"Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised

from the dead, the first fruits
of those who have died." (I Corinthians 15:1214, 19-20)

For the Apostle Paul, resurrection was not just some theory or nice idea, and it was far more than what came out of the power of positive thinking. It was a great reality about his everyday life, and God's vision of where his life was leading in very real ways. He looked for God to bring forth new life and opportunities to share faith in fellowship every day. For he had met resurrected Jesus on the road to Damascus and from there his life was transformed. Life never stopped being transformed and sanctified as he responded every day to the new opportunities that God and life presented to him. Salvation has a way of expanding our hearts and minds. The reality of resurrection was found even in the moments when one would normally feel trapped, limited, attacked, and imprisoned in some way. With God's help and presence, he seized upon them as opportunities to live more deeply in the empowerment God provides. He did so by coming to terms even more clearly in the truth, even when the truth exposed his faults and sins.

God turned a crucifixion into resurrection. There is evidence of God working resurrection all around us every day. The God who created such



wonders and miracles of DNA and Stars in heaven, the precious nature of a child, or the wisdom of a person with years of deep life experiences, would not leave this creation alone. The promises of Christ are real. Resurrection is not just for special people like Jesus, he made the promise and offers the Covenant to all who will receive it. Creation reveals the character of God in many ways, "consider the lilies of the field, or the sparrow in the air." At times our view of God and the personal

possibilities for our lives may seem so distant, so theoretical and hard to see, yet because of the incredible nature of who and what we witness around us, we still trust and believe. And we strive to offer our lives as a witness for others.

This year, as we begin the season of Lent, we are blessed to have the witness of the Resurrection to empower us and give us hope in very real ways, as we move to claim the fullness of life that God has promised. Lent is a time to be even more intentional and truthful about how we are living in our faith, to be sure we are focused on God, and not distracted. We intentionally let go of the things that keep us from God. We have the great joy of ministry before us as the season revives our hearts, minds and souls, and the virus weakens. We invite you to celebrate and grow with us as we look to increase our opportunities for fellowship together. Join in the music, the friendship in Sunday School and Bible study, a travel log with potluck dinner, RAP, word day, and our efforts in ministry in our service groups. It is a joy to live life fully in Christ, and we look forward to getting to know one another more deeply, as we move through this spring.




April

Baptism & What Really Counts

A story was recently shared in the news about a priest in Arizona who baptized for 16 years, and many in the church are fearful that the baptisms "may not count." Apparently when he baptized, instead of saying, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit," he said, "We" baptize you. Many people are asking, "Huh? What does it matter?" They have been described as "botched" baptisms. One of many reasons why there are different denominations and churches in Christianity, is found in our approach and the ways we see and live out our baptisms. More than a vaccination against evil, baptism is a sign and means of God's grace. It is a beginning of life more deeply defined and centered in Christ, accepting that God has initiated and first loved us and offers us this incredible relationship in Jesus together. In

ordination, authority is anointed and entrusted upon an ordained pastor to teach and lead in the sacraments. How we relate with God and then put our relationship and faith into practice is our first priority.

One dynamic we emphasize in our denomination is that through baptism we are brought into the fullness of the fellowship in Christ in the Church. We believe faith always leads us to live in fellowship in loving relationships and not in isolation. When we baptize, it is not a private ritual. We share it in, and as a fellowship, we do all we can to make it part of our worship service and engage the whole church in the covenant together. The congregation promises to help the person grow and mature in their love and relationship with God and others, and we all learn, grow, and mature in new ways from the person being baptized becomes part of our lives of faith. We see how vital a covenant this is for families and their children; it takes a community to rear a child. So, there is understanding in a priest's desire to say, "we" instead of "I." And yet a sacred authority is entrusted to a priest and to pastors to represent and speak on behalf of God; not everyone has the authority to baptize a person, certain dynamics require preparation and care. In our practice of ordination, the bishop says to the ordinand, "Go take authority." So most pastors and priests would say, "I" during a baptism, knowing God is really the central Presence and power at baptism. It is vital to live out the authority as a means of sharing the Gospel. May we all be part of a priestly people in Christ who have focused upon God to provide our identity love, and direction we need in life.

