"Your steadfast love, O Lord, extends to the heavens, your faithfulness to the clouds." (Psalm 36:5)

At a recent memorial service, I shared an aspect of our faith and my personal perspective the same way I have shared it with children. On a beautiful sunny, summer day, with the bright sunlight and blue sky, it is impossible to see the stars 'behind' the daylight. The light is too bright, yet I know for sure the stars, the heavens, and all rest of the miracle of creation is still there. In my limited perspective and sight, I might not be able to see them in the moment, but they are there.

In the same sense, many people are reluctant to trust that there is a heaven, or to trust in God's presence and promise, and blessings. When we don't trust God, our perceptions are distorted and a disaster often results. In the midst of life, God is with us and God's promises of presence are there for us. We might not be able to see them, blinded as we are by the immediate conditions of our lives in the moment. We don't control God, and through devotions, prayer,

and worship, we regularly make time to remember that while we are not God, God is God, we are loved by God, and seek His heart. "And He (God) brought him (Abraham) outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." (Genesis 15:5a) God made a promise, a Covenant with Abraham, to always be with him and his descendants in faith.

Overcoming the Challenge

Today, the artificial light of humanity often blocks out the light of those stars. We can trust that there truly is a heaven and that God's promises of presence with us can guide and strengthen our lives and the love we share. God wants to bless our friendships and loved ones and teaches us how. We might not always be able to fully see or perceive God and heaven, given our limited abilities, yet we see the results of his creativity all around us. Summer is a great time to take in God's creativity in the ways we are living. I find it a blessing to make the time to take in the 'heaven' and the image of God in other people. I can experience God and the people around me more fully by intentionally connecting with people in listening and understanding together. Our sacred nature is made clear.

Today there are many people and dynamics that can distract us from our most sacred priorities. Demands and situations that overstep into our boundaries impose themselves on us, and often incite us to overstep the healthy boundaries that other people need. Lord, forgive us our trespasses. In the midst of our challenges, we need to set God first to hear God's Word often, over the other voices and noise around us, and weave God's Word into all parts of life. "Thus says the Lord: Do not learn the way of the nations or be dismayed at the signs of the heavens, for the nations are dismayed at them." (Jeremiah 10:2) Jeremiah must have felt like many of us do, overwhelmed by circumstances he could not control. In the mist of it, God led him to trust and respond faithfully in the ways he received, shared, and encouraged faith in God.

We Only See Through a Mirror, Dimly

Like trusting in the heavens and stars that we cannot yet see on a bright, sunny day, we trust that God is helping us grow and mature in His love. Even though it may be out of our control, God is with us, will lead us to the promised fulfillment. With the insights of the transformation God was working in his life, the Apostle Paul wrote, ¹¹ "When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. ¹² For now we see only a reflection, as in a mirror, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. ¹³ And now faith, hope, and love remain, these three, and the greatest of these is love." (I Corinthians 13:11-13) May we continue to seek face to face, heart to heart relationships with God and each other. And may we perceive and live fully in the transformation that God promises, seeing the creative possibilities open to us in the power of the Spirit and God's grace and love. And may we embrace how fully we are known and loved by God, and embrace the grace before us in all we do. – Tim

Continuing to understand how our healthy boundaries can show respect and fulfill the promise of freedom is vital for our lives today. As Americans, many of us trust in God's vision for us to live in freedom and not tyranny. In Christ we can understand how we can bring together the various aspects of living faithfully as friends in Christ to share real empathetic caring as a Christians, supporting each other. We will share passages from Romans 6:12-23; and if we have time, listen to Matthew 10:40-42.

Sunday, July 9, 2023 Sixth Sunday After Pentecost

Process verses Results – God Empowers Our Freedom and Ability to Choose, (even our emotions). Paul says, being faithful to God, and 'not full of ourselves" as one interpretation says it, is key. Remembering that God's law comes out of God's heart, empowers us to reach for and live fulfilled lives. God provides the freedom for us to make decisions, and now we seek to choose wisely, move towards choosing Christ over our small ambitions and desires as we open hearts to him. The scripture is from Romans 7:15-25a and we may also share Matthew 11:16-19.





Sunday, July 16, 2023 Seventh Sunday After Pentecost

Theme for Vacation Bible School – "So let us strive for the things that bring peace and build each other up." (Romans 14:19). Each of us is called in large and small ways to be a hero by living faithfully in Christ. We are called to serve Christ together. We will combine into one service at 9:30, celebrating VBS. Sunday, July 30, 2023 Ninth Sunday After Pentecost

Building Trust Together in Confidentiality—God is right with us helping us have patience, building trust, knowing it is God who needs to be at work, in peoples' lives first. We are not 'fixing' others, as much as we are in partnership with God in sharing God's love. Violating confidentiality often happens with good intentions, while it steals away the empower of a person to share their journey and story with others themselves. Paul opens up his life of faith to us all, being very vulnerable in the process. He went through great transformation. He models for us a willingness to express faith. A key component of trustworthiness is confidentiality. So ,we'll seek to understand more and share Romans 8:26-39.

Grief is All Around Us – Everything from the changes of all kinds happening in our lives and world, to the loss of a loved one can ignite grief in us, and faithfully being aware of our emotions, sharing them with God and one another is vital. Paul in Romans 9 shares his grief and his trust in Christ, believing that as tough as things may seem, God is at work, and he (Paul) has been blessed to be part of it all. He trusts in God's promise, God's Covenant, knowing how others have taken it, and God for granted. In August, we may also look at some of the women in the Bible and how they were faithful in leading and modelling faithfulness to God; they are heroes of faith.

This taught us that giving is a very important part of worshiping, learning and giving, as we shared with others in need.

We then went to our age-related classes where we studied our Biblical lesson. This always included a craft-time, a time for learning a memory verse, and to learn to memorize it, putting it in our heart and
