The Lord is my strength & my might, and He has become my salvation!" (Exodus 15:2)

Exodus 16:9 tells us to, Draw near to the Lord, for he has heard you (heard your cries and complaining).

I see so many people, individuals and families striving so hard to keep up with life, and its challenges. I think many people feel like they are on a treadmill, and maybe can't get off. There is so much to keep up with, especially as school has restarted and work demands increasing. And all around us there is so much division, competition, when we need collaboration and fellowship in community with God. The uncertainty of our times and constant changes we face can lead us to live by fear that develops into anxiety, bitterness, or even anger and violence.

With all the change happening and coming at us every day, the in between time, between the old and new way of life, can be painful, scary, extremely challenging. It can also be an exceptionally creative time when we entrust ourselves more fully to God, for God really does love us, and can lead us. God's grace, mercy, and generosity are ever accessible when we are open to Him, and responding to the ways He reaches out to all, personally.

Then & Today

It may seem like such an ancient time to consider the Israelites coming out of Egypt and what they faced, yet today we face very similar, if not the same challenges as they did, in adjusting and making choices in the face of change, dangers, and opportunities. Hard to believe when they had been set free, they quickly lost heart and wanted to go back to Egypt living as slaves, working literally to death making bricks for Pharaoh's pyramid. Pharaoh wanted to be a god to everyone and expected loyalty. God was with them then and is with us today, striving to help us make the most of freedom and the choices in life, always leading us to see creation as a miracle to take part in. "...as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the Israelites, they looked toward the wilderness, & the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud." (Exodus 16:11)

In Exodus 16, the people are led to depend on God and trust in God's provisions. They are led to live in a new lifestyle, close and personal with Him. They collected just enough manna or food each day, not hoarding in greed; living openly, generously, in community where everyone had enough and everyone took part and shared. All heard the proclamation of assurances God had for them. There were no secret insiders, no pyramid of hierarchy, no one ignored or forgotten.

When they complained, Moses told them to take it to God directly, personally, for God heard them, the cries in Egypt, and the complaining in the wilderness. As Pastor Jim has lifted up so well in his Monday evening Bible study on prayers in the Old Testament, God wants us to be authentic, *express it all, as Abraham, Moses, and Hannah did*. Putting God In Our Lives First.

When we follow the world's ambitions, or a dictator like Pharaoh, we are led to live in fear and great anxiety. We start to hoard, compete, and fight, as our fears divide us. Many of us, like them then, are looking for the temporary solution of an exit, when God provides an Exodus, a real transformation of life and our way of life; that is likely to be scary for most people. In Exodus 16 as I listen to the passages, I hear grief in their hearts. Knowing that history could have been different, even the history of the Egyptians to the point they could have treated the Israelites better, more justly, and not treated them as slaves, animals, property, or a threat to be controlled.

When the Israelites were remembering, they engaged in selective remembering of the past and Egypt inaccurately. When writing about human nature and our minds and hearts, a leader reflected that, "Present anxiety (high emotions), distorts ours (& their) memory of recent past." Anxiety and fear among many emotions have a way of narrowing a person's outlook, understanding and memories; the anxiety and fear ends up limiting, confining (& enslaving) people, all of us. Like Esau, they (as many of us today) want and choose immediate gratification over long-term fulfillment, and deeper personal relationships – they want an Exit, God provides and offers us all an Exodus. It is a deeper, more challenging way of life. One that calls to the deepest parts of our hearts and lives, "Draw near to the Lord, for he has heard you!"

One of life's greatest treasures and blessings is to understand and perceive that we are part of a great, beloved miracle, personally known, sacred & holy. The purpose of our worship, fellowship and all the ministries of our church are to help us weave God's lifestyle into our lives fully. We surely are not property, a mere object, or chattel. Our growth in God's love never stops; God is always refining us and helping us mature to be more like Him, resonating with the DNA that we are made in his image. I pray that God's Word and the love that reaches through to us is always kept near, and may we draw near to the Lord for he has heard and knows and loves us. "The Lord is my strength & my might, and He has become my salvation!" – Tim



The Color of Compromise – History Could Have been Different

Our thanks to Peter Mullen and Mel Leaman for their facilitation of this study on how Christians in America tragically engaged in starting and continuing the practice of slavery. A profound understanding that many of us have had for a long time, found within the study is that, “History could have been different.” Sadly, many people made horrible choices as they distorted God’s Word and the truth, to justify their own desires. Many others remained complacent and passive, where God calls us to stand up for what is righteous and just, and work to make changes in His transformative power of love and grace. We face many of the same challenges today, in how we interpret scripture and apply God’s Word and presence to our lives. Many people today are led to focus today on what we want, our own self gratification over God’s priorities, and could easily fall in the trap of simply using people as a means to our end, missing the opportunities to have real, caring, sacred relationships that are centered on holiness.

Many people only see other people has having ‘value’ in as much as they can be used to fulfill personal desires. Such a decision is made in politics, economics, and even romance. The real challenge is also in the ways we interpret or misinterpret scripture. God is working to make us whole, as Methodists we call it sanctification, a refinement of the heart to be more like God, like Christ in the ways we love and share life.

We are able to overcome many fears and hesitations of hearing such a study, when we trust God, allow the power of the Holy Spirit, our Advocate and Spirit of Truth that Jesus promised will be with us, to lead. If you haven’t taken part so far, I’m sure there is still room. We look forward to sharing more insights as they unfold. We are blessed to have about twenty people take part, many of whom are not members of our church, yet willing to understand the ways our faith has unfolded. Please continue to pray for all of our ministries.