Through Bridge of Hope, our church family has a new opportunity to extend the love and care Christ has given us, to families facing homelessness. Bridge of Hope is a unique ministry, a three-way partnership among families facing homelessness, church-based Neighboring Volunteers trained to

provide practical support and encouragement, and professional staff. Rather than offering short-term solutions, the Bridge of Hope Neighborhood of Support is designed to last 18 to 24 months to give families the time and opportunities necessary for long-term change. We are hoping to get about 10 volunteers who would commit to "neighboring" a family. Neighboring is similar to what we do, as we support and care for family and friends. We would be available to a family dealing with homelessness, by being a support network for them. We might provide a ride, make a meal together, help with taxes, homework assistance, and/or make a phone call offering encouragement. Each family and volunteers ae unique, so neighboring will be specific to those working in partnership. This seems like a great way to continue our care for families facing homelessness, in the absence of being able to house them in the local churches, through Family Promise.


Thank you to all who helped with our February gathering. We enjoyed a great afternoon of fellowship, desserts and a



PASTOR JIM'S CHRISTIAN LIVING COLUMN

helping us to live the Christian life March 2022

In keeping with offering you a Bible verse to memorize or add to your knowledge, this month's verse is John 10:11. "<u>I</u> am the good shepherd. The

good shepherd lays down his
life for the sheep." Jesus
refers to Himself as the "Good
Shepherd," He especially notes His
willingness to die for the sake of the flock.
Jesus is willing to sacrifice Himself to save
those He protects. Therefore, He went to
the cross, to die for us, taking our sin and
paying our penalty, that we may be deemed
righteous in the sight of God. Let us reflect
on this verse as we prepare for Lent and
Easter, the resurrection of our Good
Shepherd, who leads, guides, and protects
us in our current life.

As we end the season called Epiphany, we enter Lent. Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday (March 3, 2022) and ends on Holy Saturday. The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry.



Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by new

converts and then became a time of penance by all Christians. Today, Christians focus on relationship with God, growing as disciples and extending ourselves, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of ourselves for others.

Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter." This is why you will see the designation "Sunday in Lent" rather than "Sunday of Lent" in the naming of these Sundays. On each Lord's Day in Lent, while Lenten fasts continue, the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.





Kenya, Africa Mission Trip 2022 Michael W. Duvall

I would like to begin my report by thanking everyone who gave a donation to purchase sewing machines for the Sonshine Vocational School in Usueni, Kenya! Between West Grove UMC and a few other sources, enough money was donated to purchase 16 new sewing machines for young women to learn how to design and create clothes. This will equip them for a brighter future.



I eagerly anticipated this trip and I was not disappointed. I feel so blessed to have been a part of this mission team. There were numerous obstacles to overcome to prepare for the trip and then the trip itself was quite a journey. It was a 22-hour trip from JFK, to Nairobi with a stopover in Doha, Qatar.

We worshiped at New City Fellowship Church in Nairobi. English is the National Language of Kenya, so we worshiped in both English and Swahili. They also live-stream their services and post them on their church website. This is partly due to COVID and part of their outreach strategy.

We spent a couple of days in Nairobi recovering from jet-lag, arranging transportation and picking up supplies.

It was a 2-day journey by Land Cruiser from Nairobi to Usueni.

Our mission was to help raise the trusses into position for welding and then to install the metal roof. It was 94 degrees F with high humidity. The days were long and hot! There was no air conditioning, fans, or screens. To say we were living in primitive conditions would be an understatement; we didn't even have Internet! Can you imagine?

We also had the privilege of seeing the village experience pure, clean well water for the first time! What a celebration!

After leaving Usueni, we visited two other missions; a small orphanage, and the El Shaddai school in the slums of Nairobi.



I will be sharing photos, videos and stories about this trip in the future. So, keep your eyes and ears open. Come and see the amazing things that God is doing in Africa!



'Clothed in love'*: Undies for Easter

Many are donating Undies for Easter Underwear purchase appeal expanded

UPDATE: Our Undies for Easter campaign is enroute to becoming a big success! The conference-wide effort to collect 2,000 pairs of men's briefs for persons incarcerated in the Philadelphia Prison System and

donate them to the head chaplain there before Easter is three-quarters of the way to its goal. So, now we want to do more.

"We now have 1,500 men's briefs purchased," reported the Rev. Marilyn Schneider Friday. "So we have added to the Amazon gift registry 2,000 men's undershirts and 600 women's briefs. We want to ensure there is opportunity for many to contribute."

Head Chaplain Carmelo Urena, who serves about 6,000, mostly male prisoners, tells us that each receives only one pair of underwear upon entering the system, His aim is to provide at least one additional pair of underwear to each new, incoming inmate.

Anyone can use the Undies for Easter Gift Registry on Amazon.com to purchase the underwear items for men and women. This will benefit the health and wellness of our incarcerated brothers and sisters.
