⁴ Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. ⁵ Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. ⁶ Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4:4-7)

The letter of Philippians has often provided us with great assurance and strength to live out our faith in Christ when we really need to hear from God. A paraphrase of verse six reads, "Let petitions and praises shape your worries into prayers, letting God know your concerns." Paul urges us when times are challenging, to turn even more deeply and personally to God, and let God provide the wholeness, assurances, and guidance we need. God's presence in prayer and the Word, leads us away from being full of, and solely focused on worries, anxieties and fears. Instead, we are empowered by grace to be the people God made us to be, made in His image. A people of extravagant generosity or heart, mind, and spirit. Great assurance and guidance for 2024.

God wants to be close to us, and have us turn to Him for help and direction, in tough times, and also in joyous times of growth when we begin new and exciting, creative endeavors of faith. Journeying with Christ in life as his disciples can many times present huge challenges, as it also leads us to new opportunities for growth, development and progression in faith. I think of Mary, mother of Jesus, and how God transformed her faithful life into something beyond expectation. It took great faithfulness on her part, the years before, and then the lifetime after the birth of Jesus. God is at work in ways we are often not aware of. God can take what is the most difficult and bring forth new creativity, crucifixion is transformed into resurrection.

Mary's servanthood, sacrifice, and the servanthood and sacrifice of so many faithful people over the past 4,000 years, have come together for us to take part in. It does not seem like a very attractive dynamic for many people today, to be part of God's movement of faith. With technology and media presentations today, our attention spans have narrowed. With limited capacity for listening and hearing each other and spending less time in person with others, the world continues engaging in its conflicts and an ever increasing, hectic pace of change. In the midst of this darkness, God's light can shine through, "the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness does not overcome it."

⁹ So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time (in due season), if we do not give up. ¹⁰ So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all (people) and especially for those (who are) of the household of faith.

Please, always remember that a main reason Christ came to us, God reaching out to us, is because God loves us all. Christ came so that we see the freedom we have to choose how to live life, choosing to draw closer to God, allowing Him to lead. A main difference among many Christians is that some people think that a person's life and the future is predetermined and God "knows the future." While God sees all the possibilities, God entrusts us in freedom with a partnership with Him and each other to make decisions and grow and mature through them together. We are not puppets or robots, we are children of God, made in God's image, with God's DNA for generosity in extravagant grace that can help us claim the possibilities and creativity that come from His heart. His Covenant with us, helps us leave enslavement behind, taking us out from slavery, and taking the slavery out of our hearts and minds. May we always be true to His call to us, fulfilling our promises of prayer, presence (attendance), gifts (talents, friendship, and financial), and service. May the year and lifetime ahead continue to be full of blessings as we receive and share the grace God intends for us all,

As we begin a new calendar year, many people make personal resolutions to make things different in the new year. However, if you have done this in the past, you realize that we never follow through with them, and shortly after the new year, we give up, and our good intentions fall by the wayside. Has this ever happened to you? Well, don't despair; our human nature seems to get the best of us in what we had hoped would be a lasting change in our lives.

The new Bible study, beginning on January 8th, is about Jesus and His "Sermon on the Mount". While preparing for the study, one of the beatitudes spoke to me. Matthew 5:6 says, "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled."

Have you thought something was missing from your daily walk of life and couldn't put your hands on what was missing? If you think a little deeper, you may realize that what may be missing is the lack of spiritual understanding in your life. The first beatitude says, "*Blessed are the poor*

NEW YEAR BIBLE STUDY

Pastor Jim's next Bible study is planned to begin on **January 8th, 2024, at 6:30 pm.,** in the sanctuary of West Grove UMC. The study will be on the teachings of Jesus and how one is to live in the Kingdom of Heaven, here on earth.

We know this as the "Sermon On the Mount" found in the Gospel of Matthew, Chapters 5-7. Our study will take an in-depth analysis of what Jesus was teaching His followers. When Jesus taught, he spoke with clear authority that troubled and angered the religious elite (Pharisees, Sadducees, and the Priesthood), who saw His teachings as being radical. But the common people flocked to listen to him. His words challenged their souls and their way of life, but He also brought hope and an abiding peace to their lives.

In our study we'll seek to understand what Jesus is teaching at that time – then translate the principles into our own daily lives. If we can understand what Jesus taught and absorb that into our spirit, we can grow to become the kind of disciples that He wants us to be.
