"8 Now in that same region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. 9 Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. 10 But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for see, I bring you good news (tidings) of great joy for all the people: 11 to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, (Christ) the Lord. 12 This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, 14 "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!" Luke 2:8-14

The glow of Christmas is something we all want to hold on to, as it blesses us with a sense of how our lives and creation are miracles. A great joy often forgotten is that there are twelve days of Christmas. There is much more to Christmas than a day or two of opening presents and all the commercial practices our culture imposes on us. We have much to celebrate, much to consider, and so much to share, now and throughout the year. God has responded to the despair we often feel trapped and enslaved to, by coming to be one of us, slurps, dribbles, burps, and all the faults and sins we have been and are a part of. As one good pastor reminded us on Christmas day there is great wisdom in knowing we are not trying to get everything done in one or two days. We have a lifetime to unwrap and share the real gifts of Christmas. May it continue in our hearts.

I thank you all for the ways you have taken part in our fellowship in Christ together through your prayers, sharing fellowship and worship, and music and your gifts, offerings, and service. As God has come to us in a vulnerable way, we are invited to help, give, partner and take part in the transformation God brings to the world. As a baby in the manger, God is revealed as more approachable than we imagined. God has shown us that, in spite of what others may say, humanity is redeemable, and God is here with us, so our fears do not need to confine us, or hold us back; we can hear and live the creativity and great joy of the Good News of God's love for us. And we can share this gift in unique ways through our fellowship together. For us Christmas is not a humbug, an annoyance; it is a precious gift.

Our understanding of Jesus Christ and all that his life has meant to us, leads us to live more in the mystery of God, than to even begin to think we know it all; we live in curiosity seeking to understand more every day of what is sacred, over making judgments about other people. Bishop Schol presents these ideas in his meditation in a worship service for Christmas posted on our Conference web site (at EPAUMC.org). In a Christmas meditation a year or so ago, Pope Francis shared, "We know that in the attempt to be freed of the enemy *without*, we can be tempted to feed the enemy *within*." There are parts of our hearts and minds that we need to more fully entrust to God, as we are intentional about giving our all to him.

As I look to the month ahead, I would like us to do our best to hold some follow up meetings to the Congregational Meeting on the Discernment Process, and come to understand one another better about a variety of issues in faithful ways that can empower us, allowing God in Christ to lead us. A time most likely to meet would be Monday evenings, and there may be other options of time and days we can create. We will send out a Constant Contact e-mail when the time has been determined. In order to go forward effectively and faithfully in ministry together, we need to be intentional and assertively seek to understand God and each other, and we hope you will join us as we meet and share. We have many specific, concrete opportunities this year to strengthen the ministries we offer and share:

- Continue with Two Worship Services Every Week
- Hire a Praiseworks praise band leader and also a Memory Bell Choir leader
- Strengthening our gifts in sharing music; we have incredibly talented musicians.
- Strengthen Our Sunday School and Small Groups, Including Additional Bible Studies
- Engage with our preschool families more, with ways to grow in faith
- Completion of the Facility Projects: a New Roof and Outdoor Pavilion
- Our Youth Mission Trip, with Fundraisers to Help Build Community

I pray you and your family and friends will join us in our efforts, and may we receive the Holy Spirit's creative ways of leading us in the tidings of great joy through the year.


#### January 1—Epiphany Sunday, All Worship and Communion Sunday

Epiphany is January 6, and just ahead of the day, we remember both the story of the Wisemen or Magi and Herod's brutal response found in Matthew 2. Jesus Christ is the Light of the World, many people are afraid to see what his light reveals, and so all of us to some degree want to hide or even destroy what we

don't understand or control. We will celebrate communion and God'srestoring power of love.

#### January 8 – Baptism of the Lord, Epiphany Sunday

As Christians when we accept Christ as our Lord and Savior we receive and are committed God's Covenant and to journeying with Christ through the gifts and sacrifices he leads us in. When we love and are loved, the sacrifices are a blessing that we would not trade away nor keep from; they are something we look forward to giving, especially when we understand the long-term impact they can have. Practices of faith are not just good ideas for someone *else* to do; they are a way of life for us that multiplies the blessings God entrusts to us. # Pastor's Desk

A Full Season In December - We need your participation



On Christmas Day we had a more intimate time of worship, knowing many families have their Christmas morning practices of being with family. Thank you to all who came. It was a joy to have a strong group gather to lift up God's Word as we shared a mini love feast of coffee, hot chocolate and sweet cakes along with some sharing of memories and thoughts about Christmas and its meaning for us. A reflection about what a love feast can

mean is here below.

