed out the last form, I'm still receiving them and look forward to handing out more as the weather has turned more mild and we can connect with people. We need to always be ready to offer prayer. Please continue to keep them in your prayers, and continue to pray for our community and how we can effectively reach out in Christ's love.

I'll be posting the notes on a lobby/narthex bulletin board. The Mighty Writers have continued to make adjustments to effectively serve our community. We started having some issues with traffic backing up, and they hired the local police, paid them the overtime rate, to come for about a month to direct the traffic. The officers came up with the process of having people wait in their cars at the park. Staff

with walkie talkies monitor the flow of traffic, so that it no longer backs up on the road. When we compare the little bit of extra effort and sharing it took on the part of our church to make such a huge impact in our community, we can look at the Mighty Writers and their ministry as a huge blessing. I certainly do. We trust God will help us discern how we can move forward to help the children and their families learn English and Spanish, and the empowerment that can result when we share our friendship, fellowship, and faith together. The thought that continues to touch me, is that I learned how to read and write in church, so how can we help others do the same? Please keep our efforts in your prayers.

Bible Study/Sunday School

Towards the second half of May, I am looking forward to begin offering a time of fellowship in Bible study during the week, and/or also during the Sunday school hour, when we will study the Beatitudes and the Sermon on the Mount together. We give a great thanks to Jim Mundell for leading a Bible



study during Lent that was very well attended with lots of free-flowing questions and thoughts that broadened our view of the last week of the life of Jesus and the time of Resurrection. Jim is also looking forward to offering additional Bible studies in the next month. We want to overcome the dangers we face in continuing to further our isolation. We look forward to renewing our fellowship, our friendships and the deepening of our faith together and invite you to join us. Several other studies are also are possible this summer. CMO Preschool Preparing for Summer



Under some extremely challenging circumstances, our CMO preschool has done a great job this past year offering a great start to children on their path of formal learning. It's hard to believe, but they are

soon ready for their summer break. While one family whose child attends our school tested positive, there were no instances of infection being shared here. We give a great thanks to the whole staff and everyone who helped keep our facilities sanitized this past year. The children did a great job of keeping their masks on and following instructions to work together in community to protect one another. It looks like the year ahead is full of promise as we continue to move beyond the virus and reach out to prepare for the September season. Heather Smalley has been interviewing families in preparation for classes in September, and they are also searching for an additional teacher and teacher's aide. It is a great joy to continue to offer this vital ministry to our community.

Tools for Ministry recordings now online to offer more learning

Like a good toolbox, this year's Tools for Ministry online leadership academy, held March 13, is still available and useful. At least 26 of the 34 diverse, 90-minute courses,

all provided via video conferencing on **Zoom, were recorded.** A page full of links to those recordings is now available on the (click on link) **conference website**.

The conference was forced to offer Tools for Ministry fully online for the first time because of the COVID-19 pandemic. But that alternative presented at least two silver linings: convenient at-home attendance and



these recordings made available for those who were limited to taking just two courses that Saturday morning.

Some may want to learn more from other courses; and some may

want to review or share with others what they learned that day. Indeed, these recorded courses can be viewed online along with study groups or entire congregations as a collective educational resource. And they may point to online alternative considerations when future Tools for Ministry events are planned.



While I don't read it very often, I recently read an article in the New York Times and also heard some commentary on television, addressing how we are handling our fear of the virus and vaccinations.

A Fable

A federal judge and Yale law professor named Guido Calabresi, invented a little fable that he has been telling his law students for more than thirty years. He tells the students to imagine a god coming forth to offer society a wondrous invention that would improve everyday life in almost every way. It would allow people to spend more time with friends and family, see new places and do jobs they otherwise could not do, and provide great freedoms to everyone who used it. But it would also come with a high cost. In exchange for bestowing this invention on society, the god would choose 1,000 young men and women and strike them dead.

Calabresi then asks: Would you take the deal? Consistently, almost all the students say no. Then the professor shares the fable's lesson: "Well what's the difference between this and the automobile?"

In reality, automobiles kill far more than 1,000 young Americans each year; the total U.S. death toll is usually around 40,000. We accept this toll, almost unthinkingly, because vehicle crashes have always been part of our lives. We can't begin to think about a world without our cars. We've become accustomed to them, and have built our lives with a great need for them. It's a classic example of human irrationality about risk. We often underestimate large, chronic dangers we face every day, like car crashes or pollution, and fixate on unusual and prominent, strikingly dramatic risks, like plane crashes or shark attacks.

One way for a risk to become strikingly fearful is for it to be new. That's a core idea in the fable the professor tells. He is asking his students to consider whether they would accept the cost of vehicle travel if it did not already exist. When they say no their response underscores the very different ways we treat new risks and enduring ones.

