" (Galatians 6:1-3, The Message)

In the book, *The Contemplative Pastor*, we are reminded that far too often, listening is in short supply in the world today. People are not accustomed to being listened to. Instead, we are overwhelmed with a multitude of voices and lots of noise clamoring for our attention and devotion. It becomes easy to avoid the challenging engagement of listening, especially because we fill our lives up with busyness. And if we are alienated from God, it compounds or multiplies the impact. When we are with a person, we are often distracted, in a rush, with something or someone else on our minds and hearts. What a blessing it is to be reassured that God listens to us when we pray, and even a sigh can be a prayer. I often read more than one translation of the Word, and it helps me take in a broader, more complete perspective on what is being shared.

Summer is traditionally a time to slow down our lives and take the time to listen. We listen to the waves on the ocean, or the birds and sounds of nature in the woods and meadow. We are also blessed when we can take time to listen to the people we love, and hear what their hearts are communicating to them, and hear it for ourselves. The more we intentionally seek to listen to God's Word and what God wants us to know, the greater our ability to listen to the people we love. What a joy it is when we all listen to each other and understand. As we think about and prepare for the ways we share fellowship, it is vital we continue to listen to God, and then be intentional about listening to each other. It brings the greatest blessings when we seek with compassion to understand people in fellowship with Christ, whether long-term friends, or new ones. We gain a greater perspective and understanding.

I pray this summer is a time that empowers you to listen more easily and completely, to God and the people in your life, and that you are blessed, and a blessing to others. Our themes for worship will seek to help us engage in faith practices that open up our hearts to God and each other. An adult Sunday School class is planned as a follow up to the day's worship. – Tim




Being For Real

Juneteenth

One of the great holidays of our nation, is one that many people still don't know about, June 19 is Juneteenth, a day we celebrate the Emancipation Proclamation of 1865, and its more complete enforcement at Galveston, Texas on June 19, 1865. It is a great day for the United States as some former slaves of the Confederacy were given their freedom. For many people it is our Second Independence Day. It is a day like the 4th of July, a day to celebrate community. We need to remember, when one person is oppressed, we all suffer for it.

When we are intentional about building and living in community, we all share the burden together with the other person, because our community is not whole, healthy, and healed until we do. While many people celebrated the end of slavery on June 19, 1865, slavery would still be legal in border states of Delaware and Kentucky, until the ratification of the 13th Amendment on December 18, 1865.

Of course in spite of the ending of slavery, Jim Crow laws took over, keeping people socially and economically enslaved, and the voting rights of women would not be secured until the 19th amendment in 1920, with many people still denied voting rights until 1965. In many parts of the country and our world, Jim Crow like laws and social practices kept and continue to keep people confined today. Faithfully we must remove these barriers to living life fully. Julie and I look forward to celebrating Juneteenth this year with close friends in joyous fellowship. I pray it is a great day of celebration and remembrance for you and your family, and that we all remember the sacrifices so many people have made, so that we can all live lives of freedom today, and bring real justice to a world so desperately in need.

**PASTOR JIM'S
CHRISTIAN LIVING COLUMN**
Growing spiritually to be more Christ-Like
June 2023

The last Sunday in May was Pentecost Sunday. It was the day we celebrate the giving of the Holy Spirit to the believers and followers of Jesus after His ascension into heaven. In this issue of PASTOR JIM'S CHRISTIAN LIVING COLUMN, I want to share with you one aspect of what the Holy Spirit does in the lives of believers. I refer to Galatians 5:22-23 which

speaks of the Christian character that the Holy Spirit wants to build into our life. This verse says, **"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Against such things there is no law."**

The word "fruit" refers to the spiritual characteristics of the work of the Holy Spirit and it is not plural, but singular, to show these nine characteristics are not separable or independent, but all act together as a whole unit. As we grow spiritually in our life all these elements of the Holy Spirit will become evident. Just like physical fruit needs time to grow, the fruit of the Spirit will not ripen in our lives overnight. A successful gardener must battle against weeds to allow their plants to grow to maturity. We as Christians must also work to rid our lives of the "weeds" of our old sin nature




that wants to choke out the work of the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit gives us the power we need to reject those old sinful desires. We can say "no" to sin and accept the "way out" that God faithfully provides through the power of the Holy Spirit. As we give the Spirit more control of our lives, He begins to do in and through us what only He can do - to shape us and grow us to be

more like Jesus. Since God's goal for all believers is to be like Jesus (**"For those God foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son"**, Romans 8:29), the Holy Spirit constantly works to rid our lives of our sinful nature and display His fruit instead. Therefore, the presence of the "fruit of the Spirit" is evidence that our character and our life is becoming more like Christ.