#### Reflections on the Moravian Love Feast -

Crumbs, coffee, sugar, read, mil, mugs, chewing, slurping, spilling, visiting, laughing, feasting. The Love Feast is a ritual meal based on the ancient Christian agape meal and occurs several times a year during Moravian worship. While the Eucharist, the sacrament of Christ's body and blood, focusses on the relationship between God and humans, celebrating our redemption in Christ, and Christ's presence in our lives, the Moravian Love feast continues the Eucharist blessing and celebration by connecting humans with each other so that for a few minutes, we may see Christ in each other – even the dirty, difficult other. The other who is spewing curse words. The other who is sitting in a wheelchair. The other who is crying. The other who is laughing. The other who is myself.

While the organist plays hymns, such as Morning Star, O cheering Sight, for the choir and the congregation to sing, the Dieners or corps of servers, distribute the sweet buns and coffee to everyone in the congregation, Made with mashed potatoes, flour, sugar, lemon juice, lemon and orange zest, the love Feast bun is a cross between a sweet roll and a hamburger bun. The coffee, served in narrow white mugs, is about two-thirds sugar and ml. After everyone is served, all pray the Moravian grace: Come, Lord Jesus, our guest to be and bless these gifts bestowed by Thee. Amen. Following the blessing, the feasting begins. Everyone remains seated to avoid chaos, but it is a time for sharing food and conversation with your neighbor. A way to bring together the sacred of God with the earthly pleasures of humanity. A symbol of the bounteous hospitality of God and the infinite possibilities for our own hospitality toward others.

When I was fifteen years old, I sat in a wooden pew of the Home Moravian church, established in 1771, in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, and looked at the round sugary bun I held in one hand and the white mug of sugary, milky coffee in the other. I didn't know what to do. With either because this was my first time in a Moravian Church. Having grown up in a straight laced Southern Presbyterian church, I knew I was breaking at least one God-rule, if not several. Church was no place for messes, talking, spilling, sugar, laughter, food, noise, movement, enjoyment.

I didn't know then that the Love Feast would become a metaphor in my life but I knew from that day those two words belonged together. Over time I came to understand that this feast of love was the whole point of the spiritual journey. God, instead of being separate or distant from our unkempt, needy, imperfect selves, is right here beside us, holding the napkin, wiping our chins, tearing off bites of bread, moving us forward into the world.

#### Disciple Bible Study

One of the great joys I have had has been in sharing a great fellowship with others in Disciple Bible study. We have several people who have expressed an interest in sharing in the study, where we read 85% of the Bible in 36 weeks, about 3-4 chapters every day; a daily time of individual devotion of about a half an hour is nurtured. We then come together once a week for about 2 hours to share what we have read and

learned, and then look at a video tape that gives us more background on our readings. It's the Word of God interwoven with fellowship with sacred friends, a real Methodist experience of holiness. Happy New Year! As we head into 2023, I'd like let you know of some changes and updates pertaining to Safe Sanctuaries. One is that clearances only need to be renewed every five years rather than every three. If you are a volunteer, the application is free.

If you are serving as a teacher or volunteer working with children or youth, you should take time to view the Training video. Some of you already did the live session via Zoom in November. If you were not able to attend that



session, you can view the recorded video online. Here are the steps to follow:

Go to epaumc.org/safe-sanctuaries. Click on Resources. Then click on Spotlight Video Learning Center. You will need to Sign-up on the next page by creating a username and password. Finally click on the video, Safe Sanctuaries - Featured Training. It's very important that all volunteers working with children and Youth view the information in this training video. As adults working with children, it is important to be reminded why we have a safe sanctuaries policy and our responsibilities as a volunteer.

If you are due to renew clearances, the epaumc.org website can also provide links to the sites you need. Under Resources, click Safe Sanctuaries. Then scroll down to Selection and Screening. Choose the clearance you need. Click on it to get to the screen you need to complete your clearance. If you prefer to work on paper, I still have those forms in my mailbox. I'll be happy to see you get one. You can contact me, Fran Miller, by email at jmille8698@verizon.net. Or call me at 484-614-6627. If you get notified to renew and you have gotten clearances less than five years old for work or another volunteer position, you can just send a copy of those.

They have a small farm in which they grow fruits and vegetables for their use. Carole also invited us to visit with Anne Rice-Burgess, President and CEO. She wanted us to thank the UM Men, the church, and all who contributed gifts.


There are still a few spots open for the Youth Summer Service Trip 2023!
