She said with three children, it is the only time that works for her. To be candid, first impressions were for me that she was not likely to be someone who had such a focus in her life. She seemed very young and contemporary. What a joy as she shared the insights she was experiencing in her devotions. She opened up my heart and mind to be more aware of how God is at work in *all* people, and I can have hope in how God can reach us all.

We are blessed to witness experiences of grace, healing, empowerment, and freedom. It is so important that we share our journeys. I was blessed by her sharing, and I felt God's presence more clearly in our lives. When God leads, we are provided assurance and clarity through His Word. God reorients our approaches, and responses to life's challenges and opportunities. Personal devotion time helps everyone engage more fully in worship, and fellowship. Active listening and empathy in real friendship comes from a vital devotion life. As our VBS memory verse encouraged us, may we bring it to life:

"So let us strive for the things that bring peace and the things that build each other up." Romans 14:19





#### Sunday, August 6, 2023 Tenth Sunday After Pentecost Communion Sunday and All Worship Sunday

We are likely to examine two scriptures, one from Genesis 32:22-31 when Jacob wrestles with someone who represents God (was it God, or an angel), and Jacob is transformed to be known as Israel. We are also likely to share words of Paul from Romans 9:1-5, as he examines the heritage of the Israelites and how many failed to seize the opportunities to draw closer to God. It broke his heart, and leads to his own confession of sin, and continued transformation in his life.

## Sunday, August 13, 2023 Eleventh Sunday After Pentecost

An important scripture to consider is Genesis 37:1-4, & 12-28, when Joseph is sold into slavery by his brothers. What would cause someone to sell another person, even think they have a right to do so, especially a brother? Human behavior is so often animal-like, competitive, greedy, self-centered and focused. We will also look at Romans 10:5-15, perhaps use it in the liturgy, when Paul lifts up that salvation is for all, not just a select few; we are all called to proclaim Christ, and the world is so much poorer in heart when we do not. So let us enrich the lives of people by sharing Christ!





## Sunday, August 20, 2023 Twelfth Sunday After Pentecost

We will share Exodus 1:8-20, when Pharaoh began to fear and have anxiety over how well the Israelites were prospering in 'his' country. Most of us know the rest of the story of how he enslaved the people, and how God heard their cries; how do we related to the scripture and what does it have to say to us today? Whose cries do we ignore today? Paul reminds us in Romans 12:1-8 of what new life in Christ is like, and in Matthew 16:13-21, Peter declares who Jesus is.



## <u>PASTOR JIM'S</u> <u>CHRISTIAN LIVING COLUMN</u> Our Need for Spiritual Help August 2023

Let me share a parable with you. Once there were two prominent families. Both were well known and were in the news on a daily basis. They opposed each other, yet they claimed to be the ones that would be the leaders that the people wanted.



However, problems appeared within their families and the supporters of each claimed the others were wrong and should be put on trial for the things each side had claimed they did to break the law. Each claimed their innocence as they waited for the judges to decide their fate.

When people go through trials and hardships, no matter how mentally strong they may be, such stress can overwhelm them and they need to have ways to reduce the stress that affects their whole being, body, soul and spirit.

In Matthew 11:20-23, Jesus is addressing a crowd of people speaking about the miracles He performed and how they were not accepted by the people in these cities because they were unrepentant. Perhaps if these two families took heart and evaluated themselves, maybe they may see that they are unrepentant also and their burdens of life need spiritual help.

Jesus tells us later in the chapter, (vss. 28-29), what we all need to do. He says, <sup>28</sup> "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. <sup>29</sup> Take my yoke upon you

and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls." He understands our needs and asks those who are weary and burdened to "come to Him", to seek Jesus, that they may find rest. Jesus also promises us peace, for the peace of the Lord is beyond the peace that the world can give (John 14:27).

The moral of this parable is that all people, whether they are prominent or common folk, will experience trials and tribulations. When our relationship with the Lord is broken, we need to "come to Him" and restore our oneness with Him, who can give us peace, peace that is beyond what the world means by peace. I pray that we all may keep this in mind when we need help.



## Reckoning with the Cotton Gin and Sin: <u>Keeping September 9 in Mind</u> by Rev. Dr Mel Leaman

My initial post-college employment was as a Junior High history teacher. I taught what I had learned. So, in 1972 **I was able to tell my students** how the invention of the cotton gin in 1793 expanded the demand for cotton in North America and globally. Cotton comprised just 7% of our exports in 1800, but by 1860 that increased to 58%. Our country experienced a huge economic boom as Southern states provided the world with 75% of its cotton! **But, what I couldn't tell my students** at that time because my history

books skimmed over this truth was that despite the 1808 ban on foreign slave trade the number of slaves imported as a means of supplying the demand for cotton increased from 900,000 to 4 million in 60 years. What I couldn't tell my students were the horrors that happened to black women, men, and children who now had to pick more cotton to keep up with the pace of production. What I couldn't tell my students was that many slave masters were Christian church goers as were those who built slave ships in the North or filled their pockets with cotton related incomes. I JUST WISH I WOULD HAVE READ BLACK HISTORY WRITTEN BY BLACK PEOPLE!

Well, I've been doing just that and I am hoping you will join me. **Our Scriptures in II Corinthians 5:17-25 call us to be ambassadors of reconciliation.** How can we be ambassadors for reconciliation if we have not reckoned with the realities of our history that have separated us? This is not revisionist history. It is so real our hearts still resist the cleansing power of the cross to remove the stains in our souls (being) that demean our relationships with one another. It will be a bit confronting, I know, but I would like to invite you to join me and my co-facilitator, Peter Mullen as we read and discuss *The Color of Compromise: The Truth about the Church's Complicity in Racism* by Jemar Tisby. We will begin our sojourn on Saturday, September 9<sup>th</sup> from 10:00-11:00 and do so for eleven consecutive Saturdays. Come as you can. We will view each chapter's summary by the author via zoom on a given day of the week, but if you miss that video viewing simply come 20 minutes early to the Saturday session to view it. There are worship bags for children, filled with fun things to keep them engaged during worship, and books for children. Look for the cart in the lobby!




#### Hello all!

## Africa Mission Update Michael W. Duvall

David Kitheka Mbuvi is a young man who a year ago was an orphan. This year he is finishing his first year of medical school at United Methodist University in Meru, Kenya.

He has three sponsors from WGUMC who are sponsoring him. According to reports, he is doing quite well. He is a young man of strong Christian faith who give**s** the glory to God!

This is a photo of the Usueni Vocational Education Center building team made up of instructors and students. The 2023 Project is to construct a new administration building. The students are learning skills that will help them gain employment when they graduate from the 2-year program.

Thanks to generous donations, the school was able to purchase 12 additional acres of land.

The school has launched a new agriculture curriculum and currently uses eight acres to teach modern agriculture and also provide food for the school.

They now have a well that provides water for irrigation when conditions are too dry!

The Usueni School has a new sound system that will be installed in the new Administration Building. It is portable so it can also be used for large gatherings and Sunday Worship. This may seem like a small thing to us, but it is a major event for them. They dedicate everything to God and use it for His glory.

Part of last year's mission project was to drill a well, build a solar station to power the pump, and install a 1-mile underground water line and connect to the water storage tanks. Phase 2 added a roof over the storage tanks to prevent the hot African sun from causing the water to expand and burst the tanks!

This water project has improved the lives of everyone at the school and the surrounding community. This project was both expensive and time consuming, but worth every minute and every dollar!