Sending Forth In Blessings

I was taught many times, from a variety of sources, to pay attention to emotions and work through them, especially with Faith in God in Christ. We have grief in experiencing Melanie and Tony leaving and move on in life, and yet we are very hopeful for them being in the place where God is leading them, and give them our blessings for a great life full of grace, growing blessed and blessing others. We will celebrate Melanie’s expressions of faith and friendship on Sunday, October 1 at the 11AM service during worship and look forward to having you join us.

Grief Share

Being aware of our grief can, and often is, a painful journey to deal with. Yet it brings with it great empowerment as we face the fears and challenges of life and death. It means so much to us to be able to have a trusting fellowship where we can share openly, candidly with one another (as our Bible studies and meditations have stated). We can learn from each other’s journey in faith through life. We seek real friendships in Christ together. I’ve been blessed to be meeting with the Grief Share group, and the candid truth is, we all are grieving at some level or another about changes in life, or losses of relationships and life with loved ones. God’s heart can fill ours and empower us to live life fully.

Grief can cause us to limit our hearts and minds, to be so constrained and broken that we only focus on ourselves and our pain. The narrow approach can lead to dangerous responses. God wants us to know and receive His presence with us in the depth of our need, and we need each other in fellowship where we can grow in our trust of God and one another. It helps us embrace life, learning from the past, trusting God into the future. Grief can lead to anger, and the anger can lead to false conclusions and rage. With God’s assurance at our side, we can search for the whole truth, that empowers our best, most faithful responses.

In one of our recent modules, we examined how grief can turn to anger, and anger can turn into bitterness, hopelessness, and even violence when we don’t give ourselves to God. Knowing the expanse of God’s love for us as we consider what Jesus went through for us, we understand more of what God goes through every day with us, and the willingness God has out of love, to bear our burdens with us. And God brings healing and wholeness to us when we are open with Him. I am hopeful we will offer an additional gathering of Grief Share to build on what we have experienced. We know there will continue to be death, and losses of all types that lead to grief, and we want to be prepared and ready to respond, entrust ourselves to God in new ways, especially as the holidays approach. Thank you for your prayers for our ministries.

Our Future In Children & Youth Ministries

With changes coming in our ministry with children and youth, we always need to allow God's creativity of heart lead us. We continue to be prayerful and ask you for your prayers and personal involvement in the key components of our ministry that we need to fulfill in our love for and efforts with children, youth, and their families. We continue to search for a praise band leader and Children & Youth Director, and volunteers to help share and empower these ministries. Areas of immediate focus for us are:

A game night, sharing board games or many games the youth enjoy playing, would also be great to offer. During Advent, our children in Sunday School could do a craft of making Christmas ornaments. There are additional ways to reach out to our primary school aged kids that can engage them and their families. There are so many possibilities for us, especially when we consider including the CMO families and their children and the families who come to Food pantry. It will take commitment and dedication from the fellowship to make it happen.

Sunday, October 15—Laity Sunday—Prayer changes things

Scripture Exodus 32:1-14 and Psalm 106:1-6, 19-23 Please join us for worship on October 15th as we look at the sermon of "Prayer Changes Things". See how the prayer of Moses changes God's intent to destroy the people of Israel for their disobedience and relents and forgives them. This is why we need to be focused on prayer in our life that we may ask forgiveness from God and find forgiveness from Him.

Sunday, October 22

Did you ever want to help partner with your father or mother when you were growing up? We'll share scripture from Exodus 33:12-23; Moses wants God to let him in on God's plans. It is a request most of us can identify with. We all are made to be at God's side, to be learning, growing as we are partnering with God. When we have a clear view from God, we are more capable in how and what we choose. Asking God, let me in on your plans leads us to collaborate and partner with God, and each other. Perhaps the reason why the world is so divisive and divided is because we are focused on God first. Wanting to help our dad with work; burning leaves. Know his voice; parakeet & owner's voice/ commands; My presence will go with you to the end. Let us see your glory; you won't see my face. We will also likely hear from passages in I Thessalonians 1:1-10, where we are taught that the Holy Spirit can put steel in our convictions, and help us determine how to live faithfully facing trouble and lead to God's joy.

Sunday, October 29—Reformation Sunday

October will fly by, and as we reach the end of the month, we will consider the death of Moses and what it meant to his people, and how God led them through a very unsettling transition. How did Moses do it? Lead his people through such times as he did? We turn to I Thessalonians 2:1-8, and hear how God has called us to seek God's point of view and approval, not human popularity. It is not an easy challenge to respond to and fulfill, yet we need to look at how it has been essential to lives of faith. When we communicate with each other, especially about faith, we don't work to butter each other up or put up smoke screen to hearts and lives, we reach out with and to God and one another's hearts.

November 5 All Saints Sunday – Communion

We will honor our members who have passed away this past year, and pray you will join us as we entrust God with their hearts and spirits, grateful of the assurance of God's eternal life and love. God will help and bless us through the grief we share, and find ways to bring us closer to Him and one another as He builds us in a community of love and faith.

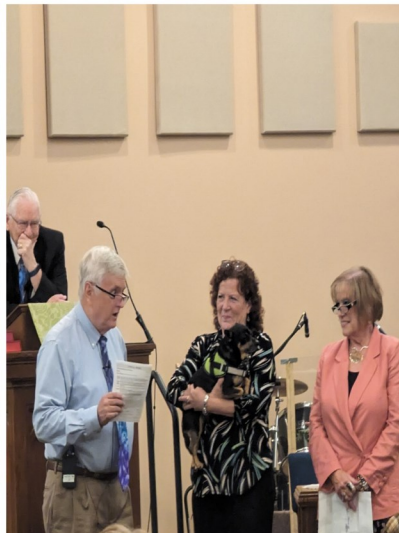