What is the fruit of the Spirit? It is these nine unified virtues or characteristics that fill our spiritual life: **LOVE - JOY - PEACE - PATIENCE - KINDNESS - GOODNESS - FAITHFULNESS - GENTLENESS - SELF-CONTROL.** Question: Do you envision these as part of your life? Or do you need to allow the Holy Spirit to work within you to be more Christ-life? Pastor Jim

THE EPA DIGEST

UNITED METHODISTS OF EASTERN PENNSYLVANIA



Brief Summary of EPA 2023 Annual Conference

For the first time in three years, the Eastern Pennsylvania Annual Conference met in person from Thursday, May 18, to Saturday, May 20, at the Expo Center in Oaks, Pa. More than 700 members and visitors gathered under the theme *Possibility* (from Matthew 19:26) for the first annual conference held onsite since 2019, after managing three years of online sessions.

“The Church’s One Foundation” sang the body during its opening worship celebration. And throughout the two-day session that truth prevailed in moments of communal worship, fellowship and giving, in the sacred commissioning and ordination of six clergy, and in the faithful discernment and discussion of 12 resolutions.

Bishop John Schol, in his episcopal address, praised God for the Christ-likeness of the United Methodists of Eastern Pennsylvania who led people through the pandemic, were innovative in their leadership and continued to serve in very challenging times. “I see great possibility in our future,” he said, “and our greatest possibility is through our congregations.”

Members passed resolutions including a leadership nominations report, equitable compensation for clergy, support for EPA Advance Special local mission projects, a modified Safe Sanctuaries policy that now extends to vulnerable adults, updates in the clergy pension program, the disaffiliation of five congregations and the discontinuance of six congregations.



A new Strategic Direction that outlines the conference's goals and path forward to increase vitality and effectiveness among its congregations and church leadership was discussed and approved. It includes a collaborative affiliation between the United Methodists of Eastern Pennsylvania and Greater New Jersey that focuses on growing transformational leaders, making disciples, growing vital mission congregations and transforming mission in our communities and around the world.

While that proposal passed by a wide margin, the introduction of a strategic direction, a new budget format and strategic collaboration with Greater New Jersey has created disruption for some conference members concerned about too much change without a full understanding of the plans and process. The Extended Cabinet has pledged to continue to work with more laity and clergy to better understand their concerns and slow the pace of change.

As requested, the bishop, with approval of the superintendents, will call a Special Session of the conference to review and adopt a 2024 budget. The Council on Finance & Administration's budget proposal, which reports all projected income and spending, conforms with *The Book of Discipline* and with best practices of non-profit management, EPA Treasurer and Chief Financial Officer Jo Fielding assured members.

In other highlights, the Rev. Enger Muteteke, of the General Commission on Religion and Race, led an interactive teaching session on "systemic racism, implicit bias and their impact on ministry efforts."

Bishop Schol presided over the conference, delivered his episcopal address, celebrated new clergy retirees and preached for the Commissioning and Ordination Service in which four clergy were ordained and one was commissioned. The Rev. James Lee, EPA&GNJ Director of Communications, preached for the opening worship. The Rev. Eunice Vega-Perez, Superintendent of GNJ's Skylands District, preached for the memorial service, where 33 deceased EPA clergy and clergy spouses, plus two United Methodist bishops and two bishop's spouses, were remembered.

We will publish a more detailed report of Annual Conference on EPA's website by Wednesday, May 24, and feature it in our weekly EPA Digest newsletter. Plus, we will enable readers to enjoy dynamic photography of the conference and also ministry videos presented there.
