"Be strong. Take courage.... God is striding ahead of you. He's right there with you. He won't let you down; he won't leave you. Don't be intimidated. Don't worry." MSG "It is the Lord who goes before you. He will be with you; he will not fail you or forsake you. Do not fear or be dismayed." NRSV (Deut. 31:8) So said Moses to Joshua as he handed over the responsibility for leading God's people.

As the summer ends and we begin another season, we know that there will be many challenges and opportunities for us as individuals and as a fellowship in Christ. As we shared in worship on August 27, we need to first commit ourselves to truly engaging with God first in a very personal relationship, as Moses did, as he faced some overwhelming circumstances. Like Moses, when God calls us into action we might reply and ask, "It's just me! Why me?" Moses was a hot head, a murderer, and had trouble speaking, he likely stammered or stuttered. Like him, even with all

of our faults, God calls us to deepen our relationship and be fully engaged with Him. When we do incredible things happen. Such is

the witness of Abraham, Jacob, Joseph, and Moses. It is not easy;

it can be extremely challenging, yet it is life's greatest treasure and sets the foundation for all of our relationships, especially with the people we love.

Individuals In Fellowship

A traditional point of view in our faith has been to focus on the individual's relationship and journey; we pray every individual, like those saints and disciples of Jesus, has a very personal, growing relationship with God. As individuals we must take responsibility for our relationship with God, our lives, and how we share them. At the same time, we know we are all interconnected with each other, and as the world gets 'smaller,' our lives are intertwined with people we may have never met or know. We add to these dynamics how history and what has happened long before we were born, still influence us today. Remember the Bible tells us our lives will impact four generations in the future and we can then understand we are influenced by four generation in the past.

Many years ago, when I was in college, when a person sought counseling and guidance, the focus was most exclusively on the person, the individual who may have issues. The same was

true in the church. An assessment and diagnosis was conducted. In the 1980's some additional complexities were noted, and system theories were developed, formalized, and shared in ways that brought greater understanding and wisdom. Many people were so strongly influenced by their families and the groups they took part in., that it kept them from growing or from being healthy as individuals. While we are still personally responsible for our lives and relationships, it is often the case that the family, group, fellowship, community, or nation that also needs help in healing and becoming whole. (Remember Jesus in Matthew 12:46-50.) We can embrace and take part in the transformation God's creativity in Jesus and the Holy Spirit are bringing to creation.

Not Either-Or, Interweaving It All

Many people seem to want to polarize various perspectives, forcing a choice between two sides, an either, or situation, when creation and especially humanity is so much more. We need to integrate various experiences and points of view and the grace of God makes it possible. I've shared that Bishop Peter Weaver often taught us that one cannot be saved, a Christian with a personal relationship with God in Christ, without caring for and responding to injustice; and one can do little to transform and care for the injustices in the world without a close personal relationship with Jesus Christ. The Bible is full of God's response to both dynamics, leading us to develop and grow in our faith, learning how to trust God even more as we go forward. "It is the Lord who goes before us! Do not be dismayed!"

Like Moses, we may be afraid of consummating the covenant God has offered and invited us into, afraid of being consumed, of losing ourselves. When we respond and take part, we actually find our true identity. We are, after all, made in God's image. When we accept Christ, we are empowered to make time to listen and empathize. We need not fear encounters with other people, for God has promised to be with us; Jesus promised the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Truth will be right with us. There is no promise fulfilling our calling will be easy; the promise is in the fulfillment of grace and love.

As we approach a new season of learning, and growing, maturing in our relationships with God and each other, I pray we live in the courage God provides, knowing His presence with us at each step. Please don't be afraid of seeking the truth, nor of speaking up, sharing your experiences, and engaging to learn more. Or it may be better said, let God provide the courage. So much of what we know is incomplete. May we seek God's will often, especially with others who are faithful. While God is so vastly beyond our full understanding and our control, God has revealed Himself to us and works to do so every day. Salvation and our relationship with God never stop growing. It is life's greatest challenge and blessing. Rejoin us in worship, Sunday School, Bible studies, Grief Share, the Color of Compromise, music, and mission. Pray for all who have contact with our fellowship, and may we all be prepared to freely share the grace.

