Letter from the Pastor

Greetings West Grove UMC! It is hard to believe it has only been two weeks that I have been with you as interim pastor. It truly has been like coming home. Thank you for all your warm greetings and assistance in getting me on board with the flow of activities throughout the church.

Our Easter service was awesome and we had many children in attendance. It is wonderful having Xavier Feliciano bring the Moment for All Ages to the children and then take them out to Children's Worship where they hear more of God's Word in language better suited to their ages. Thanks be to God for a children and Youth Director that can attract our younger generation into the church.

I am excited for April services as we will be digging into the book of 1 John. 1 John is an epistle, or letter, written to the early church to deal with problems and conflicts that the community was facing. This letter was written in order to provide guidance as to how the people were to live and love as followers of Jesus Christ. The guidance written two thousand years ago is just as relevant to us today in our current context.

One thing to keep an eye on this month is General Conference which will be taking place in Charlotte, NC April 23 – May 3, 2024. United Methodists will be coming in from all around the world to vote on proposed legislation. Daniel Dalton, a nationally recognized attorney in Religious Disputes, posted the following summary in LinkedIn on what key issues will be addressed at General Conference.

There are two main questions to be decided in the 2024 General Conference of the United Methodist Church. The answer to both questions will have a significant impact on the future of the UMC and will require local congregations' thoughtful consideration regarding their own affiliation with the denomination.

The first issue will be the adoption of revised social principles. Briefly, the social principles have been revised to reflect the progressive nature of the denomination after nearly one third of all churches have left the UMC since 2019. The second issue will be the adoption of a proposed regionalization plan. The concept of regionalization provides that the denomination will remain as one, but each region of the world will have their version of the United Methodist Church. This allows the United States to become more progressive, and the African churches to remain conservative – but both be able to call themselves United Methodist.

I ask that you remain in prayer for the clergy and lay delegates who will be attending and voting on the future of the United Methodist Church. In the May Newsletter, I will address the key legislation that will be voted on at the Eastern Pennsylvania Annual Conference taking place May 21-23. Susan Paisley and Cindy Haley are our Lay Delegates. It will be important for you to share your opinions with them on the legislation you will be hearing more about next month.

New Series: "How Shall We Live" In this series that will run for three weeks, we will focus on scripture passages in 1 John. We will search for the answer to "How does God wants us living amongst Creation?"

SERMON TITLE: "We Walk in the Light". Focus scripture: 1 John 1:1-2:2

"THE WORD OF LIFE": We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life— 2 this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us— 3 we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. ⁴ We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete.

"GOD IS LIGHT": ⁵ This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. ⁶ If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; ⁷ but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. ⁸ If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. ⁹ If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. ¹⁰ If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.

"CHRIST OUR ADVOCATE": 2My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; ² and he is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world.

GOAL: For people to let Jesus shine a light on the sin they are hiding within their own lives.

April 14th, 11:00 am. Third Sunday of Easter

SERMON TITLE: "We Purify in Hope". Focus Scripture 1 John 3:1-7

3 ¹ See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. ² Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. ³ And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure. ⁴ Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. ⁵ You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. ⁶ No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him. ⁷ Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as he is righteous.

GOAL: To learn what is meant by purity, working towards Wesleyan perfection.

April 21st, 11:00 am. Fourth Sunday of Easter

FINAL WEEK OF SERIES: "How Shall We Live"

SERMON TITLE: "We Abide in Christ" Focus Scripture: 1 John 3:16-24

¹⁶ We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us—and we ought to lay down our lives for one another. ¹⁷ How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sisterin need and yet refuses help? ¹⁸ Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. ¹⁹ And by this we will know that we are from the truth and will reassure our hearts before him ²⁰ whenever our hearts condemn us; for God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything. ²¹ Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have boldness before God; ²² and we receive from him whatever we ask, because we obey his commandments and do what pleases him. ²³ And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us. ²⁴ All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. And by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit that he has given us.

GOAL: Having people focus on how they will live out the love and joy found in a life with Christ.

April 28th, 11:00 am. Fifth Sunday of Easter

NEW SERIES: "How Shall We Love"

SERMON TITLE: "God Is Love" Focus Scripture: John 4:7-21

⁷ Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God.⁸ Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. 9 God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰ In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹ Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹² No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. ¹³ By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴ And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. ¹⁵ God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. ¹⁶ So we have known and believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. ¹⁷ Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. ¹⁸ here is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. ¹⁹ We love because he first loved us. ²⁰ Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. 21 The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

GOAL: For everyone to understand that God IS love, loves us, and commands our love for others.

"PRAYING SCRIPTURE" Deepening Your Relationship with God **April 2024**

Reading the Bible and praying are the primary methods for developing a deepening relationship with God. While many tend to think of prayer and Bible reading as separate spiritual practices, they can be even more powerful when combined into one practice of "Praying Scripture."

What does it mean to Pray Scripture? It's a deeply personal practice that allows you to use the words and emotions of the Bible to enhance your own prayers. This can involve praying the prayers of the Bible word-for-word as your own or finding passages that speak as a guide for your prayers. From Genesis to Revelation, the Bible is filled with prayers that can strengthen your spiritual life. By engaging in this practice, you invite God's Spirit to shape you into the person He wants you to be. Not only can the prayers of the Bible be prayed, but any part of the Bible can also be used to speak with God As you read the Bible in prayer (stories, history, poems, parables, etc.) in the presence of God you will identify with passages that relate to your life. As you continue this practice, it will become natural and effortless to turn your thoughts into prayer, bringing you closer to God and deepening your spiritual life. When you add Scripture into your prayer time, you're saying to God, "This is something I want and need." For Scripture is full of promises from God. It is God-inspired and powerful. Scripture is truth and it gives us the words to pray when we do not have them.

So, here is how you can get started praying Scripture:

- Select a passage that is meaningful to you and that you feel speaks truth into your life. Google "Prayers of the Bible" to locate possible prayers. Also, a psalm is a good place to start; try Psalm 23, 30, 63, or 100.
- 2. As you start, ask God to bless your time in Scripture to keep you focused and to help you pray his word.
- **3.** Start reading through your passage slowly, meditating on each word and verse.
- **4.** As you finish a sentence or a verse, stop, and using your own words, turn your thoughts into prayer, bringing out the ideas or truths of the passage as you speak to God. Joshua 1:8 summarizes it for us. "Keep this Book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it. Then you will be prosperous and successful." May God bless you as you use Scripture and prayer to draw you nearer to God.