When we compare the fable to Covid-19, we can gain some perspective. The virus has certainly been a risk we needed to come to terms with every day, in most every part of our lives. It totally changed our lives, forced us into new patterns of living and relationships for over a year. And it will require many adjustments to our lives, as we go forward, changes that will require patience and empathy to move through. The ever-present nature of its impact has affected human beings universally, and we can see more clearly how we must work together in the world. What happens in one small part of the world, may have a huge impact among all human beings, for bad or for good.

Fortunately the virus is in practical terms curable,

controllable when we are willing to take the steps required to guard community. The vaccines have for the most part eliminated death from the virus; they have also lowered the likelihood of being hospitalized. There are other dangers we face every day in life that we have come to accept, that are quickly becoming once again, much more of a danger to us. It is most likely for most of us who have been vaccinated that if we

do get the virus it will not be worse than a common cold. Yet because of its universal, pervasive nature, and the drama that we have all been through this past year, even vaccinated people continue to quite naturally obsess over the risks of contracting the virus. As Christians, we are motivated by God to help one another thought the fears, concerns, and any lingering dangers.

Faithful Responses

Motivated and guided by faith, we have a great empowerment in our hearts and minds to move forward. Christ is with us. Helping us with creative responses to the challenges we face is what the promise of the Holy Spirit is all about. The joy in the vision of moving forward to a time when we can openly be ourselves in a closeness with others, appears like a vision of heaven. Moments of reunion full of friendship, joy, and grace with handshakes and hugs are right before us. We have been preparing all of our lives for moment such as this. We can now see, hear, and share fellowship in person, and we will not be at the mercy of our computers, or turned into avatars. As Christians, it seems we, more than anyone else, are greatly prepared to make the most of the opportunities and possibilities we are blessed with, as we trust God in very real ways to keep us wise, patient, and full of empathy for other people. We need to see the freedom and empowerment we have, and choose to move forward together.

A year ago, it required major adjustments for us to keep to ourselves and limit our lives to lessen the risks to ourselves and others. Motivated by love, we wanted to protect our loved ones and our community. We did it and made incredible changes, for most of us it was only by the help of God. Today we are being set free. Now we have additional adjustments to make that we have been hopeful for, for a long time. Our close friendships in God's love helped us through the challenges on the journey a year ago, we now turn to God and our friends in faith to empower us today. Your presence in our fellowship, whether in worship or a small group, youth or Bible study, or a work day focused on the outdoors means a lot to us all. We look forward to sharing the great community of faith together, and pray you and your family will join us. We trust that God will continue to lift our sights and awareness beyond the narrowness that often imprisons us, to see the great joy and possibility before us.

Financial Assistance for Covid Related Funeral Expenses from FEMA

The COVID-19 pandemic has brought overwhelming grief to many families. At FEMA, our mission is to help people before, during and after disasters. We are dedicated to helping ease some of the financial stress and burden caused by the virus.

Under the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2021 and the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, FEMA is providing financial assistance for COVID-19 related funeral expenses incurred after January 20, 2020.

Call this dedicated toll-free phone number to get a COVID-19 Funeral Assistance application completed with help from FEMA's representatives. Multilingual services will be available.

Fraud Alert: We have received reports of scammers reaching out to people offering to register them for funeral assistance. FEMA has not sent any such notifications and we do not contact people before they register for

Who is Eligible?

To be eligible for funeral assistance, you must meet these conditions:

• The death must have occurred in the United States, including the U.S. territories, and the

District of Columbia.

- The death certificate must indicate the death was attributed to COVID-19.
- The applicant must be a U.S. citizen, non-citizen national, or qualified alien who incurred funeral expenses after January 20, 2020.
- There is no requirement for the deceased person to have been a U.S. citizen, non-citizen national, or qualified alien.

If you had COVID-19 funeral expenses, we encourage you to keep and gather documentation. Types of information should include:

- An official death certificate that attributes the death directly or indirectly to COVID-19 and shows that the death occurred in the United States, including the U.S. territories, and the District of Columbia.
- Funeral expenses documents (receipts, funeral home contract, etc.) that includes the applicant's name, the deceased person's name, the amount of funeral expenses, and the dates the funeral expenses happened.
- Proof of funds received from other sources specifically for use toward funeral costs. We are not able to duplicate benefits received from burial or funeral insurance, financial assistance received from voluntary agencies, government agencies, or other sources.

How Funds are Received

If you are eligible for funeral assistance you will receive a check by mail, or funds by direct deposit, depending on which option you choose when you apply for assistance.



Do you receive the weekly Constant Contact emails from the church? We publish a Weekly West

Grove Wednesday edition and a Sunday Sneak-a-Peek about the sermon on Sunday and other information, including a link to the

week's bulletin. If you are not receiving these two emails, perhaps you elected to unsubscribe or they are being treated as spam and are going directly to trash.

Children's Morning Out Preschool




Planting seeds, caterpillars, an ant farm, and fire trucks--and this was just one week here at the CMO! These are the most exciting days here in preschool.


We have been so very busy learning and playing each day. Spring is a season full of