Sunday, September 17








NEW FAITHLINKS CLASS! "THE LORD'S PRAYER"

"Christians with Kids" Begins Sept. 10 with Jesus' Parables!



Laura Stewart, mother of two comments on her experience:

I want to invite you to a new Sunday School group that has made a positive impact on me as a parent. We all know parenting is not easy, and sometimes we can feel lonely in raising our children. Add in trying to raise them in faith, and the battle is all uphill. Myself and other parents have begun a class where we connect, accept, and value each other as parents in faith, but also use God's Word as a guiding light to help us navigate this rewarding, yet scary, path we call parenting. When Julie first asked me to join her and other parents, I had some reservations. I was worried that it would shine a spotlight on how bad I was doing as a parent and leave room for judgment from other parents if my kids couldn't recite the Bible word for word. Thankfully God told me to cast my fears aside and take the leap, and I have never felt more connected, accepted, and valued as a parent and as a Child of God. As a group, we use each other as sounding boards, pray, and praise our journey in parenthood. We use the Bible as a guide in our discussion and uncover how to raise our kiddos in faith in today's world. Now, I should warn you, this class is in no way a "How to" for parenting. you thought we somehow had the answers to everything, I hate to disappoint! There is no "you did that wrong" or "here is a gold sticker for making the right choice." Instead, we have created a judgment-free zone where we can rejoice with, and confide in, fellow parents who have a similar goal in mind; being Christians with Kids.



Reckoning with the Cotton Gin and Sin: Keeping September 9th in Mind by Rev. Dr Mel Leaman and Peter Mullen

My initial post-college employment was as a Junior High history teacher. I taught what I had learned. So, in 1972 I was able to tell my students how the invention of the cotton gin in 1793 expanded the demand for cotton in North America and globally. Cotton comprised just 7% of our exports in 1800, but by 1860 that increased to 58%. Our country experienced a huge economic boom as Southern states provided the world with 75% of its cotton! But, what I couldn't tell my students at that time

because my history books skimmed over this truth was that despite the 1808 ban on foreign slave trade the number of slaves imported as a means of supplying the demand for cotton increased from 900,000 to 4 million in 60 years. What I couldn't tell my students were the horrors that happened to black women, men, and children who now had to pick more cotton to keep up with the pace of production. What I couldn't tell my students was that many slave masters were Christian church goers as were those who built slave ships in the North or filled their pockets with cotton related incomes. I JUST WISH I WOULD HAVE READ BLACK HISTORY WRITTEN BY BLACK PEOPLE!

Well, I've been doing just that and I am hoping you will join me. **Our Scriptures in II Corinthians 5:17-25 call us to be ambassadors of reconciliation.** How can we be ambassadors for reconciliation if we have not reckoned with the realities of our history that have separated us? This is not revisionist history. It is so real our hearts still resist the cleansing power of the cross to remove the stains in our souls (being) that demean our relationships with one another. It will be a bit confronting, I know, but I would like to invite you to join me and my co-facilitator, Peter Mullen as we read and discuss *The Color of Compromise: The Truth about the Church's Complicity in Racism* by Jemar Tisby. We will begin our sojourn on Saturday, September 9th from 10:00-11:00 and do so for eleven consecutive Saturdays. Come as you can. We will view each chapter's summary by the author via zoom on a given day of the week, but if you miss that video viewing simply come 20 minutes early to the Saturday session to view it. 
PASTOR JIM'S CHRISTIAN LIVING COLUMN

—God Watches Over Us As We Journey in Life—

September 2023

September brings changes in the seasons as we look to fall and it's beauty. Fall also begins the new sleep". God is with us today, day and night —right

school year. Parents plan for changes in the family, as young students begin to experience the beginning of going to school and parents worry about their children leaving home on a school bus and await their return safely at night. And then there are the parents, who late in August see their young adult children leave home to go away



The theme of this psalm is Gods care of His people. The people journeying to Jerusalem for yearly feasts could face many dangers. Among the more potent threats was that of robbers. Anyone making their way from a distant place to Jerusalem needed to trust God to watch over them as they traveled in groups together. This psalm is composed of four stanzas of two verses each (verses 1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 7-8). As the psalmist looked at the mountains in vs.1 -2, ¹ I lift up my eyes to the mountains—where does my help come from? ² My help comes from the LORD, the Maker of heaven and earth", his thoughts rose above the mountain tops to God, the Creator. He assured himself that his safety came from the Lord, not from the mountain top where others would go to worship, but from God, maker of heaven and earth. The remaining three stanzas tells how God helps us. In vs. 3-4, the psalmist says that God will watch over us wherever we go and whatever we do, ³ He will not let your foot slip—he who watches over you will not slumber; 4 indeed, he who watches over Israel will neither


slumber nor sleep." God will not "slumber nor

now-watching over us and our whole life. The Lord would not allow the psalmist to stumble, nor would God relax His protection. God cannot be taken off guard, or surprised, like someone who falls asleep. In vs. 5-6, we see that God cares for his people as they travel, in this case, by foot during the day, and sleep at night as they made their beds on the ground, "

to college and pray for their safety, yearning for the 5 The LORD watches over you—the LORD is your shade at your right hand; 6 the sun will not harm you by day, nor the moon by night." For God's care is with us 24/7 through eternity. And vv. 7-8 extends that promise to us, "7 The LORD will keep you from all harm—he will watch over your life; 8 the LORD will watch over your coming and going both now and forevermore." Believers can be confident that God is in control of all that happens, ("And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose. in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸ For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, ³⁹ neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord, Romans 8:37-39)."That God's awareness and loving care for us and it will extend from now to eternity. How can we summarize this journey for those who travel or are away from home? If we are open to God and prayer, pray for them, place them in the hands of God. Better yet, pray with them, letting them know that God is watching over them as they are away. Speaking of prayer, I encourage you to join us and be part of the new Bible Study beginning September 11, at 6:30 PM in the sanctuary, entitled "Learning from the Prayers of the Old Testament". Please invite your friends to join us. Everyone is welcome!




Berkshire Hathaway Realtors Community Service Day Thursday, October 5th

ADOPT A PRESCHOOLER

As you know, our church has a preschool. CMO, Children's Morning Out, was started here shortly after we moved from prospect Avenue over twenty years ago. This type of program is the first opportunity for many children

to enter a social world with other children and nurturing adults. The preschool program encourages learning, self expression, independence, and discovery. The opportunities to work together, accomplish tasks, problem solve, and express thoughts and feeling prepare children for the next steps in education.

Research shows children who attend preschool are better prepared to continue their learning in kindergarten and beyond. But did you know that children who have early experience with economic scarcity and insecurity gain more than their advantaged peers? CMO has always welcomed families who need some assistance with the cost of preschool by offering scholarships.

To ensure we can continue to offer scholarships, we are seeking individuals or groups to consider "adopting a preschooler." You will not know who the child is. Privacy demands that the CMO Board



funds to those who have shown a need. But you can rest assured that your contribution will be used only to give the gift of learning to a child who otherwise may not have the

opportunity.

The amount of the monthly scholarship varies from \$100.00 to \$250.00. The cost varies according to which of the CMO programs the child attends and how many children in the family may be attending. Full tuition starts at \$200.00 a month and can go as high as \$350.00 a month. If you or your group could contribute monthly (any amount), that would be great. But any contribution at any time would also be fully appreciated. Simply make your check out to WGUMC CMO. Put "Scholarship Fund" in the memo. It can be put in the collection plate or given or mailed to the office.



If you are unable to do the Zoom on Sept. 16, you could review or look for the first time at the shorter program taped last November. It does not include any information about Vulnerable adults. You can access that video by going to **EPAUMC.org**. Click on Resources and search for "Spotlight." Sign in or create a sign in if you do not have one. Then click on "Safe Sanctuaries Training" November 2022.

This website is a great resource as it can also streamline the renewing of clearances. Again, you go to **EPAUMC.org**. Click on Resources, then Safe Sanctuaries, then Selection and Screening. Choose Criminal Record Check or Child Abuse Clearance and you will be directed to the form you need to fill out.


